GENERAL NEWS.

HARRISON IN CALIFORNIA.

De Young Talks About the Record of General Harrison.

CHICAGO, June 27.—M. H. De Young, of San Francisco, who returned to-day with other members of the California delegation from Indianapolis, says in an interview that he talked with General Harrison regarding the Pacific coast. Regarding that talk Mr. De Young says:

"General Harrison said he had acted squarely with the Pacific coast in the past, and if he was elected the coast would have no cause to regret it, and would be remembered by him. I was asked a question by a prominent man, 'Why did you throw the California vote for Harrison after you had said that he could not carry the Pacific slope?' I answered that General Harrison had voted upon the Chinese question as I said he did, but subsequently I learned the reason why he voted against the amendments of the Page bill, forbidding naturalization of Chinese. It was because the proposed measure was already a law, and incorporated in the revised statutes. There was no necessity of enacting it again, and he showed his familiarity with legislation by the knowledge he displayed of the existing law. He did not object to the practice or principle of existing or proposed legislation against the Chinese, but only against this useless re-enactment. Upon that statement of the case to me I changed my views.

"General Harrison is a protectionist in the fullest sense, and in his opinions favoring a gold and silver double standard of money. He is with us. He has a strong will and is possessed of the most honest intentions. Our ticket was Blaine and Harrison. We went to shouting that ticket, when at the last moment we felt sure about the record. We concluded if we could not get Blaine for the first place we would take Harrison. His representatives had said he would not take the second place, but we had intended to put him there with Blaine. We had cheered Harrison for second place, so we are satisfied. The final decision was made on the floor of the convention. We saw that it must be either Sherman or Harrison, and we had the power to break the dead lock. As long as the Blaine specter was in the convention it was certain that other delegates would vote for their men."

MITCHELL'S OPINION.

He Approves of Harrison's Record on the Chinese Question.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Senator Mitchell of Oregon, one of the most pronounced promoters of anti-Chinese legislation in congress, says: "It is a mistake to suppose that Harrison's record is objectionable to the people on the Pacific slope, and to those who are familiar with it it needs no apology. Harrison voted against two measures providing a form of restricting Chinese immigration. I talked with him about the matter, and he gave me the grounds on which he objected to the proposed legislation, which were that the measures conflicted with the existing treaties. He held that before we passed statutory laws we ought to abolish the existing treaties so as to avoid conflict. That is the position I occupy. But the Chinese question will not be the paramount issue in the approaching campaign on the Pacific coast. We have secured a much more restrictive of immigration and as much restriction of the rights of Chinese in our country as we can get at this time. Our people are practically satisfied on this subject, and the issue at the polls in November will be fought on the tariff. The recent election in Oregon shows what position the people there hold on this subject. The nomination of Harrison, it seems to me, was the best possible solution of the complication in which the convention found itself."

There are now seven presidential tickets in the field for next November's election they are:
Albert E. Redstone, of California for president and John Calvin of Kansas, for vice president, nominated at Washington on February 22 by the industrial reform party.
Belva Lockwood, of the District of Columbia, for president, and Alfred H. Love, of Pennsylvania, for vice president, nominated at Des Moines, Iowa, on May 15 by woman suffragists.
A. J. Sutor, of Illinois, for president, and Charles E. Cunningham, of Arkansas for vice president, nominated at Cincinnati on May 16 by the Union party.
Robert H. Snow, of Illinois, for president, and W. H. T. Wakefield, of Kansas, for vice president, nominated at Cincinnati on May 17 by the united labor party.
C. B. Fiske, of New Jersey, for president, and John A. Brooks of Kansas City, for vice president nominated at Indianapolis on May 31 by the prohibitionists.
Grover Cleveland, of New York, for president, and Allan G. Thurman, of Ohio, for vice president nominated at St. Louis June 6th, by the Democratic party.
Benjamin Harrison, of Indiana, for president, and Levi P. Morton of New York, for vice president nominated at Chicago, June 25 by the Republican party.

Over One Hundred Brought onshore at Ft. Stevens.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—On the last trip of the steamer Batavia from China to this port, via British Columbia, she brought about 300 Mongolians. Of this number 122 were refused landing by Surveyor Tamm preparatory to an examination of their certificates. This work had only been partially performed when the United States District Court issued writs of habeas corpus which commanded the United States Marshal to take those restrained of their liberty into his charge and escort them before the Court. This duty the Marshal performed yesterday, and by the aid of four express wagons, removed the baggage of the Mongolians from the vessel and dumped the entire outfit on the sidewalk in front of the Appraisers' building on Sansome street, while the Mongolians were escorted to the clerk's office where bonds were being filed out for the newcomers. They were then permitted to go their way rejoicing.

Deep Sea Fishing Excursions.
