LOCAL NEWS.

Our Usual Budget of News in Paragraphs.

RAILROAD TO SANTIAM MINES.

A Proposed Line from this City to this Mining District.

"Men interested in the Santiam mines have already begun to discuss the advisability of not indeed the necessity of a railroad into that mineral region. The plan is wholly practicable, as all who have looked into the matter have been convinced."

"The distance from Lebanon on the O. & C. and from Scio on the narrow gauge, to a central point among the mines on the north fork of the south fork of the river, is about forty miles from either place. In that forty miles there is only 1000 feet rise to be overcome which is really no obstacle. The first twenty miles would be through the fertile Sweet Home valley, from which an immense amount of agricultural produce would be sent to the main line, so the road to the mines would be self-sustaining from the start."

"It is generally considered the narrow gauge, if free to act, would be the better line to build the branch. The cost at a fair estimate is put at about \$5000 a mile. This time next year there will be large and constant shipments of ore ready for transportation which, in the meantime, will go to Rock Creek to meet the O. P., which road will be running to Rock Creek in six weeks."

"A branch to the mines is well worth consideration. The branch suggested would go right to the center of two large groups of mines already under active development and be about equi-distant from each."

The above is taken from the Oregonian of the 8th inst. This question has been under discussion for some time by certain business men of this city who are interested in the Santiam mines. There is no probability, however, of the line being built by the narrow gauge. Considerable capital will be invested by Albany men in these mines this fall, and should their ledges prove as rich as they have reason to believe they will, this mining district will without doubt receive a big boom, and a railroad from this city to the mines will become a necessity."

F. Company's New Armory.

The new armory of F. Co., on Second street is nearly completed. It will be elegantly finished inside and will be the largest room in the city being 40x100 feet. The armory is provided with a neat gun rack, dressing rooms, etc., and will be a fine drill room. It will be dedicated with a grand ball on Sept. 14. This will undoubtedly be the finest entertainment of the kind ever given in Albany and is impatiently looked forward to by all lovers of dancing. A large number from Corvallis, Salem, Eugene and smaller places will also be present. And several regimental and staff officers are expected to attend. The music, which is the best to be had in the state, has been selected with a view to filling the large hall thoroughly and will consist of more pieces than is usual. Invitations have been mostly issued and tickets are on sale at G. L. Blackman's drug store and other places. Arrangements will be made for those who so desire to get a good supper at reasonable prices. No tickets will be sold to spectators and all gentlemen attending are expected to purchase regular tickets. By securing your tickets at some of the stores a rush at the armory door will be avoided. COMING NEXT SATURDAY.

Race Notes.

Owners of horses which have been entered in three of the trotting races at the coming fair are considerably perturbed over the record which Col. Bradshaw, a four-year-old owned by Col. C. G. Bradshaw, of Butte, Montana, has been making during the past season. Last spring when Bradshaw had no record he paid his first entrance money in the races for the 2:50, 2:40, and 2:30 classes, being eligible for entrance in all. But it now transpires that the Montana horse has developed remarkable speed. About two weeks since he won a race in Montana in 2:22. This is remarkable time for a four-year-old, and those who were to be his competitors on the Salem track have very good reason to think that they won't stand much of a show beside Bradshaw, and they threaten to refuse to pay their second entrance money, due next Monday. If they do, of course Bradshaw will have a walk-over for the three purses. But his believed his owner will have generosity enough to withdraw from at least the 2:40 and 2:50 races, and make the contest more even. If Bradshaw declines to withdraw, special races will be gotten up, and the other horses entered will trot away. The phenomenal colt belonging to Mosier's stables, which last Sunday made a mile in 2:48, has become lame, and has been sent into pasture. But there are other colts on the ground that are probably as fast as Mosier's. An enthusiastic Salem sportsman spends all his spare time at the fair grounds, declares that Von Tromp the other day made a mile in 2:22.—Salem Statesman.

ALBANY'S WATER SUPPLY.

Willamette Water Would be Preferable to the Santiam Ditch and Calapoia.

The present water supply furnished by the water works is taken partly from the Santiam canal and partly from the Calapoia. This does not furnish water possessing that degree of purity or freshness that would render it desirable for household purposes. The water of the canal at this season of the year is almost warm enough to supply the place of a hot bath, while the water of the Calapoia is absolutely impure and unfit to be used, if the germs of malaria and disease are to be shunned.

This leads to the question of the advisability of changing the source of the supply to the Willamette river, or at least boycotting the murky water of the Calapoia. The Willamette is much clearer and colder than either the Santiam ditch or the Calapoia, although the canal water is probably pure enough if the supply was taken entirely from it.

