Miss Leona Propst, daughter of John Propst, died yesterday at the home of her parents near this city, after a protracted illness, aged 21 years. The funeral will occur at 11 a. m. to-day. The grief-stricken parents will have the sympathy of the community. The funeral services will be conducted by Revs. E. R. Pritchard and E. N. Condit. Portland's Cable Road. WILL BRING A COLONY.

To do in the "Greenhorn" Bottoms on the Santiam River. Rev. S. E. Davis, formerly pastor of the Evangelical church in this city, stated to a HERALD reporter yesterday that he would leave for Pennsylvania in a few days, for the purpose of bringing out a colony to locate on the bottom lands along the Santiam river, in what is known as the "Greenhorn" country above Sweet Home. Mr. Davis has been corresponding in reference to the matter, and will go to Elvira, Union county, Pennsylvania, where he will remain during the winter, arranging for the departure of the colony in April next. He expects about 40 or 50 families to join the colony, which number can readily find homes and good land in the district named. The land is yet un-surveyed, and has valuable timber upon it. Mr. Davis states that it is his intention to erect a furniture factory and a saw-mill and convert some of the timber into a marketable product. Rich coal deposits have been discovered near the proposed location of the colony, and it is expected when a settlement of these families is effected to direct some attention toward the development of this coal. This is but another step toward the development of the resources of the wild lands in the eastern portion of Lin county, which abound in wealth for the stock-raiser, the lumberman and the miner, and which are steadily being settled by home seekers from the East and elsewhere. Buying Up Timber Lands. Considerable activity is displayed in Astoria in filing on timber land. Large quantities are being filed on in 160-acre tracts at \$2 50 an acre on both sides of the river. A Michigan syndicate, worth, it is said, \$12,000,000, are buying up an entire township, T. 7 N., R. 7 W., back of Knappa, getting all they can from purchasers who have secured a patent from the government. Just whether they intend to build a \$150,000 sawmill or gobble all there is in sight and hold it for the next twenty years is not at present known. This combination of Michigan capitalists is also getting hold of all the timber land they can get a clear title to back of Knappa. Some of the timber land is a wonder, many 160 acre tracts having 10,000,000 feet on each of them. The syndicate is getting bonds for deeds for sixty days from many of the owners of 160 acre tracts. Ten dollars an acre is reported to be the ruling price, though \$25 in some cases is the asking figure. The Salmon Run. The run of salmon is reported to be somewhat better of late upon the Alsea, and the canneries and fishermen are doing a lively business. Upon Yaquina Bay the run is also fairly good at the present time, although there are so many boats employed in the business that the hauls made are usually small. It is reported on good authority that nearly one hundred and twenty boats are now fishing, many of which carry very large gaults and get to the spawning ground this year is a very lucky fish. The canneries are reported as doing a fairly good business though few boats are making any money, some of them scarcely paying expenses.—Newport News. The Presbytery of Oregon. The Presbytery of Oregon meets in Salem beginning October 9th, and continuing for three days. This Presbytery comprises the territory of Oregon east of the Cascades, and it is expected there will be a large attendance. Following the deliberations of the Presbytery and beginning October 11th the Synod of the Columbia will hold a three day's session at the same place. This synod embraces the entire territory of Oregon Idaho and Washington. There is said to be 120 ministers in this body and 124 churches, with about 6,000 members. ARRESTED FOR LARCENY.

