W. V. & C. M. W. R. MATTERS.

The examination of the land of the W. V. & C. M. W. R. Co. will be completed about the 10th of November, when all the properties of that company, or its assignee, D. Cahn, will be placed on the market for sale or lease. In all cases of sale a warranty deed will be issued. As there are several millions back of this warranty, it would seem as though the thing were sure. The legislation before congress protects the purchaser in case of forfeiture of the land grant. The prices will be fixed as soon as possible and the terms made known. At this time they are cash or four years time, one-half payable at the time of purchase, and the balance in four installments, with 8 per cent. on deferred payments. Mr. Mitchell, the land agent, proposed the scheme, and the attorneys of the company adopted it. All persons having improvements on road company land will do well to make application, as such applications will receive first consideration.—Ochoco Review.

The Oregonian says: For some time past Mr. John Dill and several others have been engaged in digging a well in Powell's valley. Last Saturday the well was 40 feet deep and the men were afraid to go down on account of foul air. In order to ascertain how matters were at the bottom a lighted candle was let down, and it was found to burn brightly. Dill was lowered and he reported it was all right. He was hoisted up, but as soon as he reached the surface he fell backward into the bottom of the well. When he was brought up again he was found to be dead. It seems that when he came into the fresh air he was in an exhausted condition and fainted. He was an unmarried man, and about 35 years of age. Fire Bug at Prineville. The brewery of Adolph Benschwanz was burned at Prineville, the loss being \$800. Henry Streud was arrested and held in \$500 bonds for the incendiarism. The citizens of Prineville have offered a reward of \$250 for the arrest and conviction of any person caught attempting to set fire to any building within the city limits. New Catalogue. STATE DISPATCHES.

A Class of Two Dozen Lawyers to be Tamed Loose Upon the Public. Special to the Herald. SALEM, Oct. 2.—Twenty-four applicants for admission to the bar appeared before the supreme court to-day and stood the examination as to the qualifications to practice law. The examination began at 1 o'clock this afternoon and yet continues. It will not be finished before to-morrow. Romance in Real Life. The case of Sovren vs. Yorlan, decided in the supreme court, is one which has excited a great amount of interest in Lane county, and to which a great deal that savors of the romantic attaches. Several years since an old lady named Goodchild died near Eugene, leaving a considerable amount of property. A Mr. Sovren was appointed administrator of her estate, and the place was sold to a man named Yorlan. One day Yorlan's boy Darwin and a playmate named Hugh Gray were digging about in the barn and they discovered two cans full of money, nearly all gold, one containing \$1000, and the other \$925. They turned their find over to Mr. Yorlan, who advertised it in the papers as lost property, for the time required by statute. No claimant appearing within the prescribed time, he turned over one-half the money to the county, as required by statute, and gave the other to his boy. After the transaction was completed Sovren, the administrator, heard of it and began suit for the recovery of the money. He was beaten in the circuit court, and then he appealed to the supreme court, where a decision against him was also rendered. Then he got a rehearing, and Monday the case was again decided against him, Judge Lord rendering the decision. A Social Event. The Secretary of Oregon State Grange, in receipt of an invitation to attend the nuptials of Mrs. Kate P. Trimble, daughter of Rev. Dr. John Trimble, Secretary of the National Grange. The event will take place in Christ Church in Washington D. C., on the 11th inst. The groom is Mr. C. C. Stain of Pueblo Colorado. The grange membership throughout the Union will join in congratulations to Dr. Trimble on the happy occasion. McCune Discharged. The examination of Willard McCune, the slayer of James Bewley, was concluded at Willamina, Yamhill county, before Justice Leonard last Saturday night, McCune being discharged. The examination began Thursday and continued during Friday and Saturday. A great amount of testimony was introduced, the general drift of which appeared to be that McCune was justified in killing Bewley. House Burned. Sunday morning at Independence Polk county, the residence of Geo. Chamberlain, a carpenter, was burned to the ground. No one was living in the house at the time, Mr. Chamberlain being at Dallas at work, and his family at the coast. The origin seems undoubtedly to have been incendiary. The loss was about \$600. Firemen's Matters. At the last meeting of Albany Engine Co. No. 1, held Monday evening, Walter Parker was elected as a member of the board of fire delegates and C. W. Watts was elected foreman. The company is in a thriving condition, several new members having been admitted at the last meeting. Grange Meeting.
