THE RIVER AND HARBOR BILL.

It Is Passed and Will Probably Go to the President on Monday.

The river and harbor bill, carrying \$22,570,000, has at last passed the conference committee. The report of the conference committee has been adopted by an overwhelming vote.

There was an effort in conference committee to strike out these amendments, but the Pacific coast senators stood by them in a determined manner and refused to consent to the measure at all unless they were rendered.

The measure goes to the president, who, no doubt, after some speculative objections, and after delaying a sufficient length of time to intimate to the country that he is in doubt about it, will finally affix his signature to the measure.