Charles Goldman and Robert Harris Arrested Charged With Stealing a Value. Or a warrant sworn out by Nick Zimmerman, two young men, named Chas. Goldman and Robert Harris, were arrested last evening as they were attempting to board the south bound train, charged with the larceny of a \$300 belonging to Mr. Zimmerman from the Waverly boarding house, containing notes, checks, clothes, etc., to the amount of about \$350. They were arraigned before Justice Humphrey and committed without bonds to await the result of their trial, which will take place at 9 o'clock this morning. YAQUINA BAY APPROPRIATION. A correspondent writing from Newport Yaquina Bay, desires to know how much money was appropriated for the government work at that place. He says the statement has been made several times in the newspapers and in reports, that the sum appropriated is \$50,000. The writer says: People here remembered with gratitude the active service of Hon. Binger Hermann in securing a recommendation for \$120,000, and that through the earnest and appreciated efforts of Hons. J. N. Dolph and J. H. Mitchell, this sum was increased in the senate to \$150,000. Now, was this amount reduced? For the information of the correspondent it can be stated that the amount appropriated for the improvement of Yaquina Bay is \$150,000.—Oregonian. The Willamette Packing Company. The canning season at the Willamette Packing Co.'s cannery closed yesterday. They have canned this season 100 tons of fruit and vegetables, or about 4000 cases. The market for the principal portion of this is found in Portland, except what they retain for retail trade at their store in this city. The establishment has gained a reputation for the excellence of their canned goods and are building up a thriving industry, which merits success. A Huge Tomato Plant. Wm. McLaughlin has in the rear of his tailor shop a tomato vine that amounts to almost a tree. It is twelve feet high and was planted on June 10. It has about two bushels of tomatoes upon it and is still blooming. As a specimen tomato plant it certainly is entitled to the broom. Mr. McLaughlin calls it his "Irish thistle." Seriously Hurt. The Lebanon Express says that Ore Thompson was severely hurt last Tuesday while working with the steam wood saw. A crooked vine maple stick was caught by the saw and thrown with great force, striking him down and cutting a gash clear through, and broke a couple of his teeth. O. & C. Traffic. The reports show that the O. & C. road has been run at a loss for the year ending Sept. 1. It is said the Southern Pacific company expected a loss for a year or two, to be followed by its becoming one of its best paying lines upon the complete settlement of Oregon. Moving Right Forward. Rails have now been laid twenty-eight miles east of Albany on the Oregon Pacific. The contract was let Monday for building the tunnel, which will be worked during the winter. It is thought that fifty miles of rails will be laid down east of Albany before work ceases. More Old Coins. Since the HERALD's mention of rare coins several old coins of interest have been dug up. Chas. Keifer, A. B. McIlwain and Wm. Cowan, each have half dollars of date of 1820 and 1825, while Dr. Maston has one dating back 400 years B. C. Made an Assignment. BOATS AND THE RIVER.

River Steamers to Make Traffic Lively as Soon as the Water Rises. The Corvallis Gazette says: A representative of the Gazette wandered down to where the Oregon Pacific steamboats, the N. S. Bentley and the Wm. Hoag, are tied up, and on looking around caught an item something like this: The Bentley has had her engines thoroughly overhauled, cleaned and repaired, and together with the boiler have been encased with a preparation of asbestos with wood covering and paint over it; this leads to confine all the heat to the boiler and keeps the upper deck much cooler than without it. The whole boat from flagstaff to the very end of the wheel has received two coats of paint; the ceiling of the first deck being painted a beautiful light blue; the cabins are all repainted and at present a grainer is at work on the fine woodwork. On the Hoag the engines have undergone a general cleaning and repainting; a new wheel has been built to propel the steamer with and every piece of woodwork has been repainted. Engineer Al. McCully, together with Mechanic Williamson, is busily engaged in "corking" the hull, which when finished, will be repainted. Extra bracing and hog chains have been put in, and it is said that the Hoag will be the stiffest running boat that has been on the Willamette. All the paintwork, excepting the graining, has been done by Guy Powers and H. L. Hatch, and they are "dandies" in the business. These two steamers when they start on the winter run will be complete in every particular and there will not be a boat on the upper Willamette that can "walk away" for them. It is to be hoped that the government officials who have charge of the river and harbor improvements will hurry up and get to work on the upper Willamette and yank out a number of snags, stumps and etc., that look so ugly to all steamboatmen, and, also, that they will do something soon to the river near this place, for if they fail to attend to it Corvallis will be left out completely as far as the river is concerned.
