THE PRICE OF CATTLE.

It is a fact patent to all cattle raisers that the prices are slowly but surely going below the cost of raising, and that practically that branch of the husbandman's business is fast becoming an unproductive as other branches have proven to be. The cry of over-production cannot be maintained in this case. The reason will be found in the remarks of an influential Eastern exchange in saying that it cannot be disputed that one of the most mischievous of existing monopolies is that by which the cattle markets of the country are regulated and controlled. Under the influence of this grasping and powerful combination the cattle industry has been practically destroyed except as it serves to enrich a few persons and firms at the expense of both producers and consumers. The farmers who attempt to raise stock for beef purposes are compelled to abandon the undertaking because the profits which they should realize are arbitrarily taken from them by processes which are little short of robbery. For the past five or six years the prices of cattle have been steadily diminishing, in spite of the fact that the demand for beef has been constantly increasing. It is notorious that the man who ships cattle according to the quotations of a given day is almost certain to have to take less when he reaches the market. The rates do not depend upon any fixed and honest system of commercial logic, but upon the ipse dixit of a ring of speculators who have obtained a species of power that amounts to a practical tyranny. In a certain sense, these monopolists daily confiscate the property of other people; and the victims have no means of defense or redress. The estimate that the value of each steer of three years old and upward raised west of the Mississippi during the past five years has been reduced at least ten dollars by this combination is unquestionably within the truth. Generally speaking, the prices are 50 per cent. less than they were when the cattle syndicate began its nefarious operations. And yet the supply of cattle is much smaller now than it was then, and the consumption of beef is a great deal larger. The prices of beef to the consumers have gone up meanwhile, year after year, and are now higher than they have ever been before in all our history. Thus the knife of the monopolists cuts both ways. It forces the producer to take a beggarly price for his cattle on the one hand, and on the other it forces the consumer to pay an exorbitant price for his beef, the whole profit being pocketed by the select circle of conspirators who have the markets absolutely at their mercy. Perhaps there is no present way to break up this oppressive ring, and secure to the stock-raisers a decent share of the value of their products; but if there is not, then some effective method of bringing about such a consummation should be invented. It is a reproach to our laws and to our boasted protection of the interests of the masses that such a monopoly is possible, and that the people are obliged to pay tribute to it in such a costly and helpless fashion. Millions and millions of dollars which legitimately belong to the farmers of the West are being annually filched from them for the benefit of a class of men who thrive by the violation of the most sacred principles of business, justice, honesty and integrity; and it is to be hoped that some statesman will be able to devise a remedy where the wrong is so distinct and so flagrant.

THE PLAIN FACTS.

The Democrat accuses the Herald of falsehood in stating the fact that Judge Whitney says on the stump that he will bolt the presidential ticket this fall if he is not elected county judge, and says: "There is not a man, woman or child in the county who cares anything for truth, who has heard Judge Whitney, that will say that he has made any such statement." Yet everyone who heard him at Syracuse, and at several other places, heard him say so in just about these words: "You will perhaps expect us democrats who are defeated in the June election to support President Cleveland next fall." This if it means anything means: "Perhaps we will support Cleveland and perhaps we will bolt if we are beaten." Those who heard him understood it plainly enough, and Mr. Irvine in his speech charged him openly with threatening to bolt, and Mr. Whitney has since insisted from such talk. Savor your campaigning, Bro. Stites, with honesty, and you will make more votes by it.

Mr. Irish claims that the republican party is responsible for the present high tariff. He also admits that the tariff, as now in operation, was a war measure, as was the direct tax on incomes and the internal revenue laws, and accuses the republicans of not fulfilling their promises to remove the direct tax and reduce the tariff as soon as the war necessities were over. Then he goes on to sarcastically berate the republicans for doing what he says they promised to do—i. e. remove direct taxation in taking off internal revenue laws, and attempting to reduce the tariff, until the democratic house, for partisan purposes, stopped all further action in that direction and continue to so obstruct and refuse to allow reduction by bringing unfair and unequal bills. This fact in the premises Mr. Irish very discreetly neglected to allude to, although he did claim that the proper way to raise revenue was by tariff and not by direct taxation.
