FARMERS AND THE TARIFF.

The present political campaign is the most important the country has had for many years. It is proposed to make a radical change in the policy of the government which has been one of the fundamental principles since it was founded—that of protection for American industries and labor.

The principal products of Oregon, aside from grain, are wool, lumber and fruits. It is proposed to place wool on the free list along with lumber and a few other minor products. This is a demand that the farmers' products shall be cheapened, while the tariff on manufactured woolen goods, sugar, and the articles the farmer has to buy is retained, making the price of the merchandise he consumes the same as before, and changing the condition of things in no way except the farmer receives a smaller price for his product.

The statement of stump orators that free trade on wool will not cheapen its price is without foundation. In fact it is noticeable that the agitation of this question, has already caused a heavy drop in the wool market, and it is likely the farmers of Oregon will lose thousands of dollars from this source this year.

The lumber interests of this coast are already immense, and in view of our unlimited supply of fine timber is destined to be still further developed. Heretofore a protective tariff of \$2 per M has been maintained on lumber which, while not producing any revenue comparatively speaking, has acted as a barrier against foreign importations and has made it possible for this industry to be pursued. The Mills bill proposes to put lumber on the free list and allow importations to kill the business at home.

During the past twenty years the balance in trade between the United States and foreign countries has been in our favor. That is, we export or sell more than we import or buy. Under the American system we have without a break exported from twenty-five millions to one hundred and sixty-four millions of dollars worth of American products in excess of our imports. Strike down the American protective system and we would again be importing more than we export, and the loss would fall directly upon the farmers of the country, who need, if anyone does, protection.

DIVIDE THE FARMS.

A great many large farms in Oregon have been bought up by speculators, says the Silverton Appeal, and subdivided into 80 and 100 acre fields and sold to Eastern people. This is as it should be. Oregon, particularly the Willamette valley has too many large farms. The owners now have an opportunity to divide them and sell in lots to suit the purchaser at a profit. We want more small farms, more farmers and more diversified farming. It has been shown by experience in this valley that it is the small farms well tilled, with diversified crops, that gives the best returns to the farmer. Divide up the big farms and give the thrifty immigrants a show. Oregon needs more population. A better way will be, however, for farmers to divide up their farms themselves and not let the profits that accrue from the sale go to speculators. A little intelligent energy and judicious advertising will do the job and leave the benefit to those who have stuck faithfully by the old donation land claims through days of hardship and isolation. Yes, divide the

farms by all means and take some of the money thus obtained and invest it in new houses, or additions to the old ones, fresh paint, smart fences and convenient out-buildings. A farm home, with a down-at-the-heel appearance, lacking paint, hinges to the yard gate, window shutters, and, as is often the case, window curtains, carpets and all the conveniences of modern home life present a most forlorn appearance. No wonder that the children want to get away from it and try their luck in the city or village as soon as they are grown, and often even before.

The general tone of the market as regards most of the staples is one of unrelieved dullness. The backwardness of the season imposes a check upon distribution of goods in all departments of trade which depend upon weather conditions. The dullness which prevails, however, is not of a kind to occasion uneasiness; although the movement of commodities is sluggish, the underlying conditions are healthful, and when business is relieved of the impediments which temporarily restrict it, it will flow perhaps in fuller volume than for months before.

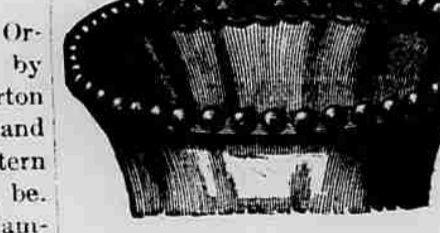
