FOR SENATOR NESMITH.

An immense block of granite from Gold Hill, Southern Oregon, weighing about four tons, was taken to Lafayette a week ago on a flat car and unloaded just south of the line works on the O. & C. track. It is intended to form the base of the monument of Senator Nesmith. Astor mason is at work dressing the block and preparing it for shipment to Dixie, Polk county, where the remains of Senator Nesmith are interred.

THE OREGON PACIFIC.

The schooner Twilight is now unloading steel rails for the Oregon Pacific at Yaquina. The company now has enough rails at the front and at Yaquina to lay the track to Brightenbush. Abe Hackleman, one of the directors of the road, thinks that the road will be completed to the latter point this season. This is about 60 miles east of Albany. The track is laid row about half this distance.

ARM NEARLY SAWED OFF.

Geo. Charles, son of John Charles, while working with a steam wood saw late Saturday evening, had his arm frightfully lacerated by coming in contact with the saw. The muscle and a portion of the bone was cut away. Dr. Wallace dressed the wound, and it is thought the unfortunate young man will recover without the amputation of the arm being necessary.

A SNAG PULLING EXPEDITION.

The U. S. snagboat Corvallis has started up the river. It will go to Rock Island, above Oregon City, and buoy the channel, after which she will proceed on a snag pulling trip up the Willamette river. The captain reports that the water is six inches lower than last year, and six inches on an upper Willamette river is like an inch off a man's nose—there is not much left.

A PRISONER'S ESCAPE.

He Makes a Bold Break for Liberty but is Captured After a Long Chase.

The tramp, Charles Harris, who is confined in the county jail for dislocating Wm. Miller's arm while resisting arrest, made a bold dash for liberty yesterday. He with two other prisoners had been put to work sawing wood near the jail, and while the sheriff's back was turned Harris decamped and fled down the street at his best speed. Sheriff Smallmon started in pursuit, and Deputy Sheriff Vainny Smith joined in the chase close in the rear. The jail doors had been left unlocked and the other prisoners were liable in the meantime to escape also. Mrs. Smallmon called for assistance and Wm. McDaniel hastened over from the court house and locked the doors. Several others had by this time joined in pursuit of Harris and he was captured in the western part of the city and placed in a wagon and hauled back to jail.

A Shocking Suicide in Marion County—The Supreme Court.

Special to the Herald.] SALEM, Oct. 8.—John Heinz, a farmer living four miles north of Silverton, yesterday morning got up early and went out to the granary and taking a revolver placed it to his head and fired. The bullet flattened out against the skull, but Heinz shot again and the ball went crashing into the brain. Heinz wife followed him, and saw him fire the last shot. She summoned help and the coroner was sent for and an inquest held. Heinz was a well-to-do farmer, aged about 30 and was an ex-soldier. He has been in bad health for some time and despondency induced the deed. He leaves six children.
