GENERAL NEWS.

Annual Report of Railroad Commissioner Johnson.
A FATAL RAILWAY DISASTER.
Forty Railroad Laborers Killed in a Fatal Slugging Match Near East of the Rockies.

The Herald Special Dispatches: WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Gen. Joseph E. Johnson, commissioner of railroads, in his annual report to the secretary of the interstate commission, says that the railroads south of the Union and Central Pacific and east of California have been inspected during the year by Hazzard, engineer of the office. The commissioner has inspected the Union and Central Pacific and all roads in California and Oregon connected with the latter, and those in Washington territory. "These roads," the commissioner says, "are all in a very satisfactory condition. They were well built originally and have been kept in excellent order since. Steel rails have been substituted for iron almost everywhere."

TERRIFIC PRIZE FIGHT.
Jack Lane and Jimmie Collins Beautifully Bruise Each Other.

New York, Oct. 4.—Jack Lane, of Brooklyn, and Jimmie Collins, of Newark, N. J., fought nine terrific rounds on Long Island this morning. In the eighth round Collins broke his wrist by a sledge hammer blow on Lane's head. Collins fought with his good hand, intending to finish the battle with a rush, but did not succeed. In the tenth round Collins was unable to go on with the fight and it was awarded to Lane.

RAILWAY DISASTER.
Forty Men Meet Their Death in a Collision of Trains.

MAION (Ohio), Oct. 4.—Report was received here this morning of a serious wreck at Koutz, Ind., on the Chicago and Atlantic railroad last night, in which a fast freight collided with a work train. Both trains were running at full speed. Forty laborers on the work train are reported killed. It is impossible to get the official statement.

YELLOW FEVER.
The Thermometer Stands at 113 at Jacksonville, Florida.

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 4.—Up to noon to-day has occurred. About 20 calls for physicians have been made by 75 new patients, most of them colored. The weather is oppressive, the mercury at 113 degrees. The physicians generally agree that the condition of the patients are good.

Chara Gets Her Divorce.
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.—Judge Hunt to-day granted a divorce to Mrs. Clara Belle McDonald from her husband, R. H. McDonald, Jr. Mrs. McDonald is given the custody of their child and is awarded \$35 per month for its maintenance, and is also allowed \$1250 cost of fees.

Prize Fighters Sentenced.
BUFFALO, Oct. 4.—John Spain and Geo. LaBlanche, the marine, were convicted yesterday of aiding and abetting on a prize fight on Navy Island, and were today sentenced. Spain got five and a half months in the penitentiary and LaBlanche three.

THE TARIFF BILL.

It Has Been Reported to the U. S. Senate.
VERY REASURABLE PROPOSITION.
The Total Reduction About Seventy-Five Million. Wool Schedule Extensively Changed.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—The republican tariff bill was reported to the senate from the finance committee to-day.
The tobacco tax on producers and dealers is repealed, and also all laws regulating the manufacture, sale and exportation of tobacco.
Cigarettes weighing more than three pounds to the thousand are taxed one and a half dollars a thousand, and those weighing less than three pounds to the thousand, fifty cents a thousand.
Alcohol for use in the industrial arts is exempted from tax.
Tin plates are taxed one cent a pound.
The lumber tariff is unchanged.
The duty on sugars is reduced about fifty per cent.
The tobacco import tax is unchanged, as also is the tax on dates, grapes, plums, prunes, raisins, figs and salt.
The woolen schedule is extensively changed in classification and in rates.
Changes in cotton and silk are not material.
Among the articles on the free list are jute butts, sisal grass, fruits not otherwise provided for, and guano manures.
The importation of opium containing less than nine per cent. of morphia and opium prepared for smoking is prohibited entirely.
Various other reductions are made.
It is estimated that the total reduction of the revenue will be about seventy-five million dollars, as follows: Sugar, twenty-eight millions; free list, six and a half millions; tobacco (internal tax), twenty-four and a half millions; alcohol in the arts, seven and a half millions; other reductions, eight and a half millions.

FROM MASSACHUSETTS.
We make the following extracts from a private letter from H. E. Hayes, Master of Oregon State Grange, under date of South Deerfield, Mass., September 29:
We arrived here about one week ago, after a very pleasant trip across the continent. We stopped a few days in New York, and visited the Niagara Falls, also some of their cheese factories in northern New York. The farmers pay the factory 1 1/2 cents per pound for making the cheese; the cheese average about 50 pounds each, and some of the farmers told me that they could not make a living if it was not for their cheese interests, but it rained there, and is raining here so there is no danger of my webs becoming injured. I find that in this state, especially in this locality the prevailing crops are onions, tobacco and corn, the ensilage corn is raised quite extensively. I visited Mr. Haskill's farm on the Connecticut river last week, he was filling his silos, the corn is cut by steam power and run by an elevator into the silos. The sides of the silos is a double plank, with paper between the plank, they then tramp the corn down tight and put a cover over it with a light weight upon the cover. The farmers have to fertilize the crop in order to raise any amount. We visited the Agricultural school at Amherst; the grounds contain about 380 acres well watered and very handsomely located. President H. H. Goodill regretted that he did not see Prof. Arnold when he was here. I was very much interested in the manner the school is conducted. The stables are quite extensive and I noticed some fine stock of different classes. I noticed a fine Ayrshire shorthorn and Jersey herd. I am satisfied that our College will require a 200 acre farm in order to make it of any practical use, and the more practical instructions we can give the student the better for one reason the student that wants to become a lawyer, doctor or merchant will not relish that kind of a school, but the farmer will. We also visited Memorial Hall in Deerfield, there the mind can trace the advance of our country for near 300 years. Tomorrow we attend the fair, and then go to Connecticut by way of Holyoke.
