BLAINE IN THE CANVASS.

Recent advices from Mr. Blaine report him as profoundly gratified at the arrangements which are being made for extending to him a fitting welcome on his arrival home. It looks now as though he would receive one of the grandest ovations ever tendered to a citizen in civil life. Just how Mr. Blaine may choose to take his promised part in the campaign is not generally known. Whether he will open with a series of political speeches on the occasion of his public reception or wait until later, is a matter for conjecture. He could make his responses to tenders of welcome without saying much about politics, or he could deliver half a dozen brilliant speeches which would sound the key-note on all the more important issues. There is one feature which will be prominent and most telling. Mr. Blaine has a peculiarly strong hold on classes of voters in the Democratic party which are not easy to influence, and to these he will be able to talk more pointedly than ever before. He has not been idle during his residence abroad, and the results of his examination into the condition of the working classes of Europe, as affected by the opposing systems of protection and free trade, will be full of interest and instruction. What he may have to say on the foreign policy of the Government will also attract wide attention. In any event, Mr. Blaine promises to be a great big factor in the campaign.

He is expected to make speeches in three or four of the doubtful states in the East, and may go to California to stir up the minds of the republicans of that state. Whenever and wherever he speaks he will have something to say that the people will find worth hearing. Mr. Blaine occupies a position in which he has no occasion for self-stultification. He can afford to indulge in as much independence as true manliness demands, and he can not afford to seem to indorse those things which he is known to condemn. He is too conspicuous a figure to play the demagogue, especially when no necessity exists. Of course Mr. Blaine will speak for protection. He is the leading protectionist of this country and is a thorough believer in American markets for American products.

THE Chinese exclusion bill prepared by Senators Dolph and Stewart and Representative Morrow has passed the senate. The bill goes into operation upon ratification of the new treaty which was negotiated by Bayard and amended by the senate. The Chinese government has not yet indicated whether it will accept the treaty or not, as amended, and perhaps it is waiting to give the traders a chance to land a few thousand more before the traffic is shut off entirely. The house has not taken up the bill yet.

The editors of Oregon will hold their annual association at Salem to-day. Governor Penney will deliver the opening address. Mayor Van B. DeLashmatt, of Portland. Mayor J. J. Murphy, of Salem, and M. L. Pipes, of Corvallis, will also deliver addresses. Altogether it will be a brainy affair.

A GREAT MASON DEAD. Yet not dead by entered into life. Robert Morris, E. L. D., a leader for over forty years in the vineyard of Masonic truth, departed this life at Louisville, Ky., July 31, 1888. Dr. Morris was born in Massachusetts August 31, 1818. Dr. Morris, early in life

became an active Mason, and by personal industry, hard study and close application he rose to the place he so fittingly occupied—an eminent Mason and a noted traveler and author. In 1858 he was chosen G. M. of Kentucky. His residence since 1860 has been at Lorange, Kentucky. In 1865 he visited and explored in the holy land, gathering much information for the craft, and by his labors and efforts the craft probably owes more for the uniformity of work than to any other one member of the fraternity.

On December 17, 1884, by a general recognition of mind, Dr. Morris was crowned poet laureate of Freemasonry by his brethren assembled at the Masonic grand lodge room, Masonic temple, New York, the action having been recommended by members of the Masonic fraternity of every grade from all parts of the United States, Canada and Great Britain, showing the general appreciation of his worth. The Scotch bard, Robert Burns, was crowned in Edinburgh April 1, 1787, and after the lapse of nearly one hundred years Dr. Morris received the same distinguished honor. The first wrote but one Masonic ode but the odes of the second are numbered by the scores. The first was crowned in the opening of his poetic life, the second near the close of a life, the fruits of which will last with the order. Dr. Morris was a brother true and tried, with a will to do, a brother of deep and pure thought, at all times laboring for the true enlightenment and elevation of a universal cosmopolitan brotherhood. He labored for a brotherhood, unincumbered by any age or nation, place or people, the outgrowth of no condition or class, but based on the permanent relationship and ever-recurring necessities of men. Dr. Morris' writings are found in nearly every Masonic library in the land. Some of them are "Lights and Shadows of Freemasonry," "Code of Masonic Law," "Freemasonry in the Holy Land," "Works on Numismatics," "Masonic Odes and Poems." In the latter he appears to have been especially gifted, because throughly enlisted in and subscribing to the tenets of the great lights of the mystic tie, and in the careful study of that light his richest efforts have been given to the craft and the world. Among them may be mentioned: "The Level and the Square."

"There is a world where all are equal; We are hurrying toward it fast, We shall meet upon the level there; When the gates of death are passed; We shall stand before the orient, And our Master will be there, To try the lucas we offer with his own unerring square." "The Letter G," "Where Good Never Dies," "The Straight and Narrow Way," "Being Dead yet Living," "The True Corner Stone," and many others, all of such a character and coming from a warm and brotherly heart that we find the sprig growing a fresh in our own hearts as we study them. Then, brothers, let us study the same great light and seek for the same inspiration. We quote from Dr. Morris' poem "Brotherly Love": "By one God created, by one savior saved, by one spirit lighted, by one mark engraved. We're taught in the wisdom of his approval, To cherish the spirit of brotherly love. By one God created, come, brothers, 'tis day; By one God created, brothers, away; With beauty and wisdom and strength in to appear, Let's toil while there's labor in brotherly love. Surely a great and distinguished brother has passed to the shores beyond. Let us be faithful. W. ALBANY, Aug. 9, 1888.

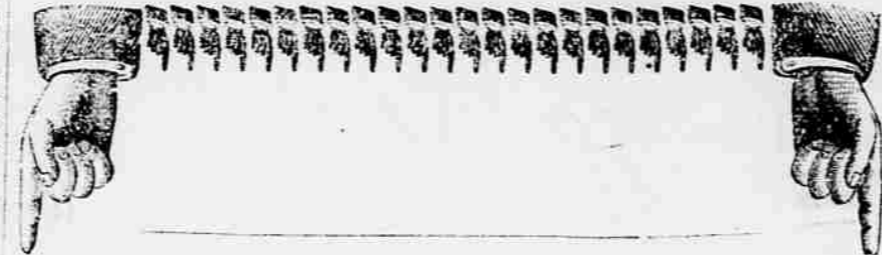
