THE COUNTY JUDGESHIP.

To the Editor of the Herald: I have read with interest and no little amusement a communication by "Democrat" in your paper and the answer thereto, published recently in the Evening Democrat. The assertions of "Democrat" strikes home, backed up as they are by incontrovertible proof. The voters of the "Forks" say they would like to know why the affidavit of Ad Harmon is considered by the Daily Evening Democrat a full and complete warrant for allowing a claim not allowed by law, and why Harmon's affidavit before the county clerk is of so much more binding force upon the county court than the affidavits of the road supervisors of Linn county, made before the same officer, and as Mr. Harmon is a resident of the "Forks" the voters there are directly interested. We pause for an explanation, and upon the explanation depends the votes of more than one hundred democrats. We would like to have Judge Whitney explain why other men

as good, perhaps, as Mr. Harmon have verified their claims against the county, as the law directs, and presented them for allowance to the county court, and they were often disallowed or cut down from twenty-five, to seventy-five per cent. without any notice to the claimant, and without any knowledge on the subject other than that afforded by the verified claim, and that all in favor of the claimant. Can it be true that the oath of poor men, road supervisors and others, who are obliged to earn their bread by the sweat of the face, is not entitled to the same credit and consideration as the saloon-keeper of the stamp of Ad Harmon? That the oath to a claim by a road supervisor, administered as the law provides, does not establish a prima facie case? Surely if we read the law aright, there is no distinction; yet, if the acts of Judge Whitney, and the article in the Democrat, interpret the law correctly, there must be a distinction, because the article in the Democrat, if it means anything, means that because the witness—meaning Ad Harmon, the saloon-keeper—presented his claim, properly verified, to the county court for allowance; therefore, there is no condemnation of the county court for the allowance, that the court is justified in allowing him what he was not entitled to receive, allowed him for 108 miles travel, when, if he was really subpoenaed in Scio and actually traveled to Albany and back to Scio, he was entitled to pay for but 36 miles. These are facts, and if you will examine the records you can satisfy yourselves. And if you will take the trouble to make even a cursory examination of the records of this county, during the years of Whitney's incumbency of the office of county judge, you will be amply compensated for the expenditure of time and trouble by the discovery of unmistakable evidence that his claims as a disciple of economy, in administering the financial affairs of the county, are not established by a very large majority, with several precincts to hear from. That said claim is based upon evidence very similar to that upon which his fame as a stump orator, district attorney and skillful political manipulator rests, to-wit: His own noise and "blow." It has been repeatedly averred that as district attorney and judge where but one method was known for accomplishing a certain result, Whitney might reach it by a scratch but if there were right or correct methods and wrong ways of doing it, it was safe always safe to bet he had followed the blind guide and tumbled into the ditch. His blunder while district attorney, in charging a culprit with having stolen a "shall" (shawl), and his severe reprimand by Judge Bonham, and the demurrer to the indictment which was sustained by the court, is well known, and furnishes, as the boys say, a "whole lot" of valuable commentary on his qualifications as an officer. Some of the older settlers will be reminded of the late I. N. Smith's observations on Whitney's orthography. We hope to be further edified by "Democrat," and the comments of the Evening Democrat.
