OUR COUNTRY'S MARKETS.

In his recent speeches, General Harrison not only declared himself in favor of preserving the American markets for American producers, but also in favor of extending our foreign trade by closer commercial relations with the Central and South American republics and governments. "And what," he asked, "is essential to that end? Regular mails are the first condition of commerce. What we need is the establishment of American steamship lines between our ports and those of Central and South America. Then it will be no longer necessary that an American minister, commissioned to an American state, shall take an English ship to Liverpool there to find another English ship that shall carry him to his destination. We are not to be frightened by the use of that ugly word 'subsidy.' We must pay to American steamships a liberal compensation for carrying our mails instead of turning them over to British tramp steamships." And again there was "great applause," as was fit to the expression of such truly national sentiment. General Harrison's idea is the Republican idea, which, had it not been obstructed by Democratic majorities in congress, would have saved to this nation the \$150,000,000 which it has paid within the past few years to foreign ships that have carried its mails, its freights, and its passengers, and which would have added other millions to its wealth by development of trade with countries that are comparatively near to us geographically, and for the most part, akin to us in political structure. The National policy of preserving the market of this Republic to the citizens of this Republic, and of extending our foreign trade by American vessels, and in a direction which will make us the suppliers instead of the purchasers, the manufacturers instead of the recipients of foreign manufacturers, has never been more boldly expressed than by General Harrison.

The congressional investigation into the immigration matters, has brought to the surface a mass of facts that are truly startling. The New York Times finds that "last year there came to this country more than 43,000 Italians. In the first six months of this year the number of those who came was 35,650. The testimony taken by the committee tends to show that a majority of these immigrants were brought here practically under contract to compete with American laborers at low wages. They are willing to work for low wages, because they require very little support life. They are content to subsist on the coarsest food, or even on refuse, and to be lodged under conditions which are repulsive to the ordinary American workman. They do not intend to become citizens or to remain here. They propose to send out of the country the money which they can save in a term of three or four years. They are the Chinese of our Eastern States." If congress wishes to legislate for the benefit of the country, let it adopt some measures looking to the abatement of this truly dangerous condition of affairs.

EXPERIMENT, close study and persevering investigation, are the means used to establish the facts of science, and the casual reader scarcely realizes the labor and research that must be expended to develop the fact that he nonchalantly takes in with his coffee while reading his morning paper. For

instance the determination of the figure of the earth is one of the objects of pendulum observations. The force with which bodies attract each other depends on the quantity of matter in them and their distance apart. Places on the earth, therefore, which have an excess of matter, either from the material being of greater volume, or of greater density, will show a corresponding increase of the force of gravity; and placed near the pole, from their being nearer the center of the earth, would be expected to show a variation in the force of gravity in the same direction. Hence gravity determinations made at different points, starting from the equator and going toward the poles, will show the relative distance from the center, and from this, with the aid of Clairant's theorem, the shape of the earth.

The wonders of the American inventive genius continue to multiply. One of the latest is said to enable persons who are unable to resist the pleasure of reading in railway cars, and who, in consequence, endanger their eyesight by dependence upon the meager lamplight furnished by the railroad companies, to obtain portable electric lights, arranged to hang upon a biton of one's coat, and with a parabolic reflector to concentrate the light. The storage battery for this lamp weighs only 1 1/2 pounds.

The loss of the steamer Geiser and disablement of Thingvalla, off Sable island by collision adds another heartrending accident to the long list of ocean disasters. It happened on Tuesday, and one hundred and five lives were lost, in killed and drowned. Science should push human invention until disasters of this kind are impossible. Study and invention in that direction would be much more commendable and humane than employed, as it is present in, in devising warlike means to take human lives.

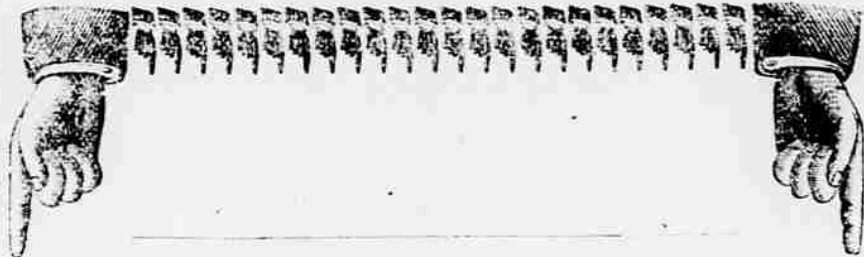

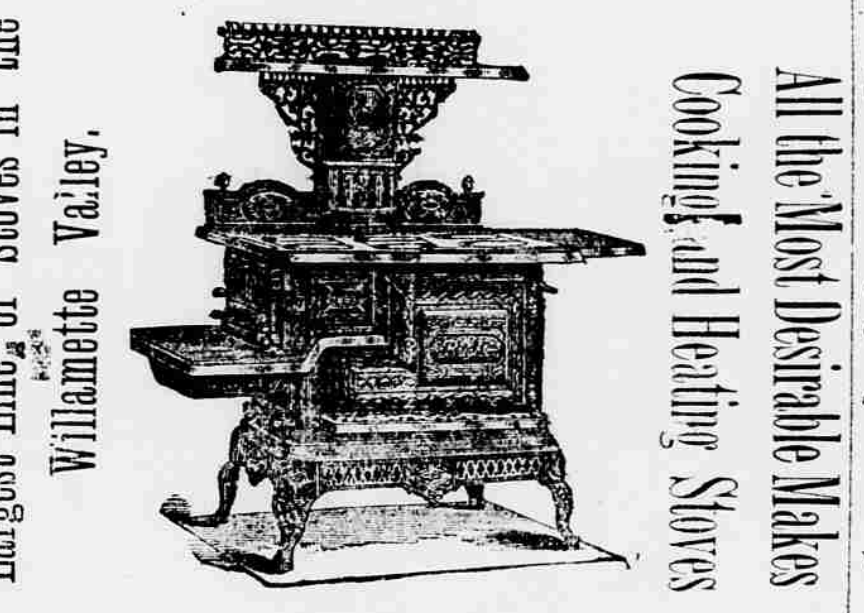
