The wheat market is firm in this city at 75 cents. Little, comparatively, is being sold, although the advance to this figure has caused some of it to move.

O. P. Coshov, of Brownsville, is in the city. He states that there is an unusual amount of sickness about that place, and that the general prayer is for rain.

The Brownsville Woolen Mills signed the protest against the Mills bill, because, under the proposed reduction, profits would be reduced, and as a consequence the standard of wages would be lowered.

The fire last evening disclosed the fact that huge piles of rubbish and garbage from the city are dumped into the river opposite the city. Such polluting of the water of the "Beautiful Willamette" ought to be stopped.

The exhibition of cooking on the Charter Oak stove with the wonderful wire gauze oven door was witnessed yesterday by many people, a large number of them being ladies. The exhibition will continue to-day until 5 o'clock.

Julius Gradwohl writes from San Francisco that he has made arrangements to buy goods direct from England. He also shipped on the last steamer which left for Yaquina City to Albany 100 dozen each of cups and saucers, the very latest style, which he will sell for 75 cents per dozen, for net cash until further notice.

The Oregon Pacific's New Steamship.

The dispatches tell us that the steamship Yaquina Bay, formerly known as the Caracas, cleared yesterday for Baltimore, where she will coal preparatory to sailing for San Francisco, where she will enter the service of the Oregon Development Company.

WILL REMOVE TO TACOMA.

The Iron Foundry of Cherry & Parkes will be removed in December.

Mr. C. C. Cherry, of the former firm of Cherry & Parkes, which has now been changed to Cherry, Parkes & Paisley, the latter gentleman having purchased an interest in the same, returned yesterday from Pendleton. They have secured the contract for making the iron work of the new \$70,000 court house there.

They shipped yesterday to Yaquina the engine and boiler for Schroeder & Lott's new steam sawmiller, in process of construction there. It is an 8-horse power engine of the Scotch marine type and was built wholly in this city. The engine is 12-inch bore, high pressure, with keel condenser. The boiler is 70 inches diameter and 10 feet in length. It is a fine piece of mechanism.

As soon as the contract for the Pendleton court house is completed, Mr. Cherry states, their iron works will be removed to Tacoma. The removal will be made in December. Albany will of course regret to lose so enterprising a firm as Cherry & Parkes has been, but they think there is a better field for their work on the Sound. If this city, continues to grow, however, as it has done in the past three years, there will be no lack of other enterprising firms to take their place, and it should not be thought abroad that their removal will leave Albany in any way destitute of iron works, as there are others engaged in the business here with ample facilities to supply the demands in this line of business.

The Yaquina Shipyard.

The two steam schooners on the ways at the Onetta shipyard are gradually growing in shape and beauty, under the hands of skilled mechanics according to the Post. Capt. Schroeder's vessel is considerably nearer completion than the one building for Will T. Radir, and will soon be ready to launch. In fact Capt. Schroeder informed us that he expected the machinery, rigging, etc., on the steamer which should arrive here on the 28th inst. Both vessels are models of beauty and strength, and their carrying capacity will greatly exceed vessels of similar length. The vessels are as near as may be of the same size and build. Length over all, 84 feet; 23 feet beam, with 7 feet 9 inches depth of hold. Capt. J. F. Hanrahan, under whose supervision the vessels have been constructed, has used the greatest care in selecting all the material, and he has been exceptionally fortunate in securing the best, and will turn out two vessels that can hardly be excelled anywhere for the quality of the material used and the manner of the workmanship. There is another feature about shipbuilding on Yaquina bay that is probably the chief one, and that is, owing to the excellence and cheapness of the material used, its convenience and cheap transportation to Frisco, where all hardware, machinery, etc., can be obtained, wooden ships can be built here for about one-third less money than anywhere else on the coast.

The Tax Levy Made.

The annual tax levy for the ensuing year was made yesterday by the board of county commissioners, the levy being fixed at 15 mills. The levy last year was made in anticipation of a somewhat lower state levy than was made, and in consequence the county's treasury will be empty before the end of the year. After transacting considerable business yesterday the board adjourned and will go to-day to examine some bridge work on the Calapooya, after which the business of the term will be concluded. The bill of J. J. Graham for caring for the smallpox case west of Millers allowed \$100.

A Human Fiend.

THE FIRE BELL.

A Blaze in a Rubbish Pile Dangerously Near a Furniture Factory.

A few minutes after 5 o'clock last evening the sonorous clatter of the fire bell brought the fire department quickly out. The fire proved to be burning in a pile of rubbish adjoining the lumber yard of C. J. Dillon's furniture factory, and it had gained such headway that both the lumber and the factory were in imminent danger of burning.

A stream from the hydrant quickly extinguished it without calling the engines into requisition. The fire was set by some small boys who were playing on the river bank in the rubbish, which consisted of refuse from the factory, straw, etc.
