EFFRONTERY OUTDONE.

Satan pretending to preach the gospel is certainly outvalled by Hon. Dan Voorhees of Indiana talking to greenbackers to induce them to vote against Harrison. Anyone whose memory reaches back to the time when the greenback was first provided for, or has studied the history of the legislative action to secure funds to enable the government to carry on the struggle for national existence, will recognize the bold effrontery and double-faced charlatanism of Voorhees' language when he made the recent speech in Indiana that contained this extract: "The republican conspiracy to hasten the fangs of the money power in the struggling body of American labor, and to enable gigantic usury and legalized robbery to suck the blood of every American industry, took its first great step when, in authorizing legal-tender currency in 1862, the greenback, the immortal and glorious greenback, was discriminated against, and degraded in the money markets of the world by being made non-receivable for duties on imports and for interest on the bonded debt of the United States. In all the annals of nations no financial measure was ever more willfully wicked in conception, and design more far reaching, oppressive and destructive to the rights of labor in all its results than this."

Voorhees was among the opposers of the greenback from first to last, and voted for the very objectionable features that he now attempts to palm off on the republicans. As a further pointer upon this same greenback subject, which Voorhees is now trying to use as a partisan lever for his side of the house, it may not be amiss to refer to the fact that the greenback legal tender decision, that helped to place that money of the poor man upon a par with the best circulating medium of the world, was made under direct republican influence, and was fought to the very end by the democratic influence of the then supreme court as represented by Justice Field in his minority report. Not only that but that fight against the usefulness of the greenback and its standing in the world's commercial marts, as far as legal decisions are concerned, is still carried on and schemed for in democratic circles, as is shown by the appointment of Chief Justice Fuller, one of whose chief commendable qualifications in democratic eyes and disqualifications among republicans, was his pronounced objections to the legal tender decision, and the prospects that he would help to reverse said decision. Most certainly this attempt of Senator Voorhees to gain prestige by referring to the greenback he has always attempted to destroy, and still arrays himself against, as the "immortal and glorious greenback" out Herods, Herod, out Satans Satan, and is a representation of the most monumental cheek ever given in the annals of political chicanery.

THE FRUIT BUSINESS.

To take advantage of all of the favorable conditions, and make the most of all the opportunities requires a careful study of those conditions and opportunities. The tillers of the soil of the Willamette valley are just at present looking after the unexampled facilities to cultivate fruit in this locality, as a more profitable occupation than raising cereals alone. As a pointer as to what is being done in that direction, the Railway Review calls attention to the growing import-

ance of the fruit traffic upon lines in all parts of the country. The distances to which fruit can now be transported by means of refrigerator cars, and the faster time by express freight trains have placed the perishable products of many different sections of the country in markets covering a wide extent. The California fruit business, for instance, has reached such an extent that at the daily auction sales held at Chicago from ten to fifteen cars are disposed of. Purchasers at these sales reship generally by express to all parts of the country. The Delaware peach crop is reported as being this year largely in excess of any former crop. This means that many carloads will be shipped West as far as the Missouri River. These samples, taken from the fast-growing fruit and vegetable traffic, between different sections of the country, show how widely varying the various classes of traffic are that are handled by the roads, and also, how ready means of communication and prompt shipment of products give a National extent to classes of industry which were formerly considered only local. In order, however, to reap the advantages that this great activity in the fruit business indicates, it is necessary that the conditions be understood and requirements be met. The kind of fruit to cultivate must be selected with reference to its marketable qualities, and quantities commanding a shipping consideration must be produced. Without doubt, if the conditions are intelligently met, a paying market will be found for all of the fruit that can be produced in this valley. Such fruit will be in demand, and all that is needed is to put it in the right market in an attractive form.

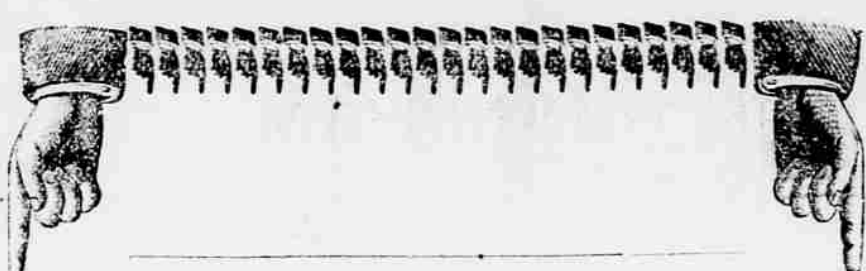

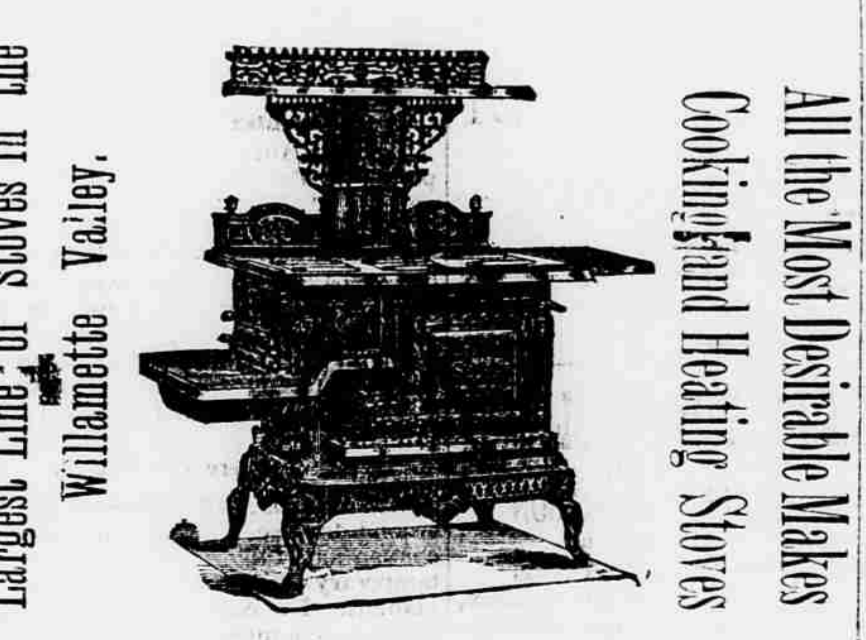
