PORTLAND, June 14.—To-day the republican city convention was held and the following nominations made: Van B. DeLashmutt, present mayor, re-nominated by acclamation; L. Therkelson, nominated for police commissioner. The following were nominated for councilmen: First ward—Richard Hoyt, Second ward—S. Farrell, Third ward—William Showers.

INDIAN WAR VETERANS.

The annual session of the grand encampment of Indian war veterans was held here to-day. Resolutions were passed tendering Gen. Phil Sheridan deep sympathy in his serious illness and expressing hope of his early restoration to perfect health.

The election of officers resulted in the selection of the following gentlemen: F. F. Mosher, grand commander; H. M. Chase, senior vice commander; L. Laughlin, junior vice commander; M. R. Hathaway, grand adjutant; L. M. Parsh, grand chaplain; Col. T. B. Wait, grand marshal. A reunion was held this afternoon in the presence of a very large assemblage. The address of welcome was tendered by Mayor V. B. DeLashmutt and responded to by Col. John Kelsay. Addresses were made by Rev. I. D. Driver and J. F. Caples.

SODAVILLE ITEMS.

SODAVILLE, June 14.

Visitors to Sodaville by rail can make close connections at Lebanon with the Sodaville hack, by taking the noon train at Albany.

Notwithstanding the unfavorable condition of the weather, campers are daily arriving to enjoy the health-giving atmosphere and partake of the waters that prove so efficacious in numberless diseases.

The equanimity of the town was greatly disturbed on Friday morning last, upon finding that some maliciously disposed person had broken off the self-closing faucet attached to the reservoir at the springs.

The soda spring at the base of the hill, a hundred feet or more below the old ones, is to be opened up soon by private parties for the benefit of the place. It is claimed by many of the old inhabitants, who drank from the spring a decade or more ago, to be stronger and more palatable than the others.

An engineer is expected on next week to survey out the contemplated extension of the O. & C. railroad from Lebanon to its terminus at this point, a distance of three and one-half miles. Upon the completion of the road, Sodaville will become the most accessible and popular resort in the state.
