### GENERAL NEWS.

#### Comments on the Result of the St. Louis Convention.

A YACHT SINK BY A STEAMER

A Prominent Bachelor Who Was on Board Drowned—Railway Disabled—Destructive Cyclone.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 8.—(Gov. Gray received the news of Thurman's nomination with complacency. "I have had no other expectation for two days than that he would be nominated for vice-president," he said. #### DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

#### Fire in Montreal Destroys \$100,000 Worth of Property.

MONTREAL, June 8.—Fire broke out this morning in the stables of the Montreal Street Railway company, and before it was gotten under control the building, containing 135 horses (all of which, except one, perished) was destroyed. In the rear end of the stable was a small building containing eight horses, all of which were safely taken out. Seven firemen were badly burned in their humane work. The building was burned to ashes. A hospital was also destroyed. The loss will reach \$100,000.

#### A SED FATE.

#### A Pleasure Yacht in Two and a Ban or Drowned.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 8.—Harrison Garrett, president of the banking firm of Garrett & Sons of this city, was drowned last night in the Palmyra river in his yacht "Gleam." It was his party of friends were coming to a halt from Annapolis. The yacht was run down by the steamer "Joppa" and sunk, being struck amidship and almost cut in two. According to all accounts all hands on the "Gleam" were rescued except Garrett, whose "Joppa" struck the yacht, Garrett at once became greatly excited and sprang and grabbed the bow chain of the steamer and held on until it parted and then he fell overboard. Although a good swimmer, he did not rise to the surface. The rest of the party were rescued by the crew on the "Joppa." Mrs. Garrett was completely prostrated by the news of her husband's death. The guests of Mr. Garrett were Gen. R. Snowden, Andrews, Geo. A. Von Lingen, German consul, Joshua G. Harvey, president of the western national bank, and Wm. H. Blackford, president of the Maryland life insurance company. The party left Baltimore yesterday morning for Annapolis to witness the exercises of the naval academy.

#### AN AWFUL TRAGEDY.

#### A Young Man in a Quarrel Accidentally Shoots His Own Father.

MITCHELL, (Dak.) June 8.—In Bloomington last night two young men, farmers, named Bailey and Wilson, quarreled over an old grudge. Bailey fired at Wilson, but killed his own father, Wilson when in town shot Bailey dead.

#### Destructive Cyclone.

GRANADA, June 8.—A cyclone of great severity swept over this place on the night of the 2d inst. Heavy rains inundated the southern portions of the city and destroyed 18 houses. Trains due here on Monday, the 4th inst., jumped the track at Peresnada. Five persons were killed and five injured.

#### Price votes.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 8.—United States steam boiler inspectors or Lubbock has completed his report upon the causes of the India disaster, and attributes the accident to the explosion of petroleum gas furnace boxes.

#### Railroad Building.

CHICAGO, June 8.—The Railway Age will say that from January 1 to June 1, 1888, 2271 miles of railway track has been laid, indicating that the total for the year may probably exceed 8000 miles, and possibly reach 12,000 miles.

#### Notable Death.

BOSTON, June 8.—Ezra H. Baker, president of the American Loan and Trust company, and director of the Union Pacific railway, died last night of blood poisoning.

#### Emperor Better.

POTSDAM, June 8.—The emperor arose at 10 o'clock in night. He passed a good night of good spirits and greatly refreshed.

### CANADIAN AFFAIRS.

#### A Big Failure—Further Particulars of the Storm's Work.

MONTREAL, June 8.—William Little, a lumber merchant, made a judicial abandonment of his estate to-day. His liabilities are between \$100,000 and \$200,000 and the assets are about \$25,000. His principal creditors are the firm of Ross & Co. of Quebec.

Further details of the thunder storms of Wednesday from the surrounding ranches show immense damage, which will probably amount to \$100,000. In certain sections of the country hardly a cabin is left standing.

