ACCIDENT ON THE O. P.

Two Italian Laborers Blown Up by Premature Explosion in Blasting.

Yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock as two Italian laborers were tampering down a charge of powder in a piece of rock work on the Oregon Pacific this side of Melama the blast exploded prematurely. One of the men was blown about twenty feet into the air, and received injuries from which it is thought he cannot recover. Both eyes were put out and he was frightfully lacerated. The other man was severely powder-burned and wounded, but is not thought to be fatally injured. The men were taken on a special train to the company's hospital at Yaquina, passing through this city last evening.

F COMPANY'S BALL.

A Brilliant Affair at Their New Armory Last Night.

The ball given by F. Co. O. N. G. last night, on the occasion of the dedication of their new armory on Second street, was a brilliant affair. The hall was beautifully decorated with evergreens, flowers and pictures, and the brilliant electric lights, which

"Shone on fair women and brave men" as they tread the mazy round, over the smoothly polished floor, presented a pleasing picture.

About 70 couples participated in the dancing and many spectators were present. A number of young ladies and gentlemen attended from Salem and other towns. The ball was a very elite affair, and many elegant costumes were worn. Among the young gentlemen, both those of this city and from abroad, the uniforms of the Oregon National Guard predominated, and was quite proper at a military ball.

Fine music was furnished by Parson & Bray's orchestra, of Portland, and an elegant supper was served by the ladies of the Women's Relief Corps. Dancing was indulged in until the wee small hours, and it was by far the most brilliant and successful ball given in the city for many a day.

Salem Depot.

The elegant new depot building at Salem has been completed and yesterday section superintendents, Messrs. Enger and Spaight, went down with their men and the section crew from Jefferson to lay the tracks and switches. All of the tracks will be on one side of the depot, leaving the other side clear for the approaches of buses and vehicles.

THE SITTINGS LIBEL SUIT.

McGuire's Trial Postponed Until Thursday - The Facts of His Arrest.

H. P. McGuire, the proprietor of the Portland Sitings, who was arrested on a charge of criminal libel preferred by Chas. Casey, of this city, on account of the scurrilous items printed in that paper from its Albany correspondent, was arraigned in Justice Humphrey's court yesterday morning. Prosecuting Attorney H. H. Hewitt and W. R. Biven appeared for the state and J. K. Weatherford for the defendant. The attorneys for the state moved for a continuance until 1 o'clock. The defense objected, and a compromise was effected by postponing the case until Thursday, Sept. 20.

McGuire claimed that he was the owner of the concern, but was not the publisher and was not responsible for the matter the paper contained, but his actions while in this city indicated that he controlled the utterances of the paper, for on his arrival he invited Mr. Casey to his room at the hotel, and after trying to induce him to withdraw the charge, threatened to "burn him up, together with the rest of the town in next week's issue." Mr. Casey, of course, refused to do anything of the kind, and will let the law take its course.

Constable Burkhardt, while in Portland, arrested two other parties connected with the paper, one of whom, a man named Myers, made an affidavit that McGuire was proprietor of the paper and was responsible for its utterances, which McGuire stoutly denied, but claimed that the paper had changed hands since the appearance of the items referred to. It looks as if a change of proprietors was made to suit to the owners when they get in trouble.

McGuire refused to divulge the name of the Albany correspondent, and seemed to be trying to bluff the case off. He was evidently afraid of being roughly handled by the young men whom the paper had attacked, as he drove to Millers station in a buggy and took train there.

Constable Burkhardt left for Portland yesterday to subpoena witnesses in the case.

The First Shipment.

The steam schooner Mischief, Capt. Winant, arrived from Alsea on Tuesday, with the first shipment of the season's catch of salmon, bringing 1400 cases from the canneries of that place. The Mischief will at once depart for Siuslaw bay for a cargo of the same product.—Newport News.

Foot Race.

