tail laborer is hard.

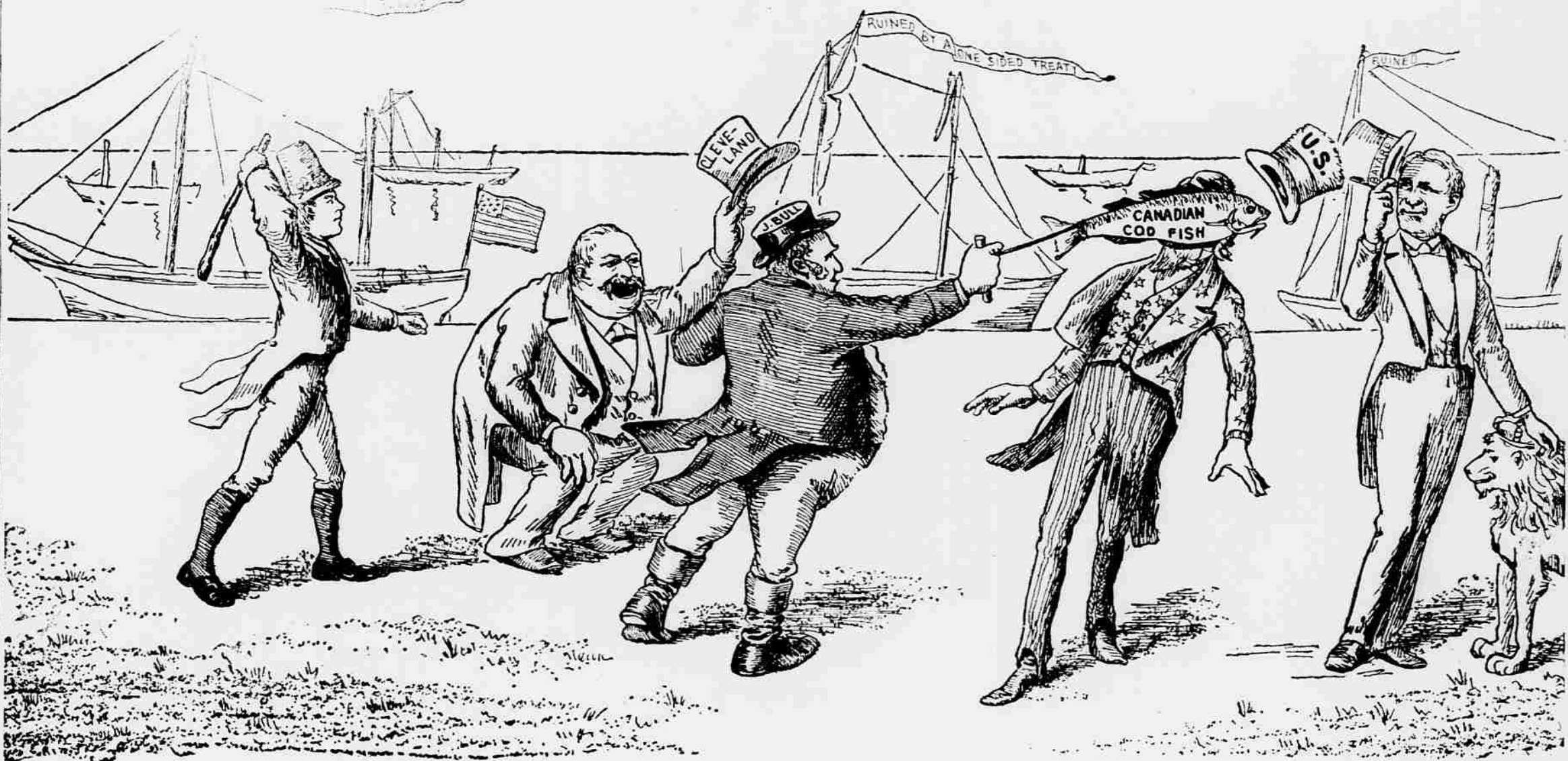
The proposition of the Chicago
Inter Ocean, to give an elaborate
article on the advantages and in-
ducements for capital and manu-
factories in Albany and surround-
ing country, should meet with
success. It is a liberal proposition
to bring Albany prominently before
the attention of eastern people,
and business men generally have
shown a disposition to accept the
proposition.

