TO THE LABORING MEN OF LINN CO.

Brownsville, May 30.

Next Monday you will be called upon to cast your ballot for state officers, and among the many names in nomination for those offices there is one to which I wish to call the attention of every laboring man in the county, irrespective of party or politics. That man is W. R. Kirk, of Brownsville, the republican nominee for the assembly. I have known Mr. Kirk for the past eight years, and a stancher friend to the laboring man cannot be found in Oregon.
