IMPORTANT COURT CASES.

The County Judgeship Contest—The McAlister Damage Suit.

At the term of circuit court convening next Monday several important cases will come up for trial. The \$12,500 damage suit of Dr. E. A. McAlister against the city of Albany for injuries and pecuniary damages received by driving into a sewer on Ellsworth street at night, where no light had been placed, will come up for trial.

The ridiculous county judgeship contest inaugurated by Judge J. J. Whitney, who was defeated by Judge D. R. N. Blackburn last June by three votes, will also come up. Judge Whitney in his notice of contest, it will be remembered, set forth a long array of alleged illegal voting and fraud in counting, by which Judge Blackburn obtained the office, and he has recently been industriously skirmishing in a vain search for evidence of such fraud. Many democrats, as well as republicans, are indignant at the sweeping charges of fraud made by the contestant, and do not believe that any grounds for contest exist.

There are a number of other cases which have attracted some attention, among them being the damage suit of the Oregon Pacific railroad against G. W. Hunt for non-fulfillment of contract and the suit of Ex-District Attorney G. W. Belt against Linn county for deputy district attorney fees, L. H. Montanye being the deputy. The fees were disallowed by the old board of county commissioners, which led to the suit, which will cost the county much more than it would to have paid the same in the first instance.

Drowning of Mrs. Keniston.

The Eugene Register says: Last Saturday about noon Mr. C. J. Howard, who has been down on the Siuslaw, arrived in this city to inform Mr. H. B. Keniston of the death of his wife by drowning, which occurred the day before. She was about five miles below the head of tide on the Siuslaw, and went across the river in a boat to milk the cow. She was found near the place where she had intended to land, with her clothes caught on some bushes and the family hanging in the water. The family had moved there only a few weeks ago, but Mr. Keniston had not yet gone down. Besides her husband she leaves two or three small children and a large circle of friends to mourn her loss.

Sudden Death.

The little three year old daughter of Mrs. Clara Davidson, died very suddenly in Lebanon on Wednesday. Mrs. Davidson is a daughter of C. B. Montagne, and recently arrived with her husband and family from California. County clerk, E. E. Montagne, received a telegram telling of the sad event, and went out on the evening train. The funeral occurred yesterday and was attended by quite a number from this city.

The Frosts of Autumn.

B. N. Hardman, of Lebanon, who was in the city yesterday, states that the first heavy frost of the season was visible there in the morning when he left. As there are no crops now to suffer the autumn frosts are welcome. At this city there was a light frost.

Bound Over.

He waived examination and was bound over in \$100 bonds to await the action of the grand jury, which will convene next week. The required bonds were promptly furnished.

AN IMPORTANT MATTER.

Albany Should Endeavor to Secure the Astoria Railway Connection.

Readers of the HERALD are aware of the fact that the citizens of Astoria have subscribed \$75,000 along the coast down Clatsop beach, thence through the coast range pass east of Tillamook to some point in the Willamette Valley, the objective point being a connection with the Oregon Pacific. Active operations on the road have commenced, and it is expected that it will be finished to the seaside, a distance of twenty miles, by spring. It was announced that the proposed connection with the Oregon Pacific would be at Albany, but now comes Salem with a request that it be built to that place and connect at some point on the Santiam. A committee from the Salem Board of Trade has been appointed to confer with the Astoria people concerning it, and the citizens of the capital city are enthusiastic over the matter.

If Albany is to maintain her position as a tie city, business center of the Willamette Valley it might be well for the citizens of this city to look after this matter. The Board of Trade, if it wishes to fulfill its mission, ought to shake off the lethargy in which it seems to be enveloped, and appoint a committee of energetic citizens to correspond with the Astoria people, and if possible secure the connection of this proposed road at Albany, which would be the natural connecting place. This city already has very desirable railroad facilities, and if this road is built here Albany will be railroad center of no mean proportions and excelled by no city of Oregon outside of Portland.

Horse Race at Scio.

There will be a race ran at Scio on Saturday of next week between a horse owned by Bellanger Bros. and one owned by Ed. Stover. The distance to be run is 300 yards, and the stakes are \$300 a side. Considerable interest is manifested in this race by the Scio sporting fraternity and a large amount of money will change hands on the result.
