STATE DISPATCHES.

The Portland Express Robbers—The Portland News Case.

PORTLAND, Sept. 19.—Ben King, the youthful express robber, who, with Frank Andrews, was recently indicted for stealing the package of \$10,000 in gold, which the Commercial National Bank of this city had entrusted to the Pacific Express Company July 21st, for transportation to L. W. Case, at Astoria, was arraigned in Judge Stearns court yesterday for the opening of his trial.

THE WILCOX-McISAACS CASE.

In the criminal court this morning J. D. Wilcox and C. H. McIsaac were charged with attempt to extort \$1500 from Mrs. Dr. Frances Murray were arraigned on revised indictments. Mr. Wilcox requested till Friday to plead, and Mr. McIsaac, who came into the court room a few moments later, asked the same privilege, and no objection was made in either case.

The Small-Pox Epidemic.

The regular term of circuit court for Yamhill county will not convene next Monday. Judge Boise received a telegraphic statement from a number of attorneys and prominent tax-payers of Yamhill county, that owing to the prevalence of smallpox in McMinnville and on Dayton prairie, and the fact that jurors and witnesses would have to come to Lafayette from those places the people deemed it inadvisable to hold a term of court at present, and asking that it be postponed to the second Monday in December.

Van B. DeLashmunt, mayor of Portland, and member of the state board of agriculture, has bought from Dr. W. B. Clough, of Walla Walla, the two year old, Blondy, which last week, at Portland, broke all previous Oregon records, and made a mile in 2:47. The consideration was \$1550. Blondy was sired by Lemont, brother of Altamont and son of Almont, the famous trotting stallion. His dam was by Frank Chapman, he by Tuckahoe. The granddam was a thoroughbred mare.

man's crop seems slow to ripen and he has not commenced picking yet but intends to-morrow. Most of our growers around here have contracted at from about 12 and one-half to 14 cents per pound, and now prices are advancing considerably.

THE RIVER AT CORVALLIS.

An Urgent Appeal for the Improvement to be Commenced.

The citizens of Corvallis realizing the necessity of immediate action on the part of the government to check the threatened cut-off of the Willamette above that place, petitioned a few weeks ago for the expenditure of the government appropriation for that purpose as soon as possible. The petition was forwarded to Washington, and the following answer received from J. N. Dolph:

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10, 1888. E. Holgate, Esq., Corvallis, Or.

My Dear Sir:—I am just in receipt of a petition praying for the expenditure of the appropriation to prevent the threatened cut-off of the Willamette river above Corvallis, with your name at the head of it. I will present it to the secretary of war at once and urge immediate action. Yours truly,

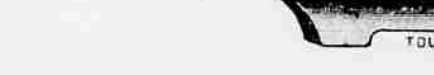
