GENERAL NEWS.

Again Two Trains Dash Into Each Other. THIRTY KILLED AND WOUNDED

Political Gossip From the National Capital.

THE CAMPAIGN BALL IS ROLLING. Gossiping at the Figures in New York—The Most Recent Canvass Gives Harris a 15,000 Plurality.

The nomination of Mayor Hewitt, of New York, by a citizens' meeting has disturbed Cleveland very much. Mr. Hewitt has no love for either Cleveland or for free trade, and Cleveland is fully aware of it, hence these tears.

G. A. R. men here are indignant at their Philadelphia brethren, who marched in a procession at Richmond, Virginia, in which the confederate flag was carried.

Democrats here are worrying a great deal over the rumors that are afloat around as to why the members of the National Democratic committee have been called upon to attend a special meeting at New York Wednesday. The rumor which gained the most credence says that the Democratic canvass of the voters of New York, just completed, shows a plurality for Harrison and Morton of about 15,000 and this meeting is called to decide upon what to do about it—whether to throw up the sponge or continue the fight.
