G. W. Simpson was over to Munkers' warehouse yesterday, looking after the management of that place, which is under his control. He reports vast quantities of oats in that section, and says they are yielding from 40 to 80 bushels per acre. Oats are worth 25 cents in this market and Mr. Simpson was paying the same in Munkers.

The drowning of the messenger boy James Connelly, Tuesday evening at the foot of A street in Portland, while in bathing, adds another to the long list of sad accidents of that nature that has occurred this season. It was purely accidental, and has accelerated the matter of starting a free bathing house in the metropolis, where such accidents will be carefully guarded against in the future.

A Fine for Belated Hails. The Evening Telegram says: It will be an item of news to the public to learn that the government may impose a fine upon a railway company whenever one of its mail trains is behind time. Every company holding mail contracts is compelled to make out and forward to the department at Washington a regular quarterly report. The fine is fixed by the head of that department which has control of such contracts, and varies in amount according to the length of time the train is overdue. If the mail is late at Portland for two or three hours, the company which carries it may be liable to a fine of two or three hundred dollars.

Hard Fall. The little six-year-old son of Lon Young yesterday evening, fell from the porch roof to the ground. He was badly bruised but not materially hurt and no bones were broken. A remarkable escape considering the distance fallen.

AN INTERESTING LAND CASE.

A Special Bill to Relieve an Oregon Woman of a Technical Disability.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The committee on public lands, at its meeting to-day, authorized Representative Herrmann to report favorably the bill confirming title to Mary Alice White Ogden of The Dalles land district. While a single woman she pre-empted a tract of land, improved, resided on and cultivated it the full period required by law, and then married. Immediately thereafter she made final proof and payment for the land, and a certificate was issued to her by the local land officers, they informing her that having complied with the law, her marriage would not disqualify her to make proof. The interior department has held her claim for cancellation, on the ground that under the law she became disqualified as a pre-emptor by her marriage. Mr. Herrmann seeks to relieve her of the legal disability occasioned by her marriage through a special land bill, which the committee favors.

Mighty Fine Peaches in Town.

The Oregonian says: There is a remarkably fine display of peaches around town of Oregon growth. As a dealer said yesterday there are more Oregon peaches this year than in all the years before, and better ones. They come in quantities from all parts of the state. Some were received yesterday from Milwaukee which for size and color have never been excelled here, except perhaps by some from Vancouver. There is no trouble in raising peaches here if proper cultivation is given the orchards. Peaches are coming in large quantities. Farmers bring them by the wagon load in bulk, packed in layers of hay, with hay on top over which boards are tightly tied down to keep the contents of the wagon from bouncing around and being bruised. This is the best way yet devised for bringing fruit to market in bulk. Peaches are selling for from 14 to 15 cents per pound.

Went to the Front.

A man who had accumulated some coin in the harvest field, came into the city yesterday and invested in tangie foot until his judgment went into abeyance. He then wandered up to the depot, exhibiting considerable belligerence towards the passengers who were boarding the evening train, continuing the same on the street later in the evening when he was given a night's lodging in the calaboose. In the morning having sobered off he was sensible enough to be ashamed, and promised to go to the front to work upon the railroad if set at liberty, which Marshal Hayes concluded to do, keeping careful cognizance of him until the promise was fulfilled.

They run some distance, dragging him and bruising him terribly. He lay in the field until about 11 o'clock at night, when he was found and took to his home, but was hurt so bad that on Sunday he died. He leaves a wife and several children. They have the sympathy of the entire community.

Irwin Re-Appointed as Steward of the Insane Asylum.

SALEM, Aug. 15.—The vexed question of the stewardship of the insane asylum was to-day settled by the re-appointment of W. J. Irwin, former steward, who resigned the position last December owing to the fact that he was the bone of contention between Gov. Penneyer and Supt. Lane. Since then two stewards have been appointed and have failed to give satisfaction. Irwin is a republican. It is understood that the governor has no objection now to the appointment.
