MATTERS OF CONSCIENCE.

One phase of humanity is illu-
trated by the seeming avidity with
which individuals accuse them-
selves of crimes. Cassell's journal
says that constant readers of news-
papers may have observed that a
curious epidemic of conscience
often follows the commission of a
great crime. Men and even
women hasten to accuse themselves
of the particular offense which is
exciting public interest, or of simi-
lar crimes that have never come to
light or have been forgotten. The
police are often compelled to inves-
tigate confessions made under the
influence of drink or of a morbid
imagination. Not long ago a large
field in the neighborhood of
London was dug up in the expecta-
tion of discovering the skeleton of
a farmer who disappeared mysteri-
ously thirty years before. A
sailor declared that he had
murdered the missing man and
buried him in a meadow. No re-
mains were discovered, but the
result of the investigations made
by the police led to the trial and
conviction of the sailor for a murder
committed by him a few weeks
previous to his false confession. A
thief is not often troubled by that
silent monitor called conscience.
There is, however, on record one
instance in which either conscience
or gratitude compelled a thief to
make restitution. Charles Dickens,
the novelist, when in France was
robbed of his watch—a valuable
gold repeater, presented to him by
admirers who had caused their at-
tention to be engraved upon the
case. Dickens's grief was short, for,
on the following afternoon, he
received the watch, and with it a
polite note apologizing for any in-
convenience that might have been
caused by its temporary with-
drawal. The pickpocket had not
recognized his victim as a fellow-
countryman, and still less as the
inimitable portrayer of Bill Sykes.

The growth of electrical appli-
ances is a matter of interest. It is
said that in the United States
there are 5,351 isolated plants and
central electric light stations, pro-
ducing every night 192,500 arc and
1,925,000 incandescent lights.
There are employed for the motive
power of dynamo steam engines
aggregating 459,495 horse-power,
and the capitalization of electric
companies during the last six
months has increased \$42,210,100.
There are now being operated in
this country 34 electric railroads,
comprising 138 miles of single
track, while 49 other roads, with
an aggregate length of over 300
miles, are in course of construction.
Careful estimates show that no
less than 17,500,000 passengers will
be carried by the electric roads of
the country during the present
year. The increase of the business
is strikingly illustrated by the fact
that there are single factories em-
ploying as many as 1,500 persons
in making electric motors. There
are eight journals devoted exclu-
sively to electricity and its
dependent industries in the United
States.

One necessity for the safety and
happiness of human beings, is for
individuals to always maintain
their presence of mind. Nine-
tenths of the suffering and untimely
deaths would be averted if such a
practice was strictly maintained.
For instance the young man who
was recently hunting squirrels
near Los Angeles, and on wound-
ing one which ran into its hole, in
he had preserved his presence of
mind would not have attempted
to dig the animal out with the
stock of his gun, pointing the
muzzle towards his body in such a

manner that when it was dis-
charged as of course it was, the
bullet entered his vitals causing
death after an hour intense agony.

THE OBJECT.

The claim that the third party is
working for growing success, with-
out regard to the old parties, is not
in accordance with the facts as
developed in the present canvass.
Without doubt the great majority
of voters who intend to cast their
ballots for the prohibition candi-
dates on the 6th of November,
intend so doing from honest con-
victions of right and principle, but
evidently their leaders do not.
For instance from reliable authority
and the facts in the case it is
shown that the active canvass in
the third party is to be made in
New York, New Jersey, Connecti-
cut, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan
and Minnesota, with the avowed
purpose of drawing from the repub-
lican party in the hopes of defeat-
ing it; while in the Southern states,
where third party votes would be
mainly drawn from the democratic
party, no canvass is to be made.
This fact shows the animus and
intentions of the leaders in their
national committee, and fully
demonstrates what they are work-
ing for.

The increasing heat as distance
toward the center of the earth is
reached is a well established fact.
A remarkable instance of this in-
crease of temperature in the earth
toward the center has been pre-
sented at Pesh, where the deepest
artesian well in the world is that
now being bored for the purpose of
supplying the public baths and
other establishments with hot
water. A depth of 8,140 feet has
already been reached, and it
furnishes 176,000 gallons daily at a
temperature of 158 degrees Fahren-
heit. The municipality have
recently voted a large subvention,
in order that one boring may be
continued to a greater depth, not
only to obtain a larger volume of
water, but at a temperature of 176
degrees Fahrenheit.
