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GENERAL NEWS.

A Demented Son Murders His Aged Mother in Chicago.
A FIERCE STORM IN MEXICO.
Bridges Washed Away and Much Damage Done. News Items from the East and Elsewhere.

The Demented Special Dispatches.
CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—Walter Johnson almost murdered his old mother this morning and afterwards tried to take his own life. Johnson lives at 5208 LaSalle street, and for some time has been somewhat out of his mind, at times has been violent. This morning while his mother, aged 60, was in the kitchen he stabbed her in the throat repeatedly and then her for dead. She was soon discovered by the family and the police sent for. The officers searched for Johnson and found him hanging to a beam. He was cut down and taken to Lakewood, where he recovered. When he returned to consciousness he seemed to have lost his demented condition, and when told of his awful deed he could remember nothing of it. Physicians cannot declare that Mrs. Johnson cannot live. Johnson is 35 years of age.

TERRIFIC STORM.
It Does Much Damage Along the Mexican Border.
CITY OF MEXICO, Sept. 24.—A terrific storm last week in the state of Vera Cruz done much damage along the line of the Mexican (Vera Cruz) railway. The greatest injury is at Barriera de Metlac, where the road crosses an iron bridge 35 feet high and over 500 feet long. The torrent, carrying trees and large boulders, dashed against the piers, carrying away two or three and wrecking 150 feet of bridge. Heavy land slides occurred at Camberis, covering and breaking the roadbed. Many passengers and much freight is delayed at Vera Cruz. Traffic cannot be resumed for several weeks. The loss is estimated at a quarter of a million.

EMPEROR FREDERICK'S DIARY.
It Was Published Without Authority and Is Inaccurate.
BERLIN, Sept. 24.—The Cologne Gazette publishes a semi-official dispatch from Berlin, which states that the abstract from the diary of the late Emperor Frederick was published without Emperor William's knowledge and against his wish, and that the abstract contains a series of inaccuracies. Well informed persons believe that the work as published was specially prepared. The original is mutilated, and its real character is destroyed by a deliberate selection of certain extracts.

HANDSOME CARS.
The New Pullman Coaches for the Oregon and California Route.
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 23.—The Pullman cars that brought the Old Fellows from Los Angeles are perhaps three of the handsomest ever brought to this coast for general use by the public. The cost in excess of \$16,000 each and are most luxuriously equipped with all the latest appliances for lessening the fatigue of travel. In each car are four sections (there being no dining room) including a library, buffet, hot and cold water, and all such luxuries. The hangings are the most costly tapestries, and the woodwork is equal to the finest. It is understood these coaches will run on the California & Oregon line between this city and Portland.

SMALLPOX AT McMinnville.
No New Cases Reported—People Getting Over Their Scare.
McMINNVILLE, Sept. 23.—Many wild rumors are going through the country about the magnitude of the smallpox here. Telegrams and letters of inquiry are pouring in from absent friends and neighboring villages are quarantined against us. To all such it may be said that no new cases have appeared during the past week. The three cases reported last week are getting along very well except Andy Ennis, saloonkeeper, who will probably die. People are getting over their scare and all of the business houses are opened up and running as usual.

To Defeat Americans.
LONDON, Sept. 24.—A million spindles in the Lancashire mills commenced running on short time today, the object being to defeat the American cotton ring.

MONTGOMERY (Ala.), Sept. 24.—The quarantine established Friday by this city against Greenville, Alabama, was removed this morning, there being no cause for its continuance.

AT WASHINGTON.

Political Gossip From the National Capital.
THE QUESTION OF ADJOURNMENT.
Measures Before Congress—The Copper Trust—Secretary Whitney's Proposed Resignation From the Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, September 17.—Senator Sherman made a few remarks in the Senate on last Friday that started the tongues of all the politicians wagging, and they are still going at a fearful rate. He said that he committee on finance would report a Republican tariff bill designed to protect and further American industries as against the free-trade Mills tariff which was intended to, and did weaken many industries of the country; that the bill reported would be a careful revision of the tariff laws it would give to men engaged in the use of the internal revenue laws, and the use of untaxed product and would sweep away the tobacco tax, giving that great agricultural product fair and free play in this country, but the committee would take its time about it. The House of Representatives wished to prolong the session until the tariff bill was reported it would have to wait until the committee was ready to report. After having taken months in preparation and passage of a tariff bill it did not rest with the Democrats to charge the Republicans with delay. He asserted that the Republicans would not be hurried in preparing a bill; that they intended to take all the time they deem necessary for the framing of a bill; they did not care how much time it might require; it might as well be understood that this was the Republican plan. Mr. Sherman then intimated that the bill might not be reported until after the presidential election, in order that the wishes of the people may be known. Should the people vote for free trade by the re-election of Cleveland, then it would be well to give them such a dose as the Mill's bill, but should protection be maintained then perhaps the Democrats would be willing to accept the Republican bill. As the speech of Mr. Sherman was the first official intimation that the Republican tariff bill might not be reported until after the election, it created a genuine sensation in Congress. "What effect will it have on the campaign?" was asked right and left by Republicans, and after fully discussing the matter the conclusion was generally reached, it would have no effect at all; the tariff policy of the Republican party is so well known that no tariff bill in detail is needed to achieve it. What effect this decision will have on adjournment cannot be said just now, but that it will hasten that event cannot be denied. Unless the Democrats by their foolish actions shall make the question one of politics.

The adjournment is becoming desirable in order to make votes for Cleveland. The latest is a attempt to induce the Republican clerks in the departments into using their influence for Cleveland. The officials of the various departments have made lists containing the names of Republican clerks, and the clerks have been informed that unless Cleveland is elected they will be discharged. It is hoped by this means to compel the Republican clerks to use their influence in their respective states to get votes for Cleveland. The pressure on clerks from New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, and Indiana is particularly strong.

Cleveland only found one private pension bill to veto last week. Little is done in Congress these days except to spring personal difficulties between the members.

Mr. Lucius B. Swift, of Indianapolis, a member of the executive committee of the Indiana Civil Service Reform Association, testified before Senator Hale's investigating committee last week to numerous violations of the civil-service reform law by Postmaster Jones, of Indianapolis.

Senator Platt is after the copper trust. He offered a resolution, which was passed by the Senate instructing the Finance Committee to inquire into the facts regarding this trust, which is composed entirely of foreigners, and which controls the production of every copper mine in the United States.

The bill amending the inter-state commerce law was passed by the House without a division.

Cleveland sent for Secretary Whitney to return to this city for the purpose of having him deny the story that had been printed of his intended retirement from the Cabinet on account of his disgust at Cleveland's free-trade ideas. After much persuasion Mr. Whitney agreed to announce a public interview that he would remain Secretary of the Navy until the fourth of March. But he qualified it by saying that it was a such against his inclinations that he remained.

The Canadian retaliation bill which was introduced through the House is now in the hands of the Senate Committee on Foreign Affairs, and it will not be at all surprising if it remains there the rest of the session. There is a growing feeling that is entirely unnecessary.

General Harrison's letter is spoken of here as one of the best documents of the kind ever written, and that it will gain him many votes cannot be doubted.
