EDITORIAL NOTES.
The Chronicle dishes up the postoffice department management in very plain language, while referring to the fact that all registered matter passing between Portland and San Francisco has to go by the way of Ogden. It says: "We in California have seen some startling illustrations of democratic economy in postal matters. We have seen tons of printed mail matter dumped into the ocean because it could not be delivered; we have seen sacks of mail burned up to get it out of the way; we have seen the delivery of letters delayed two or three days because the postmaster was not allowed sufficient clerical assistance; and now we see registered letters sent all the way around Robin Hood's barn and delayed two or three days in transit because the postoffice department will not put postal cars and postal clerks on the railroad between here and Portland. All this results from inefficiency, and from nothing else, and such inefficiency springs in great measure from having turned the postoffice department into a recruiting organization for the democratic army and in using it as a political lever to boost Grover Cleveland into a second term."

The tenacity with which ideas once implanted in the human mind, cling to the people is well illustrated in the adherents to that old expression attributed to Solomon: "Spare the rod and spoil the child." Humane considerations and practical observations in the field of human experience has long since demonstrated that a literal interpretation of the words is neither wise or conducive of good results. A citizen of Minneapolis, Minn., recently made a literal application of the adage to his 16-year-old daughter, and when morning came it was found that she had fled from the house, leaving two notes, one for her father and one for her lover, in both of which she announced that she intended to drown herself because of her father's cruelty. Her body was found in the river that evening and the members of the family are heartbroken.

An Indiana girl seems to be a particular favorite of the thunder bolts of the hoosier state. She was returning from church, when she was struck by a bolt of lightning, which played about her head for an instant and then passed away. Though terribly frightened, the girl managed to reach home, and on examination found that the fluid had bent two of the hair pins on her head and actually melted one, but the skin was not abraded and she was not injured a particle.

Free lumber Gov. Penney says is just what the country wants, and that he does not object to it, even if he is a mill owner and actively engaged in the lumber business. But the lower Columbia mill men show a different aspect of the affair, when they show that the inland mills, like the governor's, will not be effected, but possibly benefitted, while the coast and sound mills, which have to compete with the British Columbia mills, will be closed up. That accounts for the governor's sentiments.

The detestable revolver continues to reap the harvest of its foolish victims and add to the misery and woes of humanity. The latest record is from Chicago, where a young man, but two weeks married, while struggling playfully with his wife over the possession of a watch, pointed, in play, his revolver at her, telling her to stand and deliver. She struck at him, hitting the revolver, which exploded, a charge of which entered her breast, killing her in a few moments.

The prospects are said to be extremely probable that the adoption of the principles of the Mills bill for the foundation principles of the democratic platform at St. Louis, is likely to meet with strong opposition. It would be a ludicrous situation for that convention to nominate Mr. Cleveland and then go back on his free trade doctrines.
