## GENERAL NEWS.

### Western Union Telegraph Annual Meeting.

CONTENDING SUCCESSORS SLIC.  
S. Jones Our Strike in Chicago Threats Indulged In—Streets Banned—Extra Police Force Sworn In

THE HERALD SPECIAL DISPATCHES.  
NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—The annual meeting of the Western Union Telegraph Company was held today. The only change in the board of directors by the election of Henry M. Flyler for A. R. Vonnegut. The quarterly report for June 30, 1888, shows the gross earnings to be \$19,714,164; expenses, \$14,640,370; net earnings, \$5,073,794; dividend interest and sinking fund account, \$4,574,278; surplus, \$486,516.

### Threats of Violence Made by Cars are Stopped.

CHICAGO, Oct. 10.—The strike of the street cars now in the north and west divisions continues, with no indications of a speedy settlement. During the night some of the tracks in some parts of the district of the north division were obstructed by being covered with all sorts of refuse and such other movable things as came to hand. A few cars were run out in this division to the usual accommodations of passengers, so no attempt has been made as yet to run cars in the west division. Apparatus indicate that the company will not make any effort for the resumption of traffic until matters are quieted down somewhat. The strikers in this division who have been through two or three such strikes exhibit higher dispositions than those of the north side. They said that cars will not be permitted to run, and that if an attempt is made they will be tampered into the ditch. The tracks on Center street in the north division disclosed a peculiar sight this morning. For a mile or more they were covered with paving stones and every other kind of debris a formidable. This was done during the night. This morning men and boys were again at work on Center street, near Orchard, under the protection of police officers, merely laughing at the work of barricading at Hall and Center streets. Four rails were torn up and laid crosswise on the track this morning at Center at sidewalk streets. The company put a force of fifty laborers on the street and cleaned away the debris and railed tracks. The cars were run out and made a trip down town without being interfered with, but on the return trip at Center street the line was found so obstructed that they decided to go up Clayburn avenue. A large force of men were sworn in this morning as special officers. The first trouble of the day on the west side occurred this afternoon when a man named Gibbons, who drove one of the cars yesterday, drove out of the Western Avenue barns. The strikers shot him, but a shot from his revolver scattered them. Three times he was stopped and only succeeded in getting through by indulging in a lively insulade. Nobody was hurt.

## TO ENFORCE THE EXCLUSION ACT.

The Department Calls for an Appropriation of \$750,000.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Acting Secretary Thompson has addressed a letter to congress, inviting attention to the necessity of making some appropriation for carrying into effect the provisions of the Chinese exclusion act. He says: "The enforcement of the act necessitates, in the first instance, upon the collectors of the several ports of entry in the United States, and from the nature of the service, must require the maintenance of a special force of inspectors, guards and customs officers, and as entry may be effected into the United States, not at ports upon the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, but also across the Canadian and Mexican border lines, it is evident that a considerable force must be eventually employed to enforce the provisions of the act. It would be difficult to give a detailed estimate of the expenditures which might be required for this purpose, but it is recommended that an initial appropriation of \$50,000 be made, and I enclose the draft of provisions to be inserted in some proper appropriation bill, at the recommendation of the approval of congress. As the act relates to a measure, regular in the subject of immigration into the United States, it is believed the money appropriated can be properly paid out of the immigration fund, provided for by the act of August 2, 1882."

### QUICK WORK.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—On receipt of a letter from Acting Secretary Thompson asking the amount for an initial appropriation of \$50,000 to carry into effect the provisions of the Chinese exclusion act, the communication was read by the clerk and immediately referred to the committee on appropriations. The committee on appropriations has reported back on that committee a bill appropriating \$50,000 for the purpose. With the recommendation of the bill, and five minutes later the bill passed without a dissenting voice.

