GENERAL NEWS.

The Chinese Bill at Last Given
to the President.

AN AFRICAN EXPLORER DEAD.
Newsy Items from East of the Rockies and
from the Old World—The Day's
News.

The Herald's Special Despatches.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Represen-
tative Kilgore, active chair-
man of the house committee on
enrolled bills, called upon the pres-
ident this morning and delivered
to him the Chinese exclusion bill.

THE YELLOW FEVER.
Thirty-five New Cases and Five
Deaths.
New York, Sept. 21.—A special
report from Natchez, Miss., dated
yesterday says: "This city is in a
fever of excitement to-night on the
receipt of the yellow fever reports
from Jackson. Shotgun quarantine
will be established at once. The
larger excursion from Natchez
which visited Jackson is shut out
from their homes, all trains on
the Natchez, Jackson & Columbus
railroad having been stopped be-
low Hamilton. A special train
went out at 11 o'clock to-night to
bring Natchez people from points
along the road who have not gone
to Jackson. By shotgun quaran-
tine in 1878 the yellow fever was
kept out of Natchez, and it is be-
lieved it can be done again.

MORE NEW CASES.
JACKSONVILLE, (Fla.) Sept. 21.—
Thirty-five new cases and five
deaths up to noon to-day. The
work of relief is being systemat-
ized. Many will be sent to the
quarantine camps, work on which
has been delayed by rain. Surgeon
Wise, who inspected the fumiga-
tion of the station near this city,
said he endorsed the thoroughness
of the system.

WAS HE MURDERED?
Young Man Found Dead in the Street
with His Skull Fractured.

St. Louis, Sept. 21.—Augustus
V. Braconer, a well known
young man of St. Louis, who has
run through with a fortune, was
found on the street with his skull
fractured and has since died. A
citizen reported to the police that
he had seen a man thrown out of
Patrick Montague's saloon, near
where Braconer was found, and
saw the proprietor strike the man.
This morning the police arrested
Patrick Montague, Edward Mon-
tagne, his brother, Chas. E. Pow-
ell, a lawyer, and D. Epocoe, who
were in the saloon at the time.

Owing to Braconer's high con-
nections and unfortunate life,
the case is exciting much interest.

THE RELIEF EXPEDITION.
Prof. Jameson Dies of African
Fever.
BRUSSELS, Sept. 21.—Advices
from Stale Falls state that Prof.
Jameson, who was engaged in or-
ganizing an expedition for the
relief of Henry M. Stanley, had died
of African fever at Bangalas, on
the Congo, August 17. The or-
ganization of another relief expedi-
tion is considered hopeless.

A Heavy Blow.
BERLIN, Sept. 21.—Emperor Wil-
helm confirmed the election of
Prof. Harnack to the chair of the
church of history in the university
of Berlin, despite the protest of the
senior evangelical council, which
disapproved his religious views.
This is regarded as a heavy blow
to the extreme church party.

The Only John L. Improving.
BOSTON, Sept. 21.—John L. Sul-
livan passed a comfortable night.
In the forenoon he was considered
much better. His stomach is able

Disastrous Fire.
PARIS, Sept. 21.—An explosion
occurred in the Mellie factory at
St. Omer. Masses of burning de-
bris were carried 300 yards and six
factories and two houses were de-
stroyed.

RAILWAY NEWS.

Revival of Southeastern Oregon
Railroad Talk.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20.—In one
of the columns of a local paper
appears the following railroad gos-
sip, which is largely a restatement
of an old subject. It is thought
here that a desire for an independ-
ent through line influenced the
Union Pacific to gain control of the
Oregon Railway & Navigation
Company's route, and now the
same moving influence is believed
to be urging the Union Pacific
managers on, to securing an out-
let in California. Recently sur-
veyors have been seen in Pitt river
canyon, in Shasta and Modoc
counties and in Oregon near Mal-
heur lake. C. A. Page of Los An-
geles, who came down lately from
the Goose lake district in Modoc
county, saw surveyors there.
They were currently reported to be
the Union Pacific men. The pres-
ent western terminus of the Union
Pacific is at Huntington, in East-
ern Oregon, on the Snake river,
the boundary between Idaho and Ore-
gon. To the south and west, to-
ward California, lies the vast ter-
ritory of Southeastern Oregon,
which now is entirely without rail-
road facilities. Baker, Crook,
Grant and Klamath counties are
said to comprise a small empire
themselves. Below are Lassen and
Modoc counties in California, and
Washoe and Humboldt counties in
Nevada. A railroad from Hun-
tington southerly to the Goose lake
region, and thence southerly or east-
ward of the mountains, would tap all
this rich region; and this is the
route believed to be contem-
plated by the Union Pacific peo-
ple. Below Goose lake there is a
fairly feasible route down to the
Fall river valley.

