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THE LAW OF SUPPLY AND DEMAND.

Whenever prominence is given to the fact that the producers of the land do not receive an adequate recompense for their labors, and that the wealth, business and emoluments of the country are requested by those who are non-producers, the question is met by the assertion that the law of supply and demand governs those cases.

But is that the case. According to Mr. Atkinson's calculations, ten men on a bonanza farm in the far West can produce enough by their labor to serve bread to one thousand persons in New York. If that calculation is correct, then in every community of a thousand people within reach of American grain 999 are released from the necessity of raising food, and are free to produce other useful things.

Mr. Atkinson further calculates that one operative in a cotton factory makes sufficient cloth for 250 people; in a woolen factory enough for 300; while the modern cobbler, working in a boot and shoe factory, furnishes 1,000 men, or more than 1,000 women, with all the boots and shoes they require in a year. In the face of this enormous output of wealth, where a few men can turn out enough of the necessities of life for hundreds, how is it that there are people in England starving for want of food? It certainly is no niggardliness of nature. It is no fault of our instruments of production. It must be something terribly far wrong in the way we organize and employ these great resources. It certainly cannot be supply and demand upon which we saddle the wrong of the unappeared hunger, for the supply is fully adequate to meet the urgent demand, nor is it attributable to the inadequacy of transportation, for that is equal to any emergency.

Some other source must be looked for, and that can only be found in the retarding influences that are placed between supply and demand, by the machinations of non-producing wealth that seeks to gather itself an unwarranted share of the results of production.

The corners in the productions of the soil, the gambling in futures in the food supplies, and like transactions, that though not absolutely contrary to legal enactment are certainly wrong in a moral view, are what leads to the conditions.

A more fair and equal distribution of the results of production must be made, and that can only be made by the unwarrented share of food supplies for speculative purposes must be made impossible.

"AFTER MR. BLAINE, WHO?"
Under the above heading the New York Tribune publishes a lengthy editorial, which closes as follows:

Its desperate battle for a change of tariff toward free-trade principles has proved a bond and a question the determination of the democratic party to break down and destroy protection of American industry as far and as fast as it can. The very issue which Mr. Blaine tried to make the country realize is now forced upon the country, in all its breadth and in all its sharpness, by the conduct of the democratic party when invested with power obtained by false pretences.

The Tribune believes that Mr. Blaine is right—that the issue, and the republican party as the embodiment of American convictions on that issue, will be found stronger than any man, however popular. Any candidate whose position is such that he can draw to himself the votes of those who agree with the republican party on that broad and vital issue will be elected by a vote so decisive that its meaning will never be questioned. There are such candidates, more than one, the Tribune believes, and the nomination of either of them ought to be, and with reasonable management will be, equivalent to an election. Because Mr. Blaine's nomination would have made this issue more definite and clear than any other nomination possible, it was preferred by a majority of the delegates chosen to the convention. In looking beyond the name of Mr. Blaine these delegates will not forget the principles which

made him their first choice. If there are candidates before the convention whose nomination would seem to anybody to mean an abandonment or abatement of republican convictions on this vital issue, it is reasonable to expect that the convention will take care not to nominate either of them. Among the candidates who do fully, unequivocally and unquestionably represent the convictions of the party, the convention will strive to choose the man who will command the strongest support in the doubtful states. "Everybody is wiser than anybody," and the councils of able and earnest republicans at Chicago ought to be so calm, so patriotic, and so wise as to deserve and command greater confidence than the personal choice of even the most sagacious individual.

The peculiarity of the recent case of seizure of the American schooner Knight, at St. Johns, New Foundland, for the alleged selling of bait to the French colony of St. Pierre, on the island of Miguelon, is that English authorities seem to construe that they own the world, for the French colony certainly does not come under their jurisdiction. The case is but another example of the weak and vacillating course of our government in the fisheries question.

BOLLANGER, the French warrior, recently turned into a legislator, concluded to try his strength and introduced into the chamber of deputies a proposition to make radical changes in the government, but his motion was so emphatically sat down upon that he will probably retire into silent obscurity.