#### ROMANCE OF THE WAR.

#### Capture, Condemnation and Banishment of a Lawyer.

A few days ago the face of a lady which still retained traces of great former beauty was pointed out upon the avenue, and the following story was told of its possessor: During the war her betrothed lover, while serving as an officer under the banner of the Confederacy, learned incidentally of her serious illness in Troy, N. Y. Nothing daunted by the dangers which encompassed such an undertaking, he obtained a leave of absence, passed through the lines and, after almost incredible escapes and hardships, succeeded in reaching her side in her Northern home.

Upon her recovery he attempted to retrace his steps, but was seen and recognized in New York City and arrested as a spy. After due trial before a competent tribunal he was found guilty and condemned to be shot. The lady in question was a niece of Cardinal (then Archbishop) Manning, and the whole force of the Catholic clergy was brought to bear upon Mr. Lincoln in order to secure a commutation of the sentence. This was done in effect, for the unfortunate man was permitted to marry the woman of his choice, and then both were banished to Paris, where they lived under the surveillance of the American military authorities.

#### Oregon's Population.

Year by year there is a steady and heavy gain in the population of the state. This is apparent in the vote cast at successive general elections. In June 1886, the total vote was 54,654. It will now exceed 60,000. Multnomah county alone increases her vote about 1500 in two years. It is apparent that throughout the state the increasing vote is proportionately republican. In 1880 the total vote of Oregon was 40,816. The census of that year made the population 174,768. The same ratio would indicate a present population of 294,000 but as the number of families, in proportion to voters, is steadily increasing, we judge the population of Oregon may now be 275,000.

#### The End of Sheridan's Life Is Very Near.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The president has approved the act to increase the appropriations for public buildings at Sacramento, California, and an act to amend an act to establish agricultural stations in connection with colleges.

#### TO USE NIAGARA'S POWER.

#### A Novel Water Wheel Invented by a Pennsylvanian.

Not long ago the business men of Buffalo offered a very big reward for an invention that would utilize the vast water power of the Niagara river. This set the inventors of the country cudgeling their brains, and among those who went to work at the problem was old David Cutler of Forty Fort, this county, whose inventive genius has before now manifested itself in various ways.

The result of his labors was shown recently in the Susquehanna river, where it was inspected by a number of mechanics. A working model of his invention was placed in the river near enough to the shore to admit of inspection. It is a wheel 5 1/2 feet in diameter, and in contrast to all other water-wheels, which are placed perpendicular to the bottom of the river, it is furnished with eight paddles or blades, hinged to the frame in such a manner that those which are going with the current and against which the water is pressing expose their full breadth to its force, while those that are traveling against the current lie flat along the water and afford very little opposition to the revolution of the wheel. The blades in the model exhibited were 24 inches long by 42 inches wide. The action of the wheel was perfect, the motion steady, and the blades moved at exactly the same rate as the current. The axis of the wheel can be readily geared to a shaft underneath it. The model was running without this attachment, but Mr. Cutler states that he had it attached to a shaft drum round which a rope was wound, and that even with this small model a power was developed equal to about one-half horse power with a pretty swift current. Of course the swifter the current the more power developed. The great beauty of this invention is the fact that no dams, sluiceways or other expensive constructions are necessary. Any number of wheels can be laid down right in the bed of the river and attached to the same shaft, and a great amount of power can thus be developed. These wheels can run summer and winter. Ice would not effect them, as they lie at the bottom of the river. All those who examined the wheel were of the opinion that it was a good invention and of great practical value.

#### Electricity.

Electricity is no longer used in a haphazard way, as it was a few years ago, but it is accurately measured out for the work required of it, its quantities, according to Prof. W. A. Anthony, being comparable to those of more ponderable gas, oil, or water. Its quantity measured in units called coulombs, may be considered as analogous to pounds of gas or a liquid; potential, measured in volts, analogous to pounds per square inch of fluid pressure; capacity, measured in farads, analogous to cubic feet of a vessel for holding fluids, while the strength of current, measured in amperes, find no analog in fluid measurements, though this perhaps the most important of all, and furnishes the fundamental unit of the whole system. Another very important quantity is the resistance of bodies to the flow of electricity, which may be compared, qualitatively, to the fractional resistance which fluids experience in flowing through pipes, and is measured in ohms.
