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THE CHICAGO CONVENTION. The work of the republican national convention at Chicago, although extended over a somewhat protracted session, seems to have resulted in embodying the principles of the party into a platform squarely to the point, and the convention is now engaged in selecting from some half dozen good candidates the one best suited for carrying the standard of the party to victory in the contest between protection and free trade this fall.

That this is the simple plain issue, cannot be dodged, although the St. Louis convention attempted to straddle the issue by endorsing the principles of the democrats in 1854, which was for protection after a mild fashion, then turned about and endorsed Cleveland's free trade, free wool message and lastly demanded the passage of the Mills bill, which is perhaps the most obnoxious feature of them all.

On this question Oregon has already spoken with no uncertain sound, and on the protection platform adopted at Chicago this state will speak again right vigorously next autumn for protection for our home industries and for American products.

An Eastern exchange speaks out fully and plainly its views upon the subject of school children occupying hours outside of the regular school hours for study. It says: "The amount of school work to be done at home is a subject in which parents and teachers are equally interested. Aside from the physical injury caused by carrying loads of books to and from school is the time consumed out of school hours in the preparation of lessons. No one with the least knowledge of physiology will contend that ten hours a day of intellectual labor is a reasonable tax upon a growing child. The teachers themselves are paid only for one-half of that time, and some have even been known to rebel at the occasional necessity of prolonging their labor two or three hours beyond the limit. Parents, too, have a right to protest against being continually called upon, perhaps in hours they themselves can ill afford to spare, to help their children solve problems or write compositions. For such service are teachers employed and paid. As such work belongs to the school room, it should be done there. It is in order to get it done at all, it must needs be crowded into the hours rightly belonging to rest, recreation or home duties, then less should be attempted, that the teacher may have opportunity to personally superintend the labor which legitimately belong to the school room."

As to whether we have to pay more for clothing under a protective tariff than we would under free trade, there can be but one opinion when the facts are all understood. The Chronicle gives a hint on that subject when it says that the American soldier's clothing has been made in American mills and sold to the government by American manufacturers. A military board of the German empire, in discussing the subject of soldiers' clothing, said: "The clothing of the United States army, quality considered, is cheaper than that of any other army in the world." This in itself ought to be a conclusive answer to the ignorant charge that clothing costs more in the United States than abroad. As a matter of fact, the staple varieties of cloth, such as are worn by the American workmen, are cheaper in the United States than anywhere else in the world."

At the next meeting of the Board of Trade a committee on advertising will probably be appointed. This is an important matter and care should be taken in putting the right men on the committee. Judicious advertising is being used with great effect by Portland, Tacoma, Seattle and other growing cities, and it is in this direction that the Albany Board of Trade can do much good.

Chicago, June 15.
