INDIANA AND NEW YORK. Since the nominations in the presidential contest were made, a great deal of interest has been centered in these two states, but if we can credit well authenticated reports from the East it is not over-stating the case to say that within the past few weeks the interest has begun to diminish, as it has grown more and more certain that both had left the rank of doubtful states and were headed straight for the republican camp.

It is sure that every recent indication is strongly in favor of both Indiana and New York casting their electoral votes for Harrison and Morton. A dispatch from New York says that Colonel Brice, chairman of the national democratic committee, has had made a secret poll of the two states mentioned, with a view of publishing the result; but that he has concluded to defer such publication, inasmuch as the report of his agents shows that the chances are decidedly against the democratic party in both states.

In confirmation of this is another dispatch depicting the gloom which hangs around the democratic headquarters in New York, which is described as being so thick that it can be cut with a knife.

Mr. Thurman has intimated to the party managers, it is said, that they are wasting time and money in trying to accomplish anything in the Northwest, and that the best thing to do is to concentrate their forces on New York.

Some wagers have been laid at long odds that Cleveland will carry a single Northern state, and it begins to look as though he would lose at least the two most important of these. What Northern state can the democratic party claim with positiveness? New Jersey and Connecticut will not destroy their home industries to re-elect Mr. Cleveland, and if Indiana and New York go republican, as the the outlook now indicates, where will Mr. Cleveland find his much wanted strength in the electoral college.

EDITORIAL NOTES. Our dispatches this morning bring the intelligence of the destruction of \$1,000,000 worth of cotton in the South by floods. It is such things as this and the cyclones and extreme weather in the East and North that is driving thousands of homeseekers to Oregon. Good crops, a mild climate, a fertile soil and an abundance of fruit are some of the allurements offered to our Eastern brethren.

There is a growing disposition among horsemen that the races of the Oregon State Fair ought to be exclusively for Oregon horses, except in the free for all races. As it is now arranged Eastern horses can come in disguised and sweep nearly every purse in the 40 and 50 classes. A state fair ought certainly to offer inducements for raising and training our home horses.

The fifteenth biennial session of the Oregon legislature which will assemble this winter will contain 72 republicans and 18 democrats. There will be 51 republican representatives and 9 democrats; 21 republican senators and 9 democrats.

TEMPERANCE NOTES.

Contributed by the W. C. T. U. The growing evil of cigarette-smoking by boys is one which ought to be counteracted in every possible way. The Youth's Companion states that near its office is a boys' school; that "the bright young fellows troop into it every morning with their books in a strap and give each other jolly greetings as they meet; that as they come out of school a few hours later, many of them stop at the door, pull out their bunch of cigarettes, from which one is selected, and then start away, puffing the smoke from their mouth and nostrils;" and it adds: "The use of tobacco in any form is bad enough, and it is a constant wonder why it is that nearly every boy smokes at least once in his life. But cigarette smoking is regarded by those who know of what material the cigarette is made, as the most objectional and injurious way in which the poisonous weed can be used." In several states laws have been passed against the sale of cigarettes and tobacco to minors under sixteen; but to a large extent they are a dead letter. There are too many adult smokers among the men whose duty it is to enforce the statutes. If the father smokes the boy will if he can. Against the tobacco, as the drink evil, example and precept go hand in hand.
