## GENERAL NEWS.

**The Wheat Flurry Becoming More Exciting in Chicago.**

**MANY PEOPLE BURNED TO DEATH**

Freezing Weather in the Northern Middle and Southern States - A Young Millionaire Steals \$175,000.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—The boom in wheat continues this morning. September opened at \$1.25, the closing prices last night, and remained so for some time, everybody seeming afraid to make a move. Then it began to go up and at 11 o'clock was quoted at \$1.45, and six minutes later touched \$1.50. October quoted 99%; November, 99%; December, 99%; May, \$1.01 1/2.

IN THE AFTERNOON.

There have been no transactions in September wheat since last reported. It is reported that train loads of wheat are speeding to the city on express, some from St. Louis, Detroit, Milwaukee and other cities. It is now stated that prices in pork shorts ribs has been covered by Armour and lard by Fairbanks.

NEW YORK WHEAT.

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Wheat opened one cent higher, strong and active, on covering contracts wholly in sympathy with Chicago.

**ACTION SUSPENDED.**

The Mormons Given a Chance to Claim the Seventy Children.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The collector of customs of New York has been authorized to suspend action in the case of the seventy Mormon children detained at Port Unid by the general officer until the Mormon society has had an opportunity to prove that they are not likely to become public charges.

**FURNITURE FACTORY BURNED.**

The Remains of Employees Taken from the Ruins.

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—The fire furniture factory of Wilkins & Co. on Lake street was burned this morning. Two bodies of employees have been recovered from the ruins. It is believed that three more are still there. The loss on the stock is \$500,000.

**BURNED TO DEATH.**

Sixteen Persons Perish in a Fire Near St. Petersburg.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 28.—Sixteen persons perished in the fire at Cronstadt yesterday. The building was a lofty tenement. The staircases burned away and a number of the inmates leaped from the windows and were not tally hurt.

**COLD WAVE.**

Freezing Weather Reported in the Northern and Middle States.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Freezing weather is reported in Northern Minnesota and a killing frost from the southern portion of Michigan and Wisconsin and a light frost in the Northwest as far south as southern Missouri. Indications are that a severe frost will occur to-morrow morning in the state of Ohio, and light frosts in exposed places in the northern portions of the gulf states and Tennessee; also in the western portions of North Carolina and Virginia, and in the territory of the middle Atlantic states and in the interior of New England.

**CAUGHT AT LAST.**

A Burglar Captured After Escaping Through Oregon and Elsewhere.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 28.—A special to the Post-Dispatch from Denver says: A man answering the description of Tascot, the Chicago burglar, who murdered millionaire Sam Snell, has just been arrested. A reward for his arrest of \$20,000 is offered. He has been employed here as bartender for some weeks under the name of Edward J. Carter. The arrest was made at the instigation of a detective, who followed Carter through Oregon, Washington, California and Nevada.

**GONE TO CANADA.**

The Unaccountable Crookedness of a Young Millionaire.

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—The excitement caused on the produce exchange by Wm. R. Foster's forgery has been added to-day by a rumor of another mortgage having been discovered to be bogus. Trustee Orr states that another mortgage for \$8000 is suspected to be bogus, but there has not been time to investigate it. This would increase Foster's stealings to about \$176,000. It is believed that Foster is in Canada. The fugitive's father will make good the amount of the delinquencies.

The sum taken is about 15 percent of a total fund, and unless returned each member will lose about \$12,000. Some of the members are inclined to think that Foster is not in his right mind. His income is at least \$11,000 a year, and at his father's death he will receive \$1,000,000.

**HOW TO MAKE \$2900.**

By Proving That Harrison Said "A Dollar a Day is Enough for Workmen."

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 27.—In fulfillment of an editorial challenge published in this morning's Journal Harry Snow, one of the proprietors of that paper, tendered to Hon. Wm. English, democratic candidate for the vice-presidency in 1880, a certified check for \$2900 with instructions to pay it over to any party or parties who shall establish in a judicially conducted examination, that Gen. Harrison, during the railroad strike of 1877, or at any other time, said that "one dollar a day is enough for any workman." By the terms of today's challenge the matter shall be submitted to Hon. N. D. Taylor, democrat, judge of the supreme court of Marion county, and under his direction, under the rules and procedure of his court, evidence shall be submitted to a jury of twelve, democratic freeholders of Marion county.

Mr. English declined to act as custodian in the matter. The Journal people state the money will be tendered to Hon. Joseph E. McDonald as custodian, on his return to the city to-morrow.

**REMARKABLE CORNER IN WHEAT.**

The September Option Sells to \$1.95 per bushel at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—The Daily News will say of the remarkable advance in September wheat to-day: "It is the outcome of a corner in that option by B. H. Hutchinson, who has been buying all the September wheat lately. As only three days remained for the shorts to settle their trades in, they went into the pit this morning and began to bid against each other, with the result that the price mounted rapidly. When it reached \$1.25, Hutchinson sent the shorts word he had went to sell. They flocked to his office, where he disposed of 325,000 bushels at \$1.95 in a very short time. He then, after telling those of the shorts still wanting wheat that it would go to \$2 within a week, went away to his club, leaving instructions with his brokers to sell shorts all the wheat they would sell at \$1.95, or buy all they would sell at \$1.94. There is suspicion that Hutchinson also has most of the December wheat, and in consequence this option went up to \$1.

**FIRE AT MCHINNILLE.**

An Incendary Set fire to the Buildings, With Coal Oil.

McMENNILLE, Sept. 27.—A fire broke out in the upper story of D. G. F. Tucker's brick building at 2:30 this morning, and destroyed it. Also W. Bingham's drug store, S. C. Force's wagon shop and Logan Bros.' and Henderson's heavy stable were burned. It was the work of incendiary origin. A number of other buildings had a narrow escape. The loss is estimated at \$22,000; insurance about \$18,000. The stairs leading to the upper story of Tucker's building were saturated with coal oil. The dastardly incendiary has not been caught, and it would be hard with him if he were. People are excited and talk of organizing a vigilance committee.
