REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRADE.

The regular monthly meeting of the Albany Board of Trade met at the G. A. R. hall last evening, and a quorum being present proceeded with reading the minutes of last meeting.

The committee appointed to prepare a descriptive pamphlet of Albany and Linn county, asked for further time, after a full description of the plan of the work as laid out by the committee.

Judge Powell inquired as to the probabilities of the cost of the pamphlet coming within finances of the Board.

Mr. Stites was of the opinion that it would. Judge Powell favored the plan proposed.

Mr. Turrell suggested that part of the expense might be met by inserting advertisements.

Messrs Stites and Powell thought it best not to take advertisements, but confine the pamphlet to a description of the resources of the country.

Mr. Turrell was of the opinion that the advertisements in a pamphlet would impart a great deal of information of the place.

Dr. Maston favored the admission of advertisements.

Mr. Jay W. Blain favored the same plan and referred to a copy of a descriptive pamphlet of Greeley, Colorado, which had been received.

Mr. Allen was also in favor of accepting advertisements to assist in bearing the expenses.

Mr. Turrell moved that the committee be instructed to ascertain how much of the expense of the pamphlet could be met by soliciting advertisements.

Mr. Monteith moved that the committee be granted further time.

Mr. Pogue thought that if the matter was to be prepared in time for the San Francisco teachers' meeting the time must be limited.

Mr. Monteith mentioned next Tuesday evening, which was agreed to.

On motion of Judge Powell the committee on procuring a hall was continued and instructed to make a contract for the same.

On motion a committee was appointed to investigate the subject of a salary for the secretary and treasurer. Committee—J. C. Powell, W. E. Turrell and M. E. Pogue.

The secretary gave notice of an amendment to the constitution creating a committee of three on advertisement and immigration, and changing the time of regular meetings from Monday to Tuesday evening.

On motion adjourned till next Tuesday evening.
