Albany has a \$12,500 damage suit! A republican club is being organized in this city. Sup't E. B. McElroy was in the city yesterday.

SUIT FOR \$12,500 DAMAGES.

Dr. E. A. McAlister Brings Suit Against the City for This Amount.

Suit was commenced in the circuit court yesterday by C. E. Wolverson as attorney for Dr. E. A. McAlister for \$12,500 damages on account of his recent accident in driving into a sewer on Ellsworth street.

The complaint states that the sewer was dug across the street, rendering travel dangerous; that no light was placed there to warn travelers of such danger; that in this instance ordinary caution was used, and that owing to the neglect on the part of the city the plaintiff drove into the sewer, suffering bodily injury and pecuniary loss to the amount of \$12,500, which amount of damages is claimed from the city.

It is understood that D. R. N. Blackburn and J. K. Weatherford will be the attorneys retained by the city to defend the case, and Mr. Wolverson will be assisted in the prosecution by Capt. N. B. Humphrey.

Chinese Woman Allowed to Land.

The case of Yong Sing Hee, the Chinese woman who was refused the privilege of landing at Portland by the customs collector, was brought up in the United States court Wednesday. Proof that she was born in San Francisco in 1866 was furnished upon the testimony of her father and two acquaintances who knew the family in that city.

From a gentleman who returned to this city last night from Mehanamegar particulars were obtained of a stabbing affray which occurred at Brightenbush yesterday morning. Two Queener brothers, while partly intoxicated, became engaged in a row with the saloonkeeper at Brightenbush, and knives were drawn and used freely.

Clay, who was for about eight years connected with the Oregonian, and until a few weeks ago commercial editor of that paper, died at the residence of his parents at the corner of Market and Eleventh streets at 10 o'clock this morning. Mr. Clay has been suffering from a complication of troubles, arising from an affection of the heart, and during his last sickness has suffered a great deal. He enjoyed the fullest confidence of his employers, as well as of the entire mercantile community with whom he had daily communication and was a favorite. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias and has held several offices in that order. His funeral will take place Saturday morning at 9 o'clock from the family residence.
