## AT WASHINGTON.

The Tariff Bill, Sugar Trust Bill.

CHINESE EXCLUSION MEASURE.

No Pension For Mrs. Sheridan—Kilgore on Yellow Fever—Agricultural Department—Campaign Ball.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Senator Sherman, in reply to a question asked by the caucus of Republican Senators which was held on Saturday discussed everything pertaining to the "order of business" of the Senate, but that nothing definite was done—in fact, no vote was taken upon anything. The caucus was called for the purpose of getting a general expression of opinion on certain subjects. While no vote was taken, it was virtually decided that the tariff bill should be reported after the hearings in regard to the sugar trust are over; also, that Senator Sherman's bill against trusts should be passed at an early day; likewise, the bill to admit Washington Territory as a State.

Senator Plumb to-day called up his bill forbidding certain lands granting to the Northern Pacific Railroad.

The Chinese Government has, by its rejection of the treaty, recently ratified by the Senate, helped Cleveland out of a very embarrassing position in regard to the Chinese Exclusion bill just passed by Congress. This bill was prepared by Representative Scott—Cleveland's chum—and was passed by the House in about thirty minutes, without debate or objection, the day after the news of the treaty reached this country. Several days later a cablegram was received from the United States Minister to China saying that the treaty had not been rejected, but its consideration had been postponed. Mr. Cleveland and Secretary Bayard then both took the trouble to renounce the action of Mr. Scott in railroad the bill through the House, both of them being of the opinion that no legislation should be taken until the Chinese government had taken some official action of the treaty. The anti-Chinese fever was too much for the Senate, and the bill was passed by it, though not without protests. It was placed in Cleveland's hands Friday, and bets were offered here that he would veto it, but on Saturday the official news of the rejection of the treaty by the Emperor of China was received at the State Department. Now, of course, the bill will be signed. The treaty having been rejected, some such law is a necessity, and everybody is in favor of it, and I only mention the matter to show Cleveland's good luck in getting out of an embarrassing position.

Senator Chandler will to-morrow ask the Senate to pass his resolution providing for an investigation of the Louisiana election.

No pension for Mrs. Sheridan will go through the house at this session. Two men have made themselves conspicuous in opposing this measure. They are Kilgore the House bully, from Texas, and Cheate from Indiana, both of whom have objected in every conceivable manner to the consideration of the bill giving a pension to the widow of "Little Phil."

Mr. Kilgore has become a chronic nuisance. Representative Dougherty of Florida, asked unanimous consent of the House for the passage of the joint resolution, which had already passed the Senate, appropriating \$100,000 for the relief of the yellow fever sufferers. Kilgore objected, thus preventing the passage of the resolution for the present.

The House bill making the Agricultural Department an executive Department under the control of a secretary of agriculture has been passed by the Senate, with the section transferring the weather bureau to the new department struck out.

The complaints against Postmaster Judd, of Chicago, one of Mr. Cleveland's early appointments finally became too many and too strong even for Cleveland to stand. He has nominated for the position W. C. Newberry, president of the Croquet Club, a well known political organization of that city.

The Harrison and Morton campaign ball, which was a notable feature of the great Blaine reception in New York, will be rolled to this city next Friday. It will be met by all the Republican clubs in this city and rolled to the Republican National League's headquarters, when a man-moth political meeting will be held. From there the ball goes West, through West Virginia, Ohio, and Indiana.

## GENERAL NEWS.

A Terrible Explosion on the Panama Canal Work.

DISASTROUS STORM ON THE LAKES

Many Vessels Wrecked—Men and Women Drowned—A New Company to Build Steel Railway Coaches.

ASPENWALL (Panama) Oct. 2.—A terrible explosion occurred to-day on board a large iron mud carrying steamer. There were on board, in addition to the crew of the Grover, master mechanic of the Panama Canal Company, Hugh Graham, and Andrew McCloskey, captain of the Hume American dredger City of Paris, eight souls in all. The safety valve blew out and an explosion followed, causing the loss of six lives and the destruction of the vessel and also a steamer in the vicinity, while another lighter boat was out in two as if by a knife.

DISASTROUS STORM.

Great Damage to Shipping and Loss of Life on the Lakes.

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—One of the severest storms in years was experienced on the lakes as far east as Lake Erie last night. Fears are entertained that many vessels are wrecked. The lake here is so rough that no vessel dared to leave port. A cold rain, with traces of snow, by the northern gale made the weather most disagreeable.

FURTHER DETAILS.

SANILAC (Mich.) Oct. 2.—There has been a terrible storm raging here since last evening. At 7 o'clock last night the life-saving crew from Sand Beach went out, and at 11 p. m. rescued a crew of six men and also a woman from the barge Hiler. As the boat passed on the way to the shore it was run into by another vessel, the boat turning her completely over. The entire crew belonging to the barge reached the shore, towing two of the other crew with them. The remaining four men and woman were drowned.

FREE TRANSPORTATION AND FOOD FOR THE SUFFERERS IN THE SOUTH.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Dr. Hutton, at Camp Perry, has been authorized to furnish transportation on government vouchers to healthful persons who are too poor to pay their own fare from Southern cities.

FOOD FOR THE SUFFERERS.

JACKSON, (Miss.) Oct. 2.—The telegraphers are asking immediate aid for the colored people held there by quarantine. The supply of food is limited.

FEW NEW CASES.

JACKSONVILLE, (Fla.) Oct. 2.—Very few new cases were reported this morning.

BRINGING IN THE SURVIVORS.

Crew and Passengers of the Wrecked "Wemyss" Taken to New York.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—The ship Creedmore of St. John, W. B., from Manila May 22d, is expected here in a few days. On board the vessel is Captain Colquhoun of the ship Earl Wemyss, and a portion of the crew of the ship Ardencap.

These vessels collided off Pernambuco Sept. 25th. The wife of Capt. Colquhoun and three children went down with the ship. A number of seamen were also drowned. The Ardencap was badly damaged, but managed to reach the port at Fernando.

STEEEL RAILWAY COACHES.

A Big Company to Build Non-combustible, Indestructible Cars.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—It is reported that a company has been organized with ample cash to manufacture railway cars constructed entirely of sheet steel, under patents of C. W. Math, of San Francisco. The company is said to be negotiating for the purchase of a large tract of land near Chicago, where the cars can be built. It is claimed for the new vestibule cars that they are absolutely indestructible, non-combustible and can be built as cheap as wooden coaches.

DEMANDED THEIR RIGHTS.

The United States Wants Her Patents and Trade Marks Respected.

MONTEVIDEO, Oct. 2.—The law congress of Spain has addressed a communication to the Uruguayan government, asking recognition of ownership of the Spanish literary and artistic works in Uruguay. The United States also claims a recognition of respect to American patents and trade marks. It is probable that both requests will be conceded.
