LOCAL NEWS.

Observations Concerning Albany's Growth and R. R. Connections.

THE CITY TO BE ADVERTISED.

A Proposition from the Inter-Ocean to Give This City an Elaborate Article—News About the City.

Mr. D. Leubrie, staff correspondent of the Chicago Inter-Ocean, is in the city, and has submitted a proposition to publish in that journal an elaborate article concerning the advantages of Albany and Linn county, together with the inducements offered here for the investment of capital and the establishment of manufacturing enterprises.

Several business men were conversed with concerning the proposition, including S. E. Young, president of the board of trade, Jay Blain, secretary, Mayor J. L. Cowan, L. F. Fynn, president of the First National Bank, the real estate firms and many others, who signified a willingness to accept the proposition and subscribed articles to that effect.

Such an advertisement in a great journal like the Inter-Ocean will do much toward attracting attention to Albany, one of Oregon's foremost and growing cities, and toward bringing this portion of Oregon before the people in the East.

The matter will come up at the meeting of the board of trade Tuesday evening and definite action taken.

Mr. Leubrie is highly pleased with the appearance of Albany. He says he had heard very favorable reports of the enterprise and thrift of the city, and on visiting it was in no wise disappointed. He states that before leaving Chicago the officials of the Chicago & North-western railroad conversed with him concerning this portion of Oregon and expressed much interest in its prosperity.

He was accompanied by one Wm. Garnett, an itinerant marble cutter, who some months ago nearly died in this city in a fit, and who was recently released from the insane asylum. He was arrested last night for begging, but escaped from the policeman and run down the street like a professional foot-racer, and could not afterwards be found.

Military Changes.

Captain Johnson, of Co. E, of Corvallis, has tendered his resignation. This leaves Co. E without both a captain and first officer. Lieut. Pearce having also resigned. It is not unlikely that Lieut. Pearce will be urged to accept the captaincy, as he is said to be the most capable man for the position. Captain Lovell, of Co. B, Sa. em., has received his commission as major of the second regiment and now that company is without a commanding officer. Who Capt. Lovell's successor will be is as yet mere speculation. Lieut. Bowersox, of the same company, has also tendered his resignation, having removed to Benton county.

Gave Whisky to Indians.

Chas. Wilson a tramp journalist of San Francisco was arranged in Justice Humphrey's court last night on a charge of giving whisky to Indians. The evidence showed that he had first got the whisky from the Indians, and had then given it back to them. He was intoxicated at the time. The court gave him a wholesome lecture and held him in \$100 bonds to await the action of the grand jury. In default of bail he went to jail. He appeared to have seen better days, and said he was probably better off in jail than outside.

Last Night's Play.

The presentation of "His Natural Life" by the Nellie Boyd dramatic company at the opera house last night was attended by a large audience. The principal characters of course were Miss Nellie Boyd as Sarah Puffy, and Chas. C. Maubury as Richard Devine. The support was good, and the scenery was fine. The stage effects which were under the management of Ingo Tyrell, the author of the play were complete, and altogether the play was a great success, as was exhibited by the frequent and hearty applause of the audience. From here the company goes to Salem.

Were Discharged.

Robert Harris and Charles Goldman, who were arrested on a charge of stealing a valise belonging to Nick Zimmerman, containing checks and merchandise, valued at \$50, were examined yesterday before Justice Humphrey and were released. Their trunk had been searched and the missing articles were not to be found.

BUSINESS AT HARRISBURG.

Some Observations and Notes—Grain Business, Trade, Etc.

A hasty visit to the above city recently gave a view of its present business outlook. The depression seems to have lightened up somewhat and the promise of more life and activity is good. The failure last year of the firm of Hay & Ashby left the place but one dry goods and general merchandise store—May & Senders—who are doing an increasing amount of business. There is in this place the best opening for a merchant business that can be found, and the assurance of cheap rent in a fine brick building in the best business location in the city.

The grain business for the season is about closed, May & Senders having nearly all of their in and Umpqua & Briggs but a few loads out. Both firms have done a large business this season. On Friday May & Senders were devoting the use of their warehouse to cleaning seed wheat and were busy all day.

