### GENERAL NEWS.

The Mills Bill Passes the House By a Vote of 162 to 149.

THE DROWNING OF FOURTEEN MEN

Bald Stage Robbery in California—An Oil Excitement—Eastern News Items.

The Herald's Special Despatches.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—The Mills tariff bill passed the house to-day, yeas 162, nays 149. The following democrats voted against the bill: Bliss, Fitch and Greenman, of New York; Sowden, Ermentrout, of Pennsylvania; Nelson, of Minnesota, and Brewer, of North Carolina. Otherwise the vote was almost a strict party vote.

FOURTEEN MEN DROWNED.

A Party of Lumbermen Meet a Horrible Fate.

THREE RIVERS, Quebec, July 21.—Fifteen have been received of the drowning of a party of fourteen lumbermen on the Watawan river, about fifty miles above Piles. The lumbermen were drunk, and in attempting to run the rapids the canoe was overturned and all hands perished.

### STRIKE OIL.

Great Excitement Over a New Find in an Old Region.

PITTSBURG, July 21.—There is great excitement in the oil fields over the revival of the oil fields. The pit hole has for nearly a quarter of a century, been considered a snoked orange, and the oil right together with 100 acres around the old town, would not have brought \$100. Now the excitement is greater there than in any other field in that region, not excepting Bakers-town. Black brothers have been pushing a drill around Pleasantville so successfully that they have been encouraged to test the old pit hole region, and the result is one of the most surprising things of the oil region. In this old, and long since abandoned territory, there now have seven wells that are good for 800 barrels per month.

### DARING STAGE ROBBERY.

California Robbers Hold Up a Stage and Carry Off \$1500.

SAN LOUIS OBISPO, July 21.—Further particulars of last night's stage robbery show that it was a most daring one. The robbers compelled all the passengers, six in number, and the driver to alight. He then covered their heads with masks, stowed them in a line and robbed all but one lady passenger, taking about \$500 altogether. He then cut open Wells, Fargo's box, and the mail bags. The contents of the box, which was supposed to contain about \$1000, were taken, and a number of letters opened and examined. The men then started up the mountain. The sheriff and posse are still in pursuit.

### A SHERIFF SHOT.

Mistaken for an Escaped Prisoner by His Deputy.

TACOMA, July 20.—Sheriff Wilt, who has just returned from a trip with prisoners to Walla Walla, brings word that a few nights ago a deputy sheriff at Pasco shot and fatally wounded the sheriff of Franklin county. A number of suspicious characters were in town, and a raid was made upon them. One escaped and for him the deputy was searching. He approached the jail, thinking the fellow would try to communicate with his pals. While there he discovered the sheriff, and thinking he was the man shot him. The ball entered the right shoulder and came out of the right breast. The wound is dangerous.

### TROUBLE OVER CATTLE TAX.

Police Seize Several Thousand Head.—But Release Them.

GAINESVILLE, Texas, July 20.—Three days ago Indian police, under law, seized several thousand head of cattle on which head tax had not been paid. Yesterday a party of cow boys and non-residents armed and made a descent on the Indian police, and forced them to release the cattle. The Indians telegraphed to Governor Guay, the Chickasaw nation, summoning assistance, and a large force of armed men started at once for Ardmore. The force is due there to-night. The non-residents rode south. Governor Guay will pursue them.

Trouble has been pending over the tax for several months.

No One Hurt.

LAREDS, TEXAS, July 21.—Particulars have been received of an accident to a construction train on the Mexican National road. No one was hurt. The workmen all jumped before the collision occurred.

### THE WATER WAS TOO COLD.

so the Would-be suicide Wades Out to Sinking and Arrest.

SALEM, Or., July 20.—A stranger who gave his name as Frank Willis of California, attempted to commit suicide to-night by jumping off the platform into the millpond near the water works, but either

the shallowness or the coldness of the water induced him to change his mind, for he waded out himself and was taken charge of by parties who saw the deed, and who turned him over to an officer. Willis says he is a miller by trade, and is from California. He arrived in town night before last and has been drinking and drunk ever since. He has little money and it would appear from his actions that he is crazy, or temporarily deranged from the effects of his spree. What disposition to make of him will be determined to-morrow.

#### BUSINESS INTEGRITY.
