THE SANTIAM BRIDGE.

The bridge across the Santiam is a model railroad bridge. The piers are huge iron cylinders filled with concrete. The structure is an iron truss bridge.

IN READINESS FOR WORK.

Articles Filed.

The South Benton Mineral Development company has filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. The incorporators are G. A. Waggoner, W. H. Rich and B. F. George, of Corvallis; capital stock, \$100,000, in shares of \$100 each; object, the acquisition by purchase or otherwise and development of mineral lands, etc.

Fined Five Dollars.

An altercation occurred Sunday evening in the saloon of A. Comely, which resulted in J. W. Thomas being ejected from the saloon. Shortly afterwards they met on the street and the altercation was renewed, when they came to blows. They appeared before Recorder Henton yesterday morning and paid a fine of \$5 and costs each.

First Watermelons.

Capt. W. N. Phillips presented this office yesterday with the first ripe watermelons brought to this city from local gardeners. They are much superior to those shipped here from California. Capt. Phillips has a model garden near this city, which is filled with the choicest fresh fruits and vegetables.

Burned to Death.

A few days ago a small child of Mr. Phillips, living near Harrisburg, accidentally overturned a pan of boiling hot jelly upon itself. It was so badly burned that it died. The remains were taken to Millers station for interment.

STATE DISPATCHES.

Two Boys Drowned While Bathing in the Willamette at Eugene.

CORVALLIS NOTES.

CORVALLIS, Aug. 6.—Considerable activity is manifested here over the proposed resumption of work on the Oregon Pacific railroad. Wm. M. Hoag returned last evening from a trip over the road eastward from Albany, and states that work is to go forward at once.

Numerous petty burglaries have been committed in this city during the past few days. The residences of M. M. Jacobs and Rev. G. Hershner were entered yesterday and about \$50 taken.

Eastern Oregon Wool.

This wool is set up by the Ochoco Review, a good democratic journal, published among the sheep ranges of Eastern Oregon: "There is no market for wool either in The Dalles, Portland or San Francisco. Only small lots are being bought at the latter place, and that at from 13c. to 16c." Well, what are you going to do about it? Move right along with such depressing, nefarious doctrines as the Mills bill and similar free trade measures, and Oregon wool will tumble still lower, as well as several other products of this country.

Railroad Matters.

Work will be resumed on the Oregon Pacific within a few days. A branch road of the Narrow Gauge is to be built to Scio, and if the branch of the O. & C. is extended to Sodalville, verily railroad building will boom in Linn county. This city should be made a terminal shipping point, and probably will be if the matter is properly taken hold of. It would offer a reduction of freight charges that would advance the jobbing trade of Albany merchants, which is now steadily growing.

To Lay Out a Park.

With the renewal of construction on the line of the Oregon Pacific comes the report that a Portland gentleman, Mr. Sill, has just returned from Mill City, Marion county, where he purchased eight acres of beautiful land on the line of the road for a park, to be used as a summer health resort. It is located on the Santiam river, some thirty miles from Salem. Game and trout are plentiful in that region and many campers are there this summer. A large lumber mill is now being built.