### LIGHT WEIGHT CHAMPIONSHIP.

#### Billy Deacy Knocked Out in the Twelfth Round.

DO EX, N. J., Oct. 20.—The light weight championship battle between Jack McAuliffe and Billy Deacy for the Police Gazette diamond belt took place this morning. After eleven fierce and desperate rounds, lasting 42 minutes and 40 seconds, McAuliffe knocked his man out by a terrific left hand blow on the stomach, winning the battle. Deacy was completely baffled from the start. McAuliffe gained first blood in the second round, by one of his terrific left handed smashers on Deacy's nose. He did the most of the leading, and his repeated rushes were too much for Deacy to stop. He repeatedly sent his left at Deacy with terrible force, the latter ducking in his vain attempt to get away. McAuliffe would then uppercut him unmercifully. Deacy laid some savage right handers on McAuliffe's jaw, and in the sixth round the crimson was trickling from McAuliffe's nose. Not more than fifty of the most select sporting men witnessed the contest.

### A Novel Lottery.

A novel lottery scheme has been proposed in Russia. The chief conditions are these: A young woman of excellent moral character and noble birth is the chief prize; her name is to remain a secret until after the drawing; the total receipts from the sale of tickets, amounting to 5000 rubles, are to form her marriage portion; the holder of the lucky ticket is to marry the young woman and thus receive the dowry; but if she won't marry him she must pay 2500 rubles.

### SCIENTIFIC SCRAPS.

The Italian Admiralty has been experimenting with olive and castor oils for lubrication aboard ship, and now the or is given forth that castor oil is to be used for all exposed parts of the machinery, and mineral oils in cylinders and for similar lubrication.

The Watkins position-ender for which the British government paid \$224,000, has been proved to be very efficacious in finding vessels and like objects that could not be seen from the battery which was aimed at them, and such objects were struck very frequently by the guns from such battery, although invisible to them.

Recently a paddle-wheel steamer was changed into twin-screw type, the result being to increase the carrying power of the vessel by 190 tons, large additional cattle-carrying space being gained, while the net register is decreased 247 tons. The speed has been increased considerably and the fuel consumption reduced 60 per cent.

The question as to whether or not excitement shortens life is being given a trial, and it is held that anything which quickens the action of the heart, any kind of excitement, taxes and reduces the storage of life. Almost everyone knew this years ago, and it is only recently that the matter has been considered in the light of percentage.

A new system of elevated railways is proposed, in which the track instead of being level, is in a series of undulations, with the stations on the crests. Most of the power consumed in going down a hill is supposed to be given out in going up, and the balance (which is that wasted in friction) is supplied by cable upon which the cars catch hold "on the fly" upon the up grades.

Ten per cent of aluminum added to the weak metal copper gives the strength of steel. One stove-making concern in Michigan uses about one tenth of 1 per cent of the metal in all its iron castings with the result of diminishing the shrinkage, making it the mould better, improving the skin, rendering the grain perfectly even and preventing chipping, even turning white iron into gray.

The electric light is now being used in fishing to attract the fish to a particular place to facilitate their capture. The principal trouble has been that the wires leading to the submerged incandescent light are apt to become fouled with the fishing appliances or with the cable of the vessel.

To prevent this Regan has out a primary battery which can be towed overboard and regained when desired, the lead being up and this battery to the lamp.

### A MOORI-K RELIC.

An Old Shovel Found on a Texas Prairie.

San Antonio, Tex., Corr. Globe Democrat.

A Mexican sheep herder on Perdalaras creek, between Kern and Gillespie counties, northwest of here, has made a find which would prove a treasure to the curiosity seeker. Some days ago, while tending his flock, he felt a sharp substance pierce the sole of his heavy shoe and stab his foot. Thinking that it was an unusually strong thorn, he stooped down to remove it, and found that the body of the instrument was buried in the ground. Digging down for some inches he unearthed a still sharper dagger. The blade was fourteen inches in length, with an exceedingly sharp point and edge. It was buried in a perpendicular position, point upward; and the handle was four inches long, making the entire weapon measure eighteen inches. It was all handle and blade molded out of one piece of exceedingly fine tempered steel. The handle and four inches of the blade were heavily inlaid with pure gold, which was let into the metal in blocks a half an inch long and a quarter inch wide. This gold was all carved with signs and symbols in an unknown tongue, having a decidedly Eastern appearance. It is the common opinion that the knife was lost by one of the Spanish cavaliers who attempted to explore this section 200 years ago. Its knightly owner is supposed to have secured it from some ancestor who won it from the Moors when they invaded Spain. The carving of the gold is decidedly Arabic in character.