Jerry Hay has purchased the old tin shop and will move it around on the vacant lot adjoining R. A. Kampy's bank building, to use as a warehouse for agricultural machinery. Jerry has invented a house moving capstan that combines the vim and energy of a steam engine, rope and tackle, capstan, horse and pulley, all combined, and runs by hand. Charley Payne is getting out the "Boss Cultivator" arrangement, and the prospect is that Harrisburg will still claim the honor of being the home of inventors of renown.

Money seems to be more free in circulation than it has been for several years. Indeed, judging by the clink of coin heard in one locality, which is said to keep open early and late, there must be considerable in circulation, or a rapid circulation of a small quantity. That condition of the financial part of the business of the city was not investigated, however, satisfaction being gained by the knowledge that improvement is apparent in the regular avenues of business.

EASTERN AND FOREIGN NEWS.

What Thurman Thinks of the Republican Tariff Bill—A Big Strike—Secret Military Organizations.

The Herald's Special Dispatches. SALEM, Oct. 6.—J. A. Richards, of Woodburn, while riding in the Salem switching train, which was taking special cars to Portland yesterday afternoon, was thrown out near Canemah by the sudden stopping of the train, because the engineer saw a hand car ahead. His leg was broken in two places.

A WOMAN ARRESTED.

Susie Jones, a well known cyprian, was to-day arrested on the charges of selling liquor without a license and of keeping a house of ill fame. The complaint was sworn out by J. A. McDonald, whom Susie caused to be arrested last night charged with stealing a clock from her place. She was examined and bound over on both charges. An examination on a third charge, preferred by U. S. officers, takes place Monday.

A BIG STRIKE.

The Street Car Conductors Cause a Great Tie-Up.

CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—The strike of the street car conductors and cable gripmen on the North Side was inaugurated this morning at 6 o'clock. Not a car is running on the entire North division. Sidewalks have been filled with pedestrians headed for the business portion of the city since an early hour. Express wagons and rattle traps of all description, on which temporary seats have been fixed, are being run by strikers and others. Thus far no violence on the part of the strikers has been reported, and none is expected. The managers announce that no attempts will be made to start cars until Monday. The West Side car men have given it out that they will strike at midnight. Thus to-morrow three-fourths of the city will be without cars. The management of the North division have engaged 150 new men. Everything remains quiet.

A BAND OF ANARCHISTS.

An Armed Secret Organization at Work in Arkansas.

ST LOUIS, Oct. 6.—A special from Winfield, Arkansas, states that there is great excitement in that vicinity over the discovery of a secret military order of anarchists, known as the "National Order of Videttes." It exists in Covley and Sumner counties. A man named Price, formerly of St. Louis, is given as the leader of the band. The agitation is increased by the discovery that several well known citizens are members of it. The discovery was made by a detective who was initiated into the order.

WHAT THURMAN SAYS.

He Talks About the Republican Tariff Bill.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 6.—In an interview with Judge Thurman to-day, he said of the senate tariff bill, "It is a badly planned measure and only aggravates evil. I notice they copy after the Mills bill very largely. I haven't read it yet in its entirety, but I know enough about it to say that it is not nearly as good a measure as the Mills bill. It is nothing more than a bid for votes. They keep up the tariff on manufactured articles to capture the vote of the manufacturers and likewise a protection on raw materials to please the farmers. It is a badly mixed affair."

HOTEL BURNED.

Panic Stricken Guests Leap to their Death.

BIRMINGHAM, (Ala.) Oct. 7.—The McClean hotel was burned at 4 o'clock this morning. A panic occurred among the guests. J. A. Wetherby, of the Evening Chronicle, jumped from the third story window and was killed. His sister and niece also jumped and were seriously hurt.

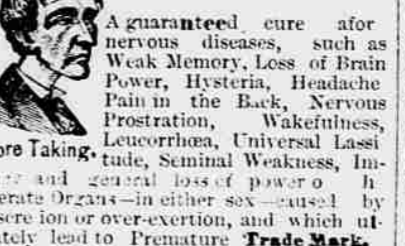
