## GENERAL NEWS.

**Congress Will Adjourn on Saturday, October 20.**

**THE RIOTOUS CHICAGO STRIKERS**  
Mayor Roche Issues a Proclamation to the People of Chicago. News from East of the Rockies.

**The Herald's Special Dispatches.**  
WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—As a result of the conference with the members of the house and senate, it has been substantially agreed to adjourn congress one week from Saturday.

**RIOTOUS DEMONSTRATION BY THE CHICAGO STREET CAR STRIKERS.**  
Chicago, Oct. 11.—In view of the riotous demonstration yesterday, Mayor Roche this morning issued a proclamation calling on the people of the city not to congregate on the streets. Some cars were run on the north side this morning. The tracks were torn up in a number of places and obstructions placed at many points, making the progress slow. It is rumored that a conference is in progress looking to a settlement. President Yerkes denies this and declares that the fight is to the death. It is announced that an attempt will be made to run cars on the west side at 4 o'clock this afternoon and serious trouble is anticipated, notwithstanding a full committee of strikers called on Captain Aldrich this morning and proffered assistance in suppressing any disturbance.

**MORMONS IN MEXICO.**  
The Felling Against Them in Our Sister Republic.

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 10.—Henry Irving, representative here of the Mormon colonies in the state of Chihuahua, denies the report that the Mormon church has bought 400,000 acres of land in that state, formerly the property of the Zuni Indians. He also denies the charge that the Mormons contemplate moving en masse to that country. The Mormons now number only 150 families, occupying 200,000 acres in Chihuahua. There is much discussion in the press regarding Mormon immigration, the general sentiment being averse to it.

## TITLE TO A HOMESTEAD.

The Provisions of a Bill Just Passed by the House.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—The house has passed a bill introduced by Hermann to confirm to Martin Howe, of Oregon, the title to a homestead in section 22 east, township 12 south, range 23 east of the Willamette meridian, in The Dalles land district. It seems that the entry had been originally made by Marshal McNeil in February, 1875. He lived on the land and improved it for the regular period of five years, but before he could make final proof he died. The administrator appointed by the county court of Grant county, Oregon, sold the homestead at public auction, but the interior department refused to issue a patent, on the ground that there is no authority under the law allowing an administrator to make proof on a homestead entry as such. The bill passed by the house is to remedy the difficulty by ordering the issue of a patent to Howe, who purchased the homestead from the administrator at public auction.

**An Important Association.**  
An interesting meeting of the North Pacific fruit growers association was held in Portland Tuesday. There was a large attendance of the most prominent fruit growers of the state, and their discussion of subjects concerning the fruit industry were very interesting. Oregon is developing into a great fruit producing country, and it is to protect and encourage this industry that this association has been formed. The members will endeavor to have the association made a state institution, with a view of securing legislation to aid in checking the ravages of fruit pests. The pests are a great menace to the fruit growing industry, and unless effective remedies can be found the industry cannot prosper. This question is not only interesting to the fruit growers of Oregon, but of California also, and in that state the question is the principal subject of discussion at the meetings of all fruit-growers' associations. Much good has been accomplished, but there seems to be no end to the work. At each meeting the appearance of some new destructive insect is reported, and a series of experiments must be commenced to find a means to exterminate the pest. The Oregon state legislature should render the North Pacific association the aid it asks. An appropriation for such a purpose will greatly assist the association. The fruit industry is one of too much importance to be neglected, and the growers recognize the fact that they are threatened by the appearance of these pests.

The association took a step in the right direction by appointing a committee to collect samples of green, dried and canned fruit to be sent East for exhibition. This is an excellent method of attracting the attention of Eastern people toward Oregon, and the result will be a flow of immigration as soon as our resources are known and appreciated.—Evening Telegram.
