PRETENDED SOLICITUDE.

The Pacific Farmer consumes several columns, in a political harangue, to prove that farmers would receive ten cents per bushel more for their wheat, if the ships were allowed to bring Belgian brick, coal, cement, salt or goods, free of duty to this coast as ballast, when coming for cargoes of wheat, but utterly fails, because of its inability to grasp but a one sided partisan view, and its total disregard of truth in its eagerness to make an argument. It admits that the admission of bricks free of duty, would displace brick makers, but claims that they would secure work upon buildings, that the plithora of brick would come to be erected, at higher wages, which theory is pure sophistry, as they are not skilled workmen, and therefore they would have to resort to wheat raising to support themselves, thus increasing the surplus wheat and reducing the price. That is the principle in a nut shell, and the Farmer knows it and is unmitigatedly dishonest when it attempts any other argument.

If the bringing of cargoes in the shape of ballast could be applied to the reduction of the price of charters, there would be something in the matter of inducing cargoes, but such is not the case, as charter rates are always made just as high as the traffic will bear, irrespective of every other consideration. The recent experience when charter rates advanced just as fast as the price of wheat rose, is an illustration of this fact and positive proof in that direction.

We mention above that the Farmer is untruthful, which is a fact not only in its arguments but in its innuendoes and insinuations. It accuses us of crawling a thing we never yet have had, and never expect to have occasion to do. It also says we claim to be the organ of the grange which is false; the grange in this jurisdiction has not and never had an authorized organ. We have labored and expect to continue to labor, consistently conscientiously, and faithfully in the interests of the laboring and farming community of the country, for our interests are identical with theirs. But we are publishing a political newspaper and in that capacity it is our imperative duty as well as privilege to discuss political issues. The Farmer claims to be a purely non-political farm journal, yet it steps aside from its claimed sphere, and under cover of specious solicitude for farmers—promulgates its political misrepresentation of facts to further its ends in that direction. Its influence will not be enhanced by such proceedings.

RELIGIOUS DISCUSSION.

It has been announced that Rev. Clark Braden, of Ravenna, Ohio, and B. F. Underwood, editor of the Boston Investigator, have agreed to indulge in a religious discussion at Silverton, Marion Co., for a money consideration on the side of the declared winner. The worse than uselessness of such discussions has been demonstrated long ago, and enlightened common sense, and a tolerance for our fellow creatures sacred beliefs should have rendered them impossible years ago.

The following from the Telegram expresses more in a concise form than is often found:

"Of all the prodigious, strife-engendering, bitterness-producing, combinations on earth, the discussion of opposing beliefs and dogmas bears off the palm. One need listen to the most pronounced thinker, whether he be a devout

churchman or a scouting unbeliever, but a very short time before being convinced of the meagerness of his knowledge of things beyond our mortal sight. His belief may be strong, and the logic which he brings to his support may be profound and searching, but, after all, we are oppressed with the thought that his proclaimed knowledge is rather the assumption of belief than his belief the result of knowledge. And when all has been said the human mind comes gratefully back to its own conviction, unshaken, except by the element in every human soul that yearns for a perpetuity of existence, perhaps, that the end is not here.

Human hands that are too weak to cling to the iron creed of the Calvinist, and human hearts that are too tender and hopeful to accept the final edict of the materialist, find neither help nor encouragement in the statement of these profound beliefs, that in their clothing discover more of the temper of those who bred them than of their knowledge of things unseen.

Whittier touches a responsive chord in the human heart, when he says:

"I walk with bare hushed feet the ground I tread with boldness shod; I dare not fly with mate and bound The love and power of God."

And when he reviews the field of argument and beliefs in summing up declares:

"I only know I cannot do it Beyond His love and care."

he discovers a simplicity of faith that has in it more of the elements of satisfaction and consolation than are contained in the essence of the most profound logic that human reason ever evolved."
