THE SECRET OF LONG LIFE.
Among human beings the desire
for length of days is a ruling pas-
sion. They plan, study and work
to increase the years that they
may pass in the preparatory stage
of earth life. Experience is care-
fully noted; statistics laboriously
gathered and studied; methods of
life industriously compared, and
even the most rigid asceticism is
adopted, if the hope of added years
to the precarious lease of life can
be believed in. And what is this
secret the possession of which will
enable us to attain long life? Is
there really any secret to it, and is
there really any method by which
years can be added to our stay in
earth life? One writer says that
we—at least persons who have
passed middle age—have only a
certain amount of reserve force,
and all that we draw upon in
hurry is abstracted from that
which should be distributed through
the remainder of life. The secret
of longevity is probably skill in so
economizing the reserve of vital
energy as to make it last out an
unusual period. Persons who be-
gin unusual exercise in youth may
adapt their constitutions to the
habit, and may thereby hold on to
their full term of life; but this can
not be done safely if one waits till
mature age before beginning.

Again, and in the third place, it
is claimed that the repeal of the
tax would reduce the price of
liquor to the consumer, and hence,

tax of 90 cents, is the cost of the
liquor, but the cost of rent, help,
profit, etc. Removing the tax
would not reduce the cost of a

ite. A man that drinks now will
have all he wants. He will have
no more did it cost but one-half as
much, and if it is cheaper, when
he has all he wants, there will be
possibly more left in his pocket for
his wife and children.

Probably the idea advanced by
this writer is the correct one and
the only solution to the query that
can be given. It simply means
that to attain long life we must
husband carefully the resources
that nature places within our
reach, or, in other words, endows
our physical systems with. Man
never yet has been, and probably
never will be, able to improve
upon nature's alchemy, never has
and never will change the chem-
ical affinities of nature's laboratory
to increase the physical stature or
strength of constitution. The
secret of long life is to obey
nature's laws and live contented
and happy.

The death of Emperor Freder-
ick places Germany in a crisis in
her governmental affairs, and
diplomatic relations to other
nations. The supposition is that
the emperor who now takes the
reins of government in his impet-
uous hands, is thoroughly Bismarckian
in his feelings and
sympathies, and that there is
likely to be aggressive measure
adopted as the outcome of his
taking the throne. The outcome
will be watched for with interest.

TEMPERANCE NOTES.

So much is being said and writ-
ten about the repeal of the internal
revenue taxes, that a paper pre-
pared by the committee on repeal
of the law will not be amiss.
It starts out by asking the ques-
tion, "Would the repeal of the
internal taxes increase drinking?"
It states that some conscientious
temperance men and women favor
the retention of the taxes until
such time as prohibition can be
secured, because the result of re-
peal would be "free whisky" and
increased consumption. The paper
says: We believe that a little
thought will convince those who
are honest and conscientious in this
belief that they are mistaken. It
is not our purpose to argue this
question in this article from a moral
standpoint, but it may be pertinent
to state that there is not an argu-
ment that can be urged on moral
grounds against license that does
not apply equally against the in-
ter- al revenue taxes.

Not consenting ring this question in
its moral aspect, then, in the first
place, it does not necessarily fol-
low that the removal of the internal
revenue taxes would give the
country "free whisky." It is more
than probable that in states where
prohibition does not exist a tax
would be levied upon the manufac-
ture and sale of liquor. So that
those people who favor restriction,
and not prohibition, could as well
secure what they desire with the
taxes removed. Those who accept