There is a feeling among the citizens of Albany that the city should own the water works. The present owner, Mr. John Crawford, desires to sell, and if the city could be bonded for the purchase of the water works and the entire canal water power the condition of affairs would be bettered, and the city would probably be in little danger of losing by the purchase.

STATE DISPATCHES.

News Items from the State Capital—Wheat Worth 75 Cents in Salem.

Special to the Herald.—Salem, Sept. 8.—Mrs. Eliza Cox, a well known Marion county pioneer and widow of Joseph Cox, was stricken with paralysis yesterday morning and is now lying at point of death at her home in this city.

Change of Venue to Marion.

A change of venue has been granted from part 2, state circuit court for Multnomah county to Marion county in the suit of G. Cohn & Bro., vs. M. Peyser and the Northwest Fire and Marine Insurance Co., garnishee. The change was made at the request of the insurance company, which pleaded the inconvenience of the witnesses attending court in Portland, as most of them live near Salem. Peyser's store in this city was burned some time ago, and the Northwest company, in which he had a policy, refused to pay the money, claiming that the fire was of incendiary origin. G. Cohn & Bro., of Portland, were creditors of Peyser and began suit for the amount of the policy.

GENERAL NEWS.

The Reported Outrages in China Thought to Be True.

UPRISING IN INDIAN TERRITORY.

A Million Dollars Worth of Cotton Destroyed by Floods in the South-Eastern States.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—While the state department has received no official intelligence of the rumored attack by the natives on the American consul at Canton, Assistant Secretary of State Rives said to-day he saw no reason to doubt the truth of this statement. There has been a feud in Canton, growing out of the treaty trouble. Nothing can be said as to the details of the affair, but such things have happened before and are likely to happen again.

DISTRICTIVE FLOODS.

A Million Dollars Worth of Cotton Destroyed in South Carolina.

COLUMBIA, (S. C.), Sept. 8.—It has rained daily here for ten days. The Congaree, Broad and the Saluda rivers are greatly swollen. Vast tracts of cotton fields are inundated. The loss will be over a million dollars.

COUNTERFEITERS ARRESTED.

A Mother, Two Sons and Three Daughters in the Toils.

EDWARDSVILLE, Sept. 8.—Authorities have captured a gang of expert counterfeiters. A family named Russell, consisting of a mother, two sons and three daughters, and a full counterfeiting outfit was captured, together with a bucketful of spurious \$5 gold pieces, of which they made a specialty. They also worked in connection with the counterfeiters of paper money.

REVOLVING CRIME.

A Woman Found Butchered in a Horrible Manner.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—A horribly mutilated body of a lewd woman was found early this morning in the yard attached to a common lodging house in Spitalfields. Her throat was cut from ear to ear, her body ripped open, her bowels and heart lying on the ground and a portion of her entrails tied around her neck. This is the fourth murder of a similar character committed recently in this neighborhood. All the victims were women of the lowest character. The authors of the atrocities remain undiscovered. The excitement in the vicinity borders upon a panic.

DAKOTA DEMOCRATS.

The Row in the Camp—Charges Against Governor Church.

GRAND FORKS (Dakota), Sept. 8.—The committee appointed by the Day faction of the two-headed democratic territorial convention has completed its work, and will send formal charges against Governor Church to the president some time this month. The governor is charged with caucus packing and illegal methods to secure control of the territorial convention of the use of his veto power to intimidate people, of appointing persons unfit to hold office, of illegally appropriating notary fees to his own use, of violating military laws, of squandering the proceeds of stock indemnity funds, and of bad management of the publication of laws of the territory. The charges are supported by affidavits.

Robbery Near Peoria.

A newsmen named Baldwin, as he was returning home from Peoria at a late hour Friday night, was stopped by three highwaymen, who robbed him of \$140. One young man living in the neighborhood was arrested and taken to Shedd last night, on suspicion of being one of the robbers. It is said that Baldwin was partially intoxicated.

New York, Sept. 8.—The statement of the associated banks shows \$11,646,625 in excess of the legal requirements. Bar silver, 92½ cents.

ARKANSAS PROHIBITIONISTS.

What Chairman Palmer says—Trouble in Indian Territory.

St. Louis, Sept. 8.—J. L. Palmer, chairman of the Arkansas prohibition state executive committee, says that forty counties of Arkansas have gone against license. The returns were carried away from the precincts which have large prohibition majorities.

The election troubles in Indian Territory, have broken out afresh. The Chickasaw nation election, resulted in the election of Gov. Guy, by a majority of 14. The corruption and manipulation of the returns are changed on both sides and danger of tribal war has been so great that Indian agent Owens has gone to Fishmoning, where the council is in session.

COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 8.—The Arizona Post of Grand Army arrived this morning in time to take a part in the re-union. California posts will arrive this afternoon.
