THE COUNTRY'S FINANCES.

The financial and commercial transactions of the country, are of course, the indications of present and future prosperity, and as such are closely watched.

The present dullness in business can not be altogether ascribed to political conditions in this country.

There is equal uncertainty as to the future prevailing abroad. The death of the German Emperor, and the succession of one whose peaceable intentions are distrusted, and who has the power to throw all Europe into a devastating war, has served to paralyze foreign markets.

The political uncertainty and excitement felt in the United States, tends to depress all enterprise. Congress has done absolutely nothing with any financial question.

Both political parties are waiting for the result of the election before taking any measures for the reduction of the surplus.

One class of manufacturers, and those dependent on them, fear that this reduction may be brought about by a radical change in the tariff. Another class dread the abolishment of the tax on whisky and tobacco.

Every one fears some serious change in the conditions now existing, and will not take even ordinary risks in any new direction until the question of the financial policy of the Government is permanently settled.

This can not be deemed a prosperous state of things. The amount of money available for circulation is perhaps as large as it has been for years, but the amount actually circulating is smaller—the current is languid.

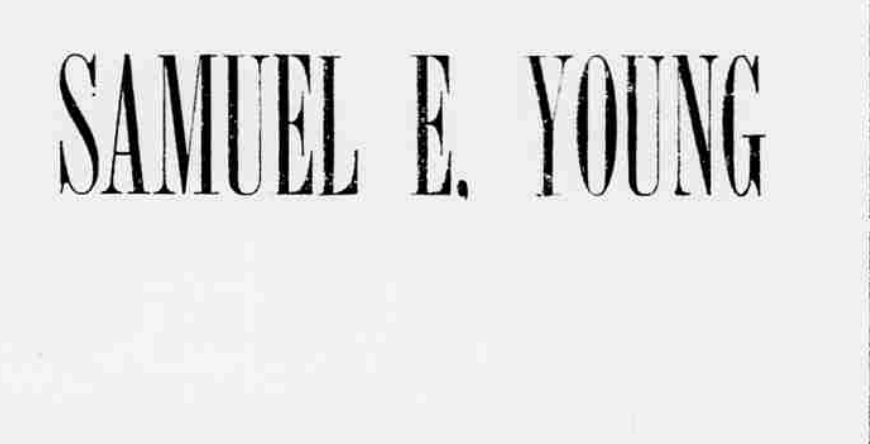