SERIOUSLY the town cow is be-
coming a great nuisance in Albany,
and she ought to be abolished—
that is, prohibited from running
the streets, meandering up and
down the sidewalks, climbing
trees to gather the fruit, and other
irregularities at which she displays
remarkable talent. As the present
ordinance is defective, requiring

should absolutely prohibit the

June.

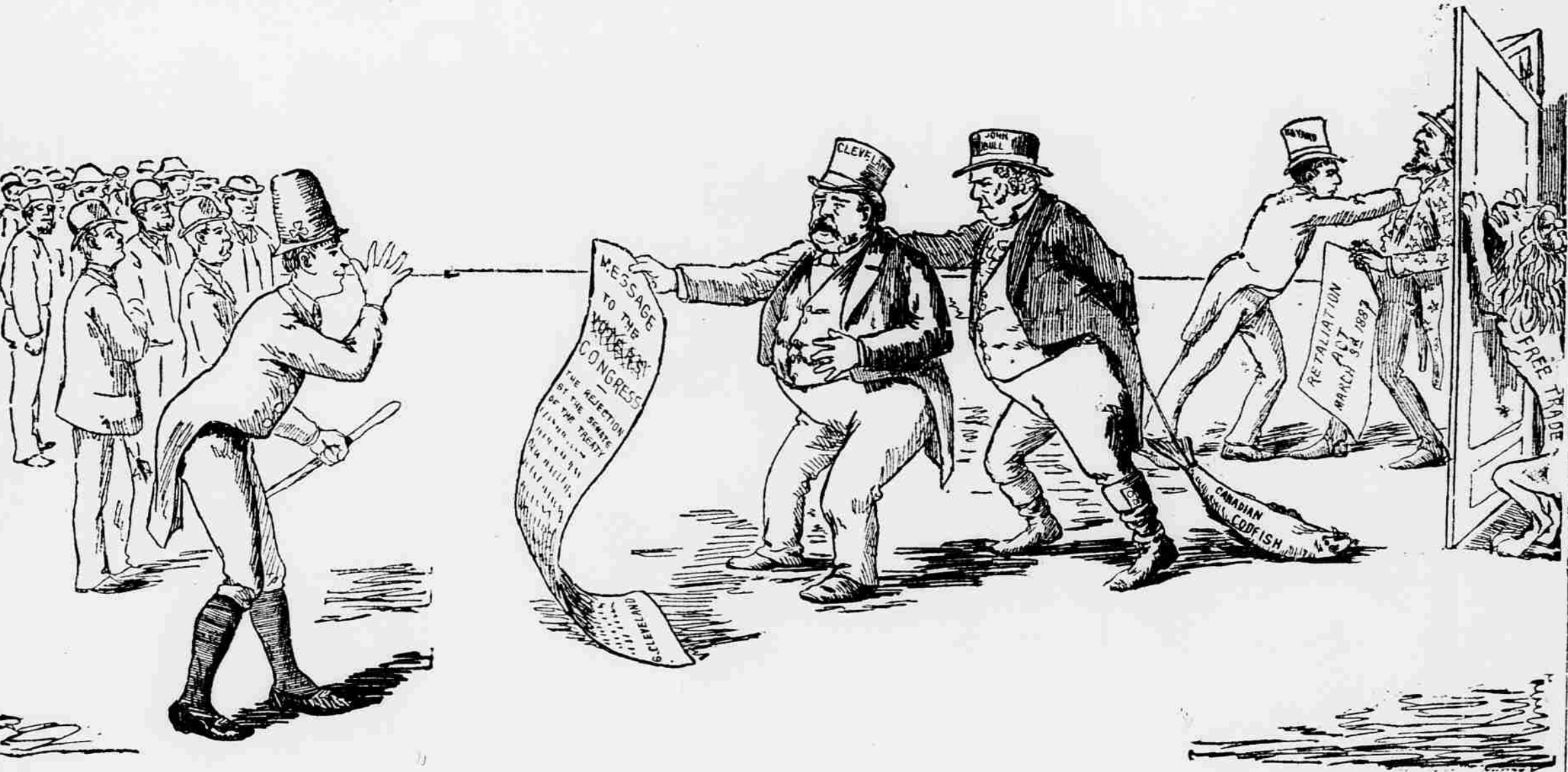