A foot race to be run at this city on the 23d inst., has been arranged between E. G. Cameron and Mr. Eoff, the Illinois sprinter, for \$100 on a side, one hundred yards. Fifty dollars has been put up by each racer as a forfeit in the hands of A. R. Pygall, the race to be between three and four o'clock.

Yaquina Harbor Improvement.

Work has been resumed on the government jetty at Yaquina. A large force of men are now at work, and piling is being driven across the gap that was made by the action of the tide last spring, and work on the north jetty is soon to commence.

THE FIREMEN.

Number One's New Steamer Appropriately Hoisted Yesterday Afternoon.

The new Clapp & Jones steam fire engine recently purchased for Albany Engine Co. No. 1 was received from the city yesterday afternoon and was hoisted with appropriate ceremonies.

At 1 o'clock the members of the company formed in procession at their hall and marched to the hall of Linn Engine Co. No. 2, when the engine was received from the city. A short presentation speech was delivered by Mayor J. L. Cowan, which was responded to by Henry Susens, foreman of the company.

The mayor and several of the county officers and citizens, preceded by the flag bearers, and followed by the firemen with the new steamer, decked with a beautiful wreath of flowers, presented by Mrs. J. F. Backensto, then marched up First street to Number 1's hall, when it was formally hoisted.

A short speech was delivered by Chief Engineer Jos. Webber, after which three cheers were given for Albany Engine Co. No. 1 and the Albany fire department and three cheers for the mayor and the city council. The crowd then dispersed. Albany has one of the best volunteer fire departments in Oregon, and it is now provided with superior fire apparatus, and will be equal to any emergency that may arise, whether it be a big or small conflagration.

LEBANON NOTES.

Town is steadily growing. The grist mill is finding plenty to do. The new Methodist church is nearing completion. Here is one more big fruit story. A two-year-old tree was set out last season, and this summer bore 83 pears, over fifty of them maturing.

Harvesting is about over, and farmers are hauling their grain from the fields, trying to decide whether to sell wheat now or to hold for 80 cents or more.

Strong hopes of a second mill race to run through town, being constructed by capitalists from California, are entertained. This would surely be followed by a paper mill, costing \$80,000. A great advantage to the place.

It is but four miles to Sodaville, and the writer drove over, for the first time drinking of the effervescent, natural water, which is quite pleasant and said to be conducive to health. It is mainly a summer resort, but has a good school house and a number of permanent inhabitants. The teacher is building himself a neat residence.

Not far from Lebanon, W. R. Cheadle has a splendid dairy, of over fifty blooded cows, from the cream of which he makes 200 lbs of cheese daily. He has 400 acres of pasture and 400 of arable land. Some thirty miles up the Santiam good bituminous coal has been discovered in large quantities, and it is hoped that the railroad from Albany to Lebanon will be extended far enough to justify the development of the mines.

The Fishermen's Strike.

The latest advices are to the effect that the situation remains the same between cannerymen and fishermen at Yaquina. The cannerymen offer 25 cents each for silver salmon, and 50 cents for Chinook, while the fishermen are standing out for 3 cents per pound. Several meetings have been held but as yet no satisfactory terms have been arranged and as a result the canneries are standing idle.

In the meantime a portion of the boats are employed in catching for the Portland market, to which place they are shipped fresh. Just how the matter will end it is impossible to say, but it looks very much as if the strike would be prolonged until the run of Chinook salmon is over, and the pack this year at Yaquina will be very light.

HOP PICKING.

Girls in Marion County Making \$1 50 a Day—Shipping Hops East.

Mr. Oscar Cone of Butteville baled fifteen bales of hops Wednesday, which is supposed to be the first lot baled in the state this season. Hop picking is still in progress in that section and there is a great demand for pickers.

Many of the yards employ white pickers, and girls are making \$1 50 a day. A gentleman who needed a girl for housework says he had to ride all over the country to find one and had to pay her \$1 50 per day.

There is also a great deal of barley raised around Butteville, and shippers from that section are now making arrangements to ship hops and barley East.

Hops are bringing good prices in California, but it is thought more can be realized by shipping them East.
