STATE NEWS.

A Case of Varioloid at Salem Closely Quarantined.
A \$1,000 FIRE AT HARRISBURG.
Valuable Hop House Burned and its Contents Destroyed—A Year's Work Goes Up In Smoke.

SALEM, Sept. 27.—A young man named Mulligan to-day developed a case of varioloid. Mulligan is a book agent and is stopping with his brother, a university student, in a small house in the oil mill yard near the depot. He returned from Woodburn Tuesday night and a complaint of feeling unwell, and a physician pronounced the case varioloid. Mulligan's headquarters are isolated and are in strict quarantine and there is no danger of a spread of the epidemic.
HOP HOUSE BURNED.
HARRISBURG, Sept. 27.—The fine new hop house of Dr. H. A. Davis, with its contents consisting of this year's crop of his new hop yard, was totally destroyed by fire this morning. The cause of the fire is as yet unknown. The loss will amount to about \$4,000, which was only partially insured. This was the first crop from the new yard, and the loss falls very heavy upon the owner, as the prospects for a remunerative price was good, and the crop fine.

Teaching.
For many years teaching was considered the only "genteel" occupation for a lady to engage in. All the broken-down gentlemen, as a matter of course, became teachers. Now, however, other lines have been opened to women, and we find them doing all kinds of clerical work, etc.
It is necessary, in order to become a teacher, to pass a certain examination. If the required certificate is awarded, and the recipient may then be considered a full-fledged teacher. But one-half of the teachers who obtain certificates, and who teach, are no more fitted for the occupation than I was about to say, "hod-carriers," but that may be a little strong. Well, then there are the women who preside at the wash-tubs. Of course, they have the necessary education, but that is not all that is necessary. The one thing needed is the faculty or power to impart. We may know a thing very thoroughly, and yet be unable to tell anyone about it in a sufficiently ready manner to have them ready to understand. We know it so well ourselves that we do not realize how much there is to learn about it.

A teacher to be successful must be able to study the character and disposition of the children under her charge. A loud angry tone may frighten one child into obedience at once, while it would have just the opposite effect on another. It never does for the teacher to lose her temper and fly into a passion, for if she does the children will, in a measure, lose a certain respect for her, or rather, she falls a peg lower in their estimation. She must maintain her dignity, and to do this she must be firm. Be gentle, kind and considerate, but when it is necessary to take a certain stand, take it, and adhere to it in a quiet, dignified, firm manner.

The parent or teacher who goes around scolding hour after hour creates an amount of fear in the bosom of those who have been under the ban, as it were, but if one should rebel, they would all do so at once, and said parent or teacher could howl till she were tired without restoring order. But the calm, composed, firm-spoken one would in an instant have every child at his or her task, and quiet reigning over all.

GENERAL NEWS.

A Defaulting New York Clerk Resting Under Heavy Charges
TEXAS' TROUBLES CONTINUE.
A Large Appropriation—Samoa Troubles—Dynamite Explosions—Miners Demand an Advance.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—The examination of Chas. F. Bedell, the defaulting clerk of Shipman, Barlow, Laronge & Choate, began today. Three complaints were made against him. The first was by J. E. Sherman, charging Bedell with forging mortgages for \$170,000. Register Stevens was present to testify that his signature on the mortgages was forged. Another complaint was by Solomon Hanford, one of the law firm that the prisoner defrauded. Koopman who first discovered the forgery, also made a complaint.
STRIKING MINERS.
They Demand an Increase of Ten Per Cent.
LONDON, Sept. 27.—At the conference at Manchester, at which 25,000 miners were represented, it was decided to strike on October 29th, unless the demand for a general advance of ten per cent. in their wages is acceded to.

SHERIFF'S POSSE.
In Connection with F. B. Troops to Hold the Fort.
SAN ANTONIO, (Tex.), Sept. 27.—Dispatches from Rio Grande city say "The sheriffs of Cameron, Hidalgo and Deza, whose posse make a force of 150 men, arrived here today. Our own sheriff Shelly has about 100 fighting men. Col. Clendenning has been authorized to bring troops from the King's gold barracks if needed. Further trouble is not probable in the face of the present display of forces. All is quiet. Garis is resting easier and hopes are held that he will recover."

SAMOA ISLANDS.
A German Officer's Army Defeated in a Contest.
AUCKLAND, Sept. 27.—Advices from Samoa say that the participants of the deposed King Maliebon, have had an engagement with the army of King Tanamases, and the latter's forces were defeated. King Tanamases' army is under the command of German officers.

DYNAMITE WORK.
A Fearful Explosion at Carthagena, Spain.
MADRID, Sept. 27.—Eighty cases of dynamite exploded on the wharf at Carthagena, causing much damage.

A Subject of Inquiry.
BERLIN, Sept. 27.—The North German Gazette, Cologne Gazette and Berlin Post have published a semi-official print of France to hasten the conclusion of the inquiry into the shooting of Porter, of the German embassy, at Paris.

The President Approves.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—The president has approved the joint resolution appropriating \$200,000 to suppress the infection in the inter-state commercial act, to continue the provisions of existing laws of the government and an act amending the river and harbor bills.
