AN ARMY EXPEDITION.

Two Companies of Infantry on a Trip of Exploration to Yaquina.

There arrived in Portland Saturday forenoon from Vancouver two companies, E and H, of the Fourth-teeth infantry, a detachment of cavalry and two pieces of artillery. The party is composed of about one hundred men and is attended by four wagons, an ambulance and thirty horses and mules.

Col. McCombe, Capt. Kilbourne, assistant surgeon U. S. A., and Lieut's Hasson, Masten, Eastman, Best and Todd are the officers in charge of the expedition.

This is to be the most extensive trip that has yet been taken by the soldiers. They will visit all the principal places on the west side, making their turning point at Yaquina bay. Last year the expedition passed through Linn county and proceeded up the east side. The party expects to be gone about thirty days, and the object of their trip is to acquaint themselves with the coast country and the lines of march leading to and along it.

Col. McCombe, in reference to this, said: "Really there is not enough actual knowledge possessed by the military forces of the topography of the coast country, and it is desired to get them so well acquainted with that district that they would not be lost if necessity called them there. I do not suppose that their services are apt to be needed very soon, of course, but there are a great many advantages to be gained by such a trip. The party will camp out every night and march all the way, so the men will have a chance to learn what some of the inconveniences of a soldier's life are."

A Queer Wager. According to an article that appeared in the Jacksonville Lung and Liver Cure, a prominent democrat bought 1,200 head of sheep at a price, on contract, of \$1,200 and in case Harrison is elected will pay \$1,200 more. The Harrison man when asked why he should sell on those terms, stated that if Mr. Cleveland was elected, he considered he had received a good compensation for his sheep, but if Mr. Harrison was elected, the democrat could afford to pay the balance, \$1,200. The Yaquina Fishermen's Trouble. A gentleman from Yaquina states that the striking salmon fishermen at Yaquina still hold out for higher wages. They held a meeting Saturday night, and decided not to fish for less than 3 cents per pound for whole fish and 4 1/2 cents for dressed fish. The cannery of Baker & Hays has acceded to the demands of the fishermen, and Sunday night 20 boat loads of fine salmon were brought in at 3 cents. The other canneries offer only 25 cents each for silver-side salmon and 50 cents for Chinook. They say they will procure fishermen from abroad and defend their boats with Winchester rifles if necessary, the union fishermen having threatened to put a stop to any fishing by non-union men.

Horse Thieves Captured. Sheriff Combs, of Crook county, has received word from Jas. Slater, who had gone in search of Rufus Smith and a man named Reed, charged with stealing horses from T. B. James, that he had overtaken them at Siuslaw and had them in the custody of the sheriff of Lane county. Mr. Combs started Thursday morning after the prisoners. Smith is the fellow mentioned in the Herald two weeks ago as having left the country with horses belonging to Mr. James. He will probably be given a term in the penitentiary in which to reflect over his ungrateful act.

INSANE WOMAN DROWNED.

The Sad Death of a Mother While Suffering from Temporary Aberration.

The Salem Statesman of Sunday says: About 2 o'clock this morning a message was brought to the Statesman office that Mrs. W. D. Wheeler, wife of the former Court street butcher, had left the home of her father, Mr. Brown, on the corner of Mill and Winter streets, while temporarily insane, and had drowned herself. A reporter went to the scene of the tragedy and found the facts as follows: About ten days ago Mrs. Wheeler gave birth to a child, and since that time she has been insane, and has constantly required the effort of several parties to keep her from carrying out a threat to destroy her life. About 10 o'clock last night she quieted down and went to sleep, so that her watchers relaxed their vigilance.

About 12 o'clock she was missed from her room, and a search party was immediately organized. At about twenty minutes to 2 o'clock her body was found lying in Mill creek, close to the bank, a few feet from the Winter-street bridge. Her head was barely covered with water, and it is thought she was killed by the fall on to the rocks. She was clad only in a night robe and hose, and had no doubt left home while insane, and in her wanderings had fallen over the bank. Dr. Jessup was immediately summoned, and did all in his power to resuscitate her, but without avail. She was about 38 years of age, and leaves a husband and several children, among them the young babe.

On the Oregon Pacific: Track-laying on A. Brink's contract has been suspended for a few days on account of a piece of rock work. This cut is now finished and track-laying will at once be commenced again. The completion of this cut leaves 25 miles of level grading, requiring only the laying of ties and rails to complete the road. The work is being vigorously pushed all along the line.

It Is Derailed Near Red Bluff and Reaches This City Twelve Hours Late.
