CONCERNING ALBANY.

Press Comments About the Business and Enterprise of This City.

Times are said to be quite lively in Albany, and steam wood saws run all night in order to keep up with other lines of business. Another evidence of prosperity and advancement is suggested in the formation of an enthusiastic republican club—Oregonian.

The Albany HERALD announces that the O. P. railroad will soon reach Melama on the North Santiam. If such be the case the people of the principal towns of Oregon have reason to congratulate themselves. From present appearances it seems quite probable that Albany is destined to stand second in commercial importance among the towns in the Willamette Valley.—Portland Mercury.

The Herald thinks that some enterprising man, by putting a little time and money into the development of coal mines in Linn county, would quickly find themselves in possession of large fortunes. Doubtless this is true, and it applies to a great many counties in Oregon and Washington territory. Rich coal deposits have been discovered near the proposed location of a colony from Pennsylvania, which is to settle in the Greenhorn bottom of the Santiam river, and the colonists will give considerable attention to the development of the mineral.—Oregonian.

A Fishy Item. On Wednesday a feat was performed at Newport, says the News, which was very novel and surprising. Mrs. Fanny Seiforth and Miss Mary Westfall, who, with a number of their friends, all from Polk county, were spending a few days by the seaside, and while standing on a log which projected out into the bay, discovered a large fish slowly swimming toward them. They procured a large rock, and when the fish came close alongside hurled the missile at him, and, a range to say, hit him square on the back, which projected a little above the surface of the water. This entirely paralyzed their victim, and rendered him an easy prey. They dragged him ashore, and the funny looking fish proved to be a veritable shark three and a half feet in length.

Cut Finished. The work on the cut around Kiphar's bluff, on the line of the Oregon Pacific, which has been carried actively forward during the summer and the year before, was finished Friday evening and the track laid to a point two hundred yards above. The cut is about one-fourth of a mile long, and is made to a width of eighty feet and a height of sixty, though the bluff is much loftier. The estimated cost of the cut upon which 200 men have been steadily at work, is \$200,000.
