## Celestial Motion.

The overwhelming spectacle of a vast celestial expanse studded with points of light at night is made doubly impressive when we reflect that all these points of light are suns and all are in motion. The midnight sky furnishes a perfect picture of serene repose, yet it is a field of incessant movement. Not one of the myriads of worlds whose light reaches us from the measureless depths is at rest. Each has its own motion and the groups in turn have theirs. The moon moves around the earth, the earth moves around the sun and revolves on its axis at the same time, and even the sun is not at rest. Majestic and glorious as he is to mortal eyes, he pays the same homage to some unknown object—it may be luminous or it may be dark—located somewhere in the universe, which his satellites pay to him; he is drifting in an enormous movement, carrying us along with him through space at a rate faster than the earth's motion in its orbit, but in so vast a circuit as to be imperceptible. A German astronomer, Madler, believed the star Alcyon, in the Pleiades group, was the center of the universe, and that our sun and all the stars are moving around it, but this theory has yielded to another of an agnostic nature, which conjectures that we are slowly nearing the constellation Hercules, in the northern sky. At all events, we are whizzing through space at a tremendous rate, as ignorant of the whither as the crew of a wrecked ship driven over the ocean by wind and wave on a dark night. Comets were once thought to be the fleetest travelers of celestial bodies; and it may be stated that the rush of a midnight star mail railroad train past a way station is but a feeble, a very feeble illustration of the velocity of these couriers of the sky, as they come from the backgrounds of space, whirl around the sun, and then fly off, never, perhaps, to be heard of again. But there are objects that surpass comets almost as much as comets surpass the planets. These are the "parallax stars," so called because we do not know what else to call them, which move with a velocity that is all our notions of swiftness at naught. The best known of these is called 1838-Groombridge, all that we know of which is that it travels ten times faster than the fleetest comet. Another very puzzling celestial motion is that of one of the satellites of the planet Mars. This unaccountable and frisky little moon, only eight miles in diameter, makes two circuits around its parent while the parent makes one revolution on its axis—in irrefragable and incomprehensible defiance of the accepted nebular hypothesis, which credits a satellite with a motion not greater than that of its parent.—St. Louis Republican.

## THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC CO.

Takes Charge of the Oregon & California Railroad Lines.

In the United States Circuit Court Monday Judge Deady made an order in the case of the Southern Pacific Railroad vs the Oregon & California Railroad et al, dismissing bill and discharging receiver; also referring accounts to George H. Durbin master to audit, etc. This was the suit originally brought by Harrison et al, against the Oregon & California Railroad Company to recover mortgages held against that road. A few days ago an order was made by Judge Deady in which the Southern Pacific road was substituted in place of plaintiffs, Harrison et al, for the reason that they had bought up and held most of the mortgages against the Oregon & California. The order made Monday dismissing the suits virtually takes the road out of Receiver Koehler's hands and places it into the control and management of the Southern Pacific Company.

A writer in the Scientific American says: "Sleep, if taken at the right moment, will prevent an attack of nervous headache. ## A SHOCKING CALAMITY.

Eleven Persons Perish in a Burning Hotel in Texas.

ROCKDALE, Tex., June 4.—A terrifying calamity has befallen Rockdale. This morning at 4 o'clock the Mendine hotel, a three-story brick building, was found on fire and was quickly all ablaze. Inside were thirteen persons, only two of whom escaped alive. Dr. W. A. Brooks, proprietor, was pulled out of the burning building with his hair and beard singed off and otherwise badly burned, leaving behind him his wife and four children, who perished. Pemberton Pierce, representing the firm of George H. Seigler, of Philadelphia, jumped from the burning building, and was killed. D. M. Oldham, of Dallas, representing the firm of F. Cannon & Co., of Galveston, escaped badly singed. The mystery about the whole thing is that so many should have perished when none were higher up than the second story, and there were galleries and exits on both sides of the building occupied by the sleepers. No one was heard to cry or scream, all dying without a cry for help, though a great crowd quickly gathered and exhausted every effort to afford rescue. The pecuniary loss is small.

## Home Furnishing.

In regard to bedroom furnishing, don't get a plain cheap set of furniture for your own use and put a handsome suite in the guest chamber for the benefit of the occasional visitor. Strive to make your home a haven of rest for the tired hearts and minds as much as the wearied bodies of your friends, administering refreshments by your intellectual bright surroundings, just as truly to the former as to the latter, when they sit around your board, and your abode will be an alluring spot to many a worn pilgrim on life's way, and you will feel something of the joys of creation, having created that sweet rare thing—true emblem of heavenly rest—a true home—Good Housekeeping.
