UNSELFISH ACTION.

The paramount incentive to actor, among human beings, is the desire to bring larger benefits to the individual. While this is perhaps a wise attribute of the human mind, as it probably leads to the greater amount of progress and development that is worked out in the advancement of the world, it nevertheless defeats its own objects and leaves for the ardent pursurers of benefits as veritable a disappointment as the ashes of Dead Sea apples. The Philadelphia Ledger has been discussing this subject and points out that active goodness of every kind, even though it may be hard and painful to perform, finally results in happiness to the doer. In private life, and in all life, the best motives to action are those which lie outside of self and its supposed interests. To build the ship staunch and safe and the house firm and healthful for the sake of human lives that will be entrusted to them; to administer justice because of its equity; to heal disease and teach sanitary laws for the sake of suffering humanity; to cherish in every employment some glimpse of and interest in the good that is to be produced in the world introduces a finer element into the labor and actually brings forth a better quality of work than can be induced by the mere hope of personal benefit to the worker. It is a very poor type of parent who would subordinate his child's welfare to his own in his relations with him, and a very poor type of teacher who does not make the needs of his pupil paramount. Philanthropic actions, so called, may have many motives; money and time and energy may be devoted to those who need them from the mere desire to be considered generous or the fear of being thought mean; but who can doubt that when they are given from true sympathy and an honest desire to promote happiness they are of tenfold worth? It is true that at present the egoistic instincts of men are so much stronger than the altruistic that the former class of motives is much more easy to arouse. And, as we have said, they are in many cases the only available ones; yet we should never lose sight of the truth that they are inferior, and whenever it is possible to infuse a love of what is good and right for its own sake—a desire to see others benefitted and made happy, a motive for excellence unconnected with self—we should hail the opportunity with joy. Generous emotions and virtuous desires are in themselves a fountain of happiness to their possessor, but it is a fountain which must spring up unawares. Planned for and sought for, it fails to appear. It is in youth that such motives can be most easily fostered. Then it is that habits are formed; and there is a habit of motive as well as a habit of action. It is not sufficient to instruct the child to follow certain lines of conduct and to avoid others. We must supply him with incentives, and upon the nature of these will his future character largely depend. Instead of assuring children that if they are good they will be happy, and clinching the assurance by artificial rewards or bribes, we should lead them gently to choose and to prefer the good without reference to self at all. They can be accustomed to plan for and to aim at giving pleasure, not getting it, and, although in so doing they will experience a rich enjoyment themselves, it will be incidental; never one for which they have striven. Artificial rewards and penalties will thus be rarely needed; and they will grow up with generous and unselfish instincts, instead of mean and calculating ones. A recent writer says truly: "A love of good may be cultivated to almost any extent where the original foundation of an altruistic nature exists. A passionate ideal of excellence can so fill the mind that

no pleasure is felt in anything but in efforts to realize it.

The pardon by the governor of John M. Culp, who was convicted in 1884 of manslaughter, he being accused of killing G. W. Smith at Willow Springs, brings forward a question of justice and right that is overlooked in our laws. It appears that the grounds of pardon are that Mr. Culp is innocent of the crime, the principal witness against him having confessed that he swore falsely. Under that view of the case, the victim of four years unjustifiable imprisonment is certainly entitled to some indemnification, as well as a direct effort towards removing the ignominious stigma fastened upon him. The matter of pardon where no crime has been committed is a lame place in our laws.

The senate apparently believes in the millions for defense doctrine, as they have agreed in committee to report an amendment to the army appropriation bill appropriating between \$6,000,000 and \$7,000,000 for the establishment of a gun factory in West Troy, New York, and for the manufacture of coast defense guns. One section of the amendment appropriates \$750,000 for the erection of necessary buildings, and their equipment with machinery and fixtures. Another section appropriates \$5,000,000 for the purchase of steel for high power coast defense guns of eight, ten and twelve-inch caliber. An appropriation is also proposed for the purchase of torpedoes.

The house committee on agriculture have agreed to report the Lee bill to prevent the sale and manufacture, or transportation of adulterated articles of food, drink and drugs. Also a substitute for Butterworth's bill defining lard and imposing a tax on compound lard, and regulating its sale, importation and exportation.

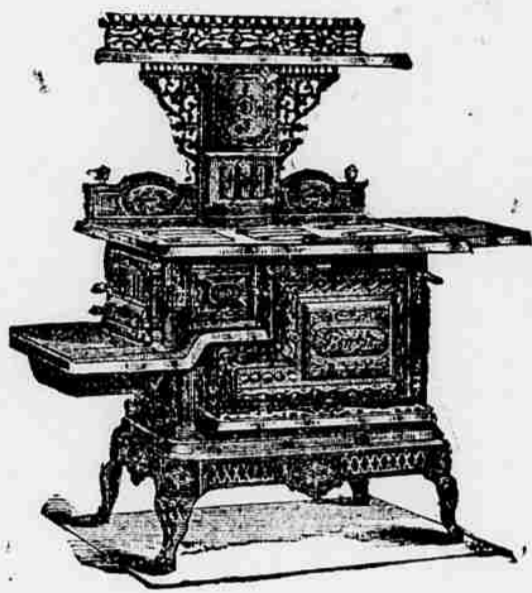
