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GENERAL NEWS.

Reports from the Yellow Fever Sufferers.

SEVERE FLOODS IN NEW YORK.

Houses Swept Away and People in Distress—New York Items from the Old World.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—The secretary of the treasury has received the following telegram from Surgeon General Hamilton, at Camp Perry, Florida: "Mr. Percy has the yellow fever, contracted at McClenny. Three cases are reported at Gainesville, and there are rumors of cases at Melbourne and Ferndale. Refugees had great hardships on the special train, and the whole seaboard is alarmed on account of these refugees being in patrol at Hendersonville. I don't think it advisable to send any more special trains. The camp is in excellent condition, but needs enlarging. This is being done as rapidly as possible. Those here are comfortable and reasonably happy."

LONDON NOTES.

John Dillon Released—Murderer Arrested—Irish Riot.

LONDON, Sept. 18.—John Dillon, who is to appear before the Larnell commission at its next session, has been released on bail. Preparations are being made for a great demonstration on his arrival at Dublin.

The police have arrested a German named Ludwig, on suspicion of being the person who committed the recent mysterious murders at White Chapel.

A riot occurred yesterday among the inmates of the Irish immigrants' home at Glasgow. The rioters wrecked the house and fought desperately with the police. Sixty-five arrests have been made, and fifty-two rioters were today sentenced to one month's imprisonment each. The others were remanded.

SEVERE FLOODS.

Houses Carried Away by a Torrent of Swollen Waters.

PORT JERVAIS (N. J.), Sept. 19.—The heaviest rainfall in years occurred here yesterday and last night. Several streets are torn up and cellars flooded. People were taken from their houses by dogs this morning. Several small houses were carried into the Delaware river. The river is still rising.

Parliament Opened.

THE HAGUE, Sept. 18.—The parliament opened today. In consequence of sickness the king was unable to attend. A speech from the throne was read by Prime Minister Von Kaizersek. The government intends to present bills for the regulation of labor of children in factories and for mediation of the sugar tax.

Queen Natalie Again.

BERGRADE, Sept. 18.—The German and Austrian ministers at Bergrade have gone to Glischenberg, Austria, where King Milan is staying for the purpose of conferring with him, with reference to a settlement of the trouble between himself and Queen Natalie.

Political Gossip From the National Capital.

CIVIL SERVICE REFORM HURDLE.

The Chinese Restriction Bill Squabbles—Break the Treata-Cleveland's Letter.

Special Correspondence.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—Senator Hale's committee, which investigated the violations of the civil service reform law, met this morning to consider their report to the Senate. The report will clearly show many plain and intentional violations of both the letter and the spirit of this law.

The conferees on the fortification appropriation bill have reached an adjournment, and the bill, which is a compromise, was today reported to the House and Senate. The total amount of the appropriations carried by the bill as it stands now is \$3,972,000, and the provision providing for the expenditure of \$6,000,000 within three years for heavy guns.

Representative Bayne, of Pennsylvania, is enthusiastic over republican prospects, as indeed are most republicans here, particularly those who like Mr. Bayne, are warm personal friends of Chinaman Quay and are thus enabled to keep posted on the inside work of the campaign. Mr. Bayne gives good reasons for the expected victory in New York. He says: "In the first place, Mr. Harrison will get the votes of many republicans who voted against Mr. Blaine or did not vote at all in 1884; he will hold all the Irish votes that Blaine got, they are opposed to opening our markets to England; Another important element, the prohibition vote is going to be very small this year, not only in New York, but throughout the country. In 1884 it was said that there was no difference between the two great parties; that there was no issue. This led many earnest temperance people to declare what they thought the great issue should be, and they voted for prohibition. But these people have other interests. There is an issue—a very clear issue—this year, and most of them are deeply interested in it. As republicans they vote with us, and the loss to the prohibition vote will be gained for Harrison. I feel perfectly sure that we will carry New York, Indiana and Connecticut, and I believe that we will carry New Jersey and one or two southern States."

Representative Rowell, who has just returned from the West says that the expressed hopes of the eastern and southern democrats to carry Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, or Michigan will not be realized. On the contrary, Mr. Rowell thinks the republican votes in those states will this year be a gain on that of 1884. He also thinks the party will make congressional gains in the states mentioned.
