CHEESE AND BUTTER FACTORY.

A California Gentleman Wants a Bonus of \$5000 to Start an Extensive Creamery.

Mr. C. E. Smith, of San Jose, California, has been in this city several days for the purpose of investigating the matter of starting an extensive creamery for the manufacture of butter and cheese near this city. He has been engaged in this business for a number of years and is thoroughly conversant with the business.

He proposes to purchase a farm of 600 acres and stock it with cows. This he says will cost \$20,000 which he will invest himself. He proposes to do this if the business men of Albany will raise a bonus of \$5000 to assist him in erecting buildings and to assist in paying for the plant. Mr. Smith had a conversation yesterday with Mr. S. E. Young, president of the Albany Board of Trade, and the matter will come up at the next meeting of that body. He went to Eugene last night, but will return in a few days to see what can be done concerning the matter.

He states that an establishment of the extent he proposes to run would employ a number of families besides offering a market for milk and would supply a first-class quality of butter for the trade. A first-class creamery is badly needed in Linn county, and will no doubt prove a paying enterprise. The principal question is whether or not the citizens will consider it advisable to pay a bonus of \$5000 for it.

RIFLES FOR THE NATIONAL GUARD.

Adj. Gen. J. C. Shofner, O. N. G., has just received 165 of the latest pattern Springfield rifles from the Ordnance Department at Benicia, Cal. They are Oregon's quota of arms under the law which provides for arming the national guard. Gen. Shofner will give forty-five of the rifles to the First regiment, forty to the Second and eighty to the Third. At first it was intended not to give any to the First regiment, but Col. Beebe made a request for a number in order to facilitate target practice, as the sights are great improvement on those of the old guns. Forty-five of the guns now held by the First will be sent to the Third to make up for the deficiency.

About Wheat.

The wheat market had been a little down for a few days until yesterday when the price in this city advanced again to 75 cents. The tone of the market is hopeful, and wheat is firm at this price. In New York and Liverpool the markets are reported firm and altogether the wheat outlook is encouraging. Seventy-five cents is considerably above the ruling price for several years and many farmers will doubtless sell at this figure rather than risk the fluctuation of the market. It is to say the least a fair price for wheat.