Doubtless there is much that is
mere theory in all the railroad re-
garding this region, but true it is
that several facts bear out this
outlined Union Pacific plan. That
the Chicago & Northwestern and
Northern Pacific managers have
theories in the direction of South-
eastern Oregon and Northern Cal-
ifornia has been made evident pre-
viously. Certain it is that railroad
lines are sure soon to enter the
region.

"There will be a railroad awak-
ing in that region before five
years have passed," said a promi-
nent railroad official to-day.
"Such as will surprise all Califor-
nians who have not been closely
watching the progress of affairs in
that direction."

A FRIEND IN COURT.
Trial of a Man Who Gouged Out
His Wife's Eyes.
NEW YORK, September 21.—
William Bohan, who gouged out
one of his wife's eyes early last
year and the other in July last,
was tried to-day in the County
Court of Sessions in Long Island
City before Justices Garretson,
Brandon and Kellogg.

He had been indicted by the
Grand Jury on two counts, one re-
ferring to each eye. He was tried
in one case to-day. Mrs. Bohan
was in court to-day and made a
vain effort to save her foolish hus-
band from the punishment due his
crime. Her testimony was given
unwillingly.

When the jury brought in a ver-
dict of guilty the prisoner betrayed
no signs of nervousness other than
covert glances at his sightless wife.
He will be tried on the second
count, and it is believed Justice
Garretson will give him the full
penalty, thirty years.

PLEASED WITH OREGON.

As Interesting Address by the
"Drummer Boy."

The following interesting speech
was delivered by Major R. P.
Hendershot, "the drummer boy of
the Rappahannock," at the recent
G. A. R. reunion at Columbus Ohio,
and is taken from the Ohio State
Journal:

"Amid this scene of light and
beauty, of colors and flowers, in
the presence of this vast multitude,
and this array of distinguished
military gentlemen, it may not be
out of place for a private and a
drummer boy to speak—to intro-
duce the musket with the sabre,
chevron with the star. In the
war the drummer-boy and the gen-
eral commanding the armies of the
United States were widely sepa-
rated by rank, yet they were sol-
diers together, one by a command
sending armies into battle, the
other by the long roll arousing
battalions to action. In peace
they are more widely separated by
honor, yet they are citizens to-
gether of this great republic.

"Though separated in war by
the rank, in peace by
honor, the rank and
file and their great commanders as
soldiers and citizens have ever
been united in heart. They honor
the men who led them to victory,
they idolize the men whose genius
has added lustre to American arms
they love the men who amid ba-
ttle and victory, honor and applau-
se have ever been true to the inter-
ests of the common soldier; and as they
followed them to victory in dan-
ger they will follow them to vic-
tory wherever they lead in peace.

"Comrades and citizens: I
leave your city to-morrow for the
far West where I will make it my
future home. I will go to Chi-
cago from here, where I shall re-
main a day or two to visit some
friends and comrades who com-
template a visit to the Pacific
coast. I shall then take the Chi-
cago, Milwaukee and St. Paul
railroad to Kansas City or Omaha,
where I connect with the soldier's
favorite route, the Union Pacific
railroad and pioneer route to the
far West that carries you who
want to dig for gold and silver to
the best mining districts in
America. You who wish to raise
horses, cattle or stock of any kind,
can go by the Union Pacific and
Oregon Railway and Navigation
Company to the most fertile soil
of America, where they can raise four-
ty to seventy bushels of wheat
to the acre and equally surprising
crops of all kinds.

"I live in Ashland Ore., in the
Rogue River valley, on the Mount
Shasta route, the route that runs
through the heaven of America
from San Francisco Cal. to Port-
land, Ore., and the fruit grower
can go by this line through the
finest fruit growing country in the
world. I have seen peaches that
weigh eleven ounces; strawberries
that measure six to ten inches in
circumference are common; and all
fruits annually break down the
trees and vines of size, quality and
quantity unless careful pruning is
done in time. Yes, I live in Ash-
land Oregon, in that noble state
that will at our coming election
give Harrison and Morton at least
10,000 majority. I shall remain
there perhaps a week and then I
am coming back to Indiana and
New York over the seira Nevada
mountains, through the rich min-
ing districts of California and Ne-
vada on the Central Pacific to
Omaha, and Chicago, Milwaukee
and St. Paul to Chicago and New
York, where the old drum and my
voice shall be heard in behalf of
the Republican party—the flag and
the soldier who underwent ex-
posure and danger to vindicate the
honor of this nation. God bless
you all."
