NOT RELEVANT.

A supposed (?) correspondent of the Evening Democrat attempts to use an application upon the senior editor of the HERALD, that is somewhat akin to what is denominated blackmail.

This correspondent says "the editor of the HERALD is willing to sacrifice the interest, welfare and usefulness of the order of Patrons of Husbandry to subservise his partisan interests."

We say a supposed correspondent, and with cause for so doing, for no person who can truthfully sign himself "Granger"—as the article referred to is signed—would make a statement so unqualifiedly false, so maliciously misleading and so discredibly mean.

Every Patron in the jurisdiction knows that the active effort of the senior editor has been to keep partisanship entirely out of the grange.

As to using the influence of the Patrons of Husbandry for any purpose whatever outside of the benefit of the order itself, we never have, for two very good reasons.

First, as far as we are personally concerned, we would not if we could, and every member of the order that knows us knows that fact.

Secondly, we could not if we would, and no member could, a fact that has been satisfactorily demonstrated many times over.

We are certainly at a loss to conceive what special reason there could be for the claim that our being a member of the much abused order of Patrons of Husbandry should handicap the editorial matter that we may prepare for our paper.

We can see no more reason for any connection in that direction than there should be with the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, with which we also have the honor to be connected, or any other organization to which we may belong.

The HERALD firm is a member of the Albany Board of Trade, but that organization does not own the HERALD's editorial columns, as a sequence of such membership, neither does the freely outspoken facts and deductions of our editorial matter damage the interests of that or any other organization to which we may be united.

The real facts of the case are that the writer of the article referred to seeks, by means both unfair and dishonest, to create sentiment in favor of his own blindly adhered to opinions.

His partisanship is so strong that he cannot distinguish free trade in the fact that the products of Oregon are placed upon the free list, but maintains that protection is maintained because the products of the almost single state of Louisiana—sugar—is still kept at a high tariff, and the manufactured woolen goods we wear is given the benefit of protection, but the Oregon producer of the raw material is left to the mercy of the competition of the whole outside world.

He also drops back upon the stale and hackneyed falsehood of "free whisky and free tobacco."

This pseudo "Granger" knows, if he is capable of connecting two intelligent consecutive thoughts together, that the abolition of the whisky revenue tax will not conduce towards free whisky in the least, but on the contrary will work in the opposite direction.

The best thinkers and workers in the temperance cause have universally so argued the question and convincingly too.

As far as tobacco is concerned, if the removal of the direct tax under the revenue law will put money into the pockets of the farmers of the majority of the states of the union who are engaged in the cultivation of the plant, and there is no denying the fact that it will, then we emphatically say remove it.

We are not in favor of a direct war tax in times of peace, especially when an overflowing treasury is claimed to endanger the welfare of the country; perhaps our pseudo "Granger" is "Granger" also has discovered

that the republican party is in favor of "free oleomargarine." Most wonderful discovery! Most learned judge! No other individual could conceive such astute wisdom. Probably in a day or two you will be able to deduce to your own satisfaction that the republican platform advocates free measles and free small-pox.

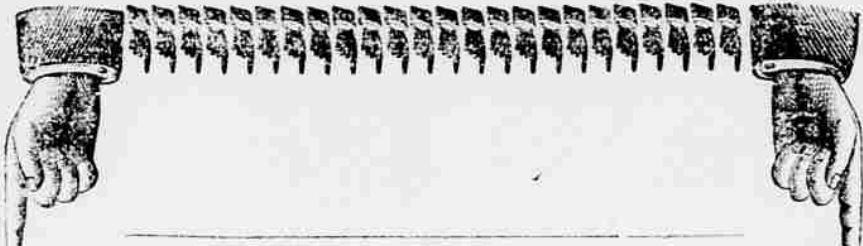
